The image stays with me still: A circle of twenty or so people from our church at our first ever Ferry Beach Retreat a few weeks ago, all of us gathered together in the Quillen Meeting Room, seven or eight more people among us from the Marblehead UU Church that was also there that weekend. Mike, playing his guitar in the center of our circle, and Mindy, his friend & co-facilitator of the *Dances of Universal Peace*, moving around the circle with us, teaching us these simple, yet profound instructions:

As you're able, turn to the person on your left, and raise your hands and arms up over your head, and bring them back down by your side, and *while* you do this, look at the person in front of you and say, "Thy light is in all forms." And then bring your arms back in front of you, and place your hands on your own heart, and still looking at your neighbor, say *these* words, "Thy love in all beings." And then bow once toward the left side and then the right side of that person, and keep doing this. Keep listening to the music. Keep greeting each person you see in this way. Keep making your way around the circle.

“Thy light is in all forms. Thy love in all beings.”


Looking at each person in that circle,

From the Board of Trustees

Summary of Board of Trustees Meeting, October 9, 2014

All Board Members present except Evelyn Foster
 Bob Dickens and Helen Kazura were present for a report.

The meeting was called at 6:03 by President David Wilcock

➤ The board first amended the agenda to allow Bob and Helen to report on the development of an emergency preparedness plan.

They have done a great deal of work to prepare a plan though much work still remains. The plan will include procedures for evacuation and other procedures in case of fire and for reacting to such things as emergencies involving threats, guns or medical problems.

Bob D. noted that we need another handicap-friendly exit from the sanctuary; he is working on getting a proposal for that work.

Also, installation of a notification device in the pulpit and in the RE wing was discussed. This would allow immediate communication between the ends of the church building and would prevent many people calling the police all at once.

The board moved to acknowledge the work that Bob and Helen have already done and requested that they present a more complete plan and steps for completing it to the board at the November meeting.

- The treasurer's report indicated that the last plate split was especially generous, that there are still two outstanding tickets from the lobster bake, so the total is not fixed as yet, and that the furnace was repaired since the last meeting. He is working on getting the carpet steam cleaned.
- All but one of the one-time expenditures authorized by last year's board have been completed: cleaning of the sanctuary, new chairs for the Tidewater Room, new tables for the community room. Storage renovation plans are in progress.
- Minister's report:
 - Rev. Sara will ask the board to approve a fund-raising effort to support youth from four other churches going to New Orleans in April 2015 for a service trip. This will likely be a letter writing campaign. The board has previously endorsed Rev. Sara's involvement in this effort as part of her professional development around a youth program.
 - She would be happy if the Committee on Ministry (COM), the board and the congregation called her to ministry during this church year, though she doubted the move could be made at the upcoming congregational meeting.
 - Rev. Sara learned at a recent District Ministers' Meeting that there are only three full time religious education directors or coordinators in the New England district. Therefore, she is especially grateful that our program is healthy, thanks to the wonderful work of the RE Committee for working so hard to re-shape and support our RE program and coordinator over the last few months.
 - Rev. Sara invites anyone interested to accompany her and two members of the COM to a Leadership Training in Concord, NH on November 1.
- The Evaluation Subcommittee reported on the evaluation of Rev. Sara. The overall evaluation was very positive. The board moved to accept the report and added that the evaluations confirm that we have a superior minister.
 - Rev. Sara will work with the committee to draft a performance plan for herself, which will be the basis of the next evaluation.
- Report on the Ferry Beach Retreat--as of October 9, there were 41 people, including 5 children, signed up for the retreat; plans are progressing for the weekend's events. Don reports that the bill for FB has already been paid.
- An agenda for the congregational meeting on Oct. 12 was developed, with further refinements to it to be made after Board President Wilcock consults with Moderator Ruth Eveland. The meeting will definitely include something about where things stand in terms of calling Rev. Sara to ministry.
 - Other items: Discussion of a personnel policy was postponed until December; discussion of a media policy regarding advertising of events not strictly sponsored by the church or church members was postponed; a Google calendaring program has been revived by Margaret Thurston and Peggy Strong and Alison will use this program from now on to record building use. Also, there will be a link to it on the website.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30

