Sunday, February 24. *Spiritual, But Not Religious*

Adult Religious Education

Evolution's Edge: Awakening the Truly Human: Paul Weiss continues to offer this series through the winter, Wednesday evenings, from 6:00 to 8:30. In our ongoing classes we will have a chance to look more deeply and to practice our capacity to cultivate positive emotions and positive states of mind; to develop our capacity for focused and sustained attention; to settle more into our own bodies, integrate mind/body energy states, and participate more knowingly in our physical health; to practice cognitive/behavioral skills that open us to deepening presence in our relationships and in our spiritual life.

Each week begins with a half-hour warm-up of qi gong and mind/body integration and continues with presentations by Paul, meditations, experiential exercises, and shared communication.

February 24th, following the service, showing of the DVD Root of all Evil, by Richard Dawkins, followed by a discussion. (Dawkins says his producers insisted on the title because they wanted to provoke controversy – his title was The God Delusion). We will show part II only, as it would take too long to show both parts.

Part II of the DVD set, labeled “The Virus of Faith,” deals with the effects of “sectarian” education on children. Dawkins discusses specifically the idea of [religion](#) seen as a [virus](#) ... He claims a child is genetically programmed to believe without questioning the word of authority figures, especially parents – the evolutionary imperative being that no child would survive by adopting a skeptical attitude towards everything said by his or her elders. But this same imperative, he claims, leaves children open to infection by religion. He then turns to an account of how religious education may abuse children, terrorizing them with the fear of hell, for example. Then he takes up the question whether the Bible provides a morality to be followed. He doesn't think so, and argues for an evolutionary approach to morality, similar to a primordial morality as is found among chimpanzees.

In short, he raises a variety of provocative questions and makes many provocative claims. We are hoping you will come and give your responses to this program.

We are planning to have a discussion based on the book *The Dancing Healers: A doctor's journey of healing with Native Americans* by Carl Hammerschlag on Thursday, February 28, from 11-1, at UUCE. We welcome everyone – please bring a brown bag lunch, and join the discussion. A book that is likely to be discussed at a later discussion meeting is *The Origin of Consciousness in the Breakdown of the Bicameral Mind*, by Julian Jaymes.

Music and History Committees' Request

Haydee reports that both committees are frustrated about the lack of storage for their materials. They are looking for a short term solution to provide access and would like something to happen sooner than later. They would like to use the money from their February 9 fundraiser to accomplish this. Traditionally they have split funds raised with Loaves & Fishes. This year they propose not splitting the money and using it for temporary storage.

The Board raised concerns about the effect on both Loaves and Fishes and the church budget if these funds are not raised. An alternative plan was proposed to paint the file cabinets and move them back to the Board room until a permanent solution was in place. **A motion was made to accept the alternative plan and passed unanimously.**

Treasurer's Corner

Total income for December 2012 was \$11,411.89. This was \$1861.28 more than the total expenses for the month of December which were \$9550.61. Total Income, through December is \$77,575.44, 62.46% of budget which is 12.46% more than the year-to-date percentage of 50%. Total expenses for the same period were \$54,748.16, 44.08% of budget which is 4.08% less than the year-to-date figure of 50%.

These results are positive

Pledge Income for December was \$10,492.00. Total pledges through December were \$57,984.00 or 56.41% of budget which is 6.41% more than the year-to-date figure of 50%.

Plate Income for December was \$551.89, 36.91% less than last month's total of \$588.80 (note there was no church service on the 30th) Total Plate income through December \$3,515.89 or 46.88% of budget, 3.12% less than the year-to-date figure of 50%. There was no change in Fundraising \$7,194.87 or 102.78% of budget.

Rental income for the month was \$368.00 for a total through December of \$2,161.00, 36.02% of budget. We haven't received payment from our largest rental as yet; that payment should bring us up to 43% of budget. Financial figures continue to be positive. I am concerned that our shortfall in pledges will exceed the \$6000 that we have already identified and budgeted. I have been made aware of \$5,200 in pledges that we won't receive. You should have received your 2nd quarter pledge statement, if you didn't, please contact me.

I encourage everyone to support the Music Committee by attending the "**February Frolic**" fundraiser on Saturday, February 9th at 2 p.m. This fundraising effort will raise funds for our church and the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry.

Maine Unitarian Universalist State Action Network Takes Shape

“Our UU State Advocacy Networks are powerful agents for justice. They stand strongly for the values of our faith and are an essential component to the UUA’s national efforts. I ask UUA leaders and UUs in the pews, to collaborate with State Advocacy Networks and seek new partnerships. The grassroots efforts of congregation, clusters and state advocacy networks can have