On November 30th, we will be doing our first Faith in Action Sunday in R.E. Faith in Action involves bringing all the children together for a service project related to one or more of the 7 principles. This project involves learning about the Emmaus Shelter and making tote bags from recycled fabric to use to hold the gifts we donate to the shelter’s annual holiday Adopt a Family gift campaign. “Seed Packets for the Soul” – What Do You Think?

Have you read this month’s “Seed Packet for the Soul”? Do you have a reading or quote or other resource that has particularly touched you? As most of you know by now, Reverend Sara Huijsen has begun distributing a “Seed Packet for the Soul” at the beginning of each month. This effort is part of a larger initiative of Rev. Sara and the Worship Associates to have the worship in the church guided by monthly themes. Themes give a

focal point for the readings, music and sermons, and can eventually connect all parts of the worship experience. They help the minister, the Worship Associates and us—congregants—to delve more deeply into a particular topic, or theme.

The packets are distributed electronically to the entire church e-mail list at the beginning of the month and are also available each Sunday in paper format on the table in the foyer. As Rev. Sara notes in her monthly e-mail containing the Seed Packet for the upcoming month, the packets include "...questions for reflection, quotes, poems, and readings on the theme. You might also find visual images, music, songs, links to Ted Talks and suggestions or ideas about spiritual practices that pertain to the month's theme." The packets can be used for personal reflection or a focused small or large group discussion.

What is your reaction to the packets? Rev. Sara and the Worship Associates would very much like to know! Please tell us which format, paper or electronic, you read or prefer. What do you do with the packets? Are you enjoying them? Do you find them inspiring and helpful in some way in your life? Do you have any critiques about the format and length of the packets? Do you have anything to contribute to the theme of a month? In what other ways might the packets and content be used?

Treasurer's Corner



September 2014

Total income for September 2014 was \$16,391.87. This was \$2,161.53 more than total expenses for the month which was \$14,230.34. Total income through September is \$48,018.75, 32.7% of budget which is 7.7% more than the year-to-date percentage of 25%

Total expenses for the same period was \$32,303.99, 22.01% of budget which is 2.99% less than the year-to-date figure of 25%.

Pledge income for September was \$6,564.00. Total pledges through September were \$31,789.08 or 29.19% of budget which is 4.19% more than the year-to-date figure 25%.

Plate income for September was \$1106.50. Total Plate income through September was \$2589.26 or 26.69% of budget, 1.69% more than year-to-date figure of 25%.

Plate income-Church through September was \$2072.83 or 25.91% of budget.

Plate income – plate split charity through September was \$516.45 or 30.36% of budget.

Fundraising income in September was \$2,500.40 from the Yard sale. Total income fundraising through September was \$4,581.47 or 27.7% of budget.

Rental income for the month was \$350.00 for a total through September of \$3,153.00 or 33.72% of budget. We received our last rental payment from the YMCA in August; this will leave us \$1000 short in our budget.

Expenses for September were \$14,230.34. Total expenses through the month were \$32,303.99 or 22.01% of budget and 2.99% less than the year-to-date figure of 25%.

You should have received your first quarter statement, please take time to review it. I hope it will help you evaluate how you are doing with your pledge payments. It is helpful that we all keep our payments as current as possible as we have a large financial commitment to our church.

If there are any discrepancies please call Alison or myself.

Committee on Ministry

CONTRACT MINISTER TO CALLED MINISTER: The UUCE Congregation is considering transitioning The Reverend Sara Huisjen from a contract minister position to a called ministry post. We look forward to this transition, reflecting a deepening sense of trust, investment, and commitment between Congregation and minister.

CONTRACT MINISTER - A minister is HIRED by the Board of Trustees for a designated period of time. UUCE and Sara are operating under annual contracts. The Board of Trustees supervises the minister.. The Board or the minister may choose at any time NOT to renew the contract.

CALLED MINISTER - A minister is CALLED to serve a church by a vote of the Congregation. (Most ministers will not accept a call unless 90% or more of the Congregation vote in favor.) As a called minister, the minister enters into a Covenant with the Congregation. A Called Minister is no longer time limited - continuing until the minister wishes to resign or until the Congregation decides it is time for a change. Called ministers accumulate time towards Sabbatical leave (typically once month for each year of service). The Board of Trustees would no longer supervise the minister; the congregation would.

If we vote to call Sara, we will move from having her as our employee to having her as our partner, sharing our ministry. We look forward to taking this vote at the January Parish Meeting. If you have questions, talk with any member of the Committee on Ministry. (Chair Marta Rieman, Bill Clark, Ruth Eveland, and Jenn Ryan.)

Why We Give to The Unitarian-Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)

This month (November) we and hundreds of other UU communities will begin raising money for the Unitarian-Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) through Guest at Your Table. As this campaign begins, the Peace and Social Action Committee (PASA) wanted to remind you of what a powerhouse of social action the UUSC really is. I joined UUSC as I was going to General Assembly in June because I was deeply impressed that this is an organization that actually put its words and fundraising into action on issues I am personally very concerned about. Whatever social action issue interests you as a Unitarian-Universalist, you can be sure the UUSC is doing something about it.

Some of the current domestic issues UUSC is taking some form of *action* on include the Detroit water shutoff crisis; encouraging e-Bay to withdraw from the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC), which, in collaboration with 200 multinational corporations, actually sets the legislative agenda for office holders at all levels of government; supporting workers' rights and the associated issues of fair trade and living wages; and lobbying to prevent the CIA from covering up reports on torture. Internationally, the UUSC works for such causes as raising support for the senate vote on the International Disability Rights Treaty, working to assure that access to water is assured in many third world countries, raising funds to help rebuild homes of victims of the typhoon in the Philippines that two years ago damaged thousands of homes in several coastal cities, continuing to help Haitians move toward having livable housing, access to food, and increased education opportunities, and continuing to bring the attention of the world to the plight of the Palestinians caught in the political quagmire.

In short, the UUSC is proof that the justice work we are called on to do as UUs can be addressed by working together. The UUSC is OUR voice, our conscience in action and the extension of our arms and hands. Please be generous and support the various ways the Guest at Your Table campaign will appear amongst us at UUCE. Fairness at FairPoint

You probably know that FairPoint is the land-line phone company for most of us in this area. At this moment, in late October, FairPoint has refused to bargain in good faith with its employees since late August, and so, on October 17, the union workers went on strike throughout Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont. FairPoint imposed its final offer for settling the strike. Their conditions include 1) freezing the pensions of nearly 2000 employees, 2) no more retiree health care, 3) no more child and elder care support, and 4) hundreds of dollars per month less for the health care plan and less coverage for workers and their families. FairPoint has declared the right to outsource jobs to foreign and out-of-state contractors.

The most recent General Assembly of the UUA chose "Escalating Inequality" as the special issue for four years of study, reflection, and action. At their October meeting, PASA (Peace and Social Action Committee) endorsed the FairPoint workers' struggle for their rights, especially in the light of the GA call for action. One

of the reasons wages are so unequal in this country is that the power of unions has been steadily eroded. We recognize the essential nature of reliable telephone service in our communities, especially as another winter approaches and call for all parties to return to the negotiating table.

If you want to support the FairPoint workers, you can approach them on their picket line in Ellsworth, next to the Post Office. If you do this, ask them how you can help. Maybe a warm cup of coffee would be welcome. Maybe standing with them for a while would be good. They have been standing there in the rain and cold and wind. You can also show your support by giving them a thumbs-up as you drive by or by writing a letter to the editor. For more information and to keep current on developments, see fairnessatfairpoint.com.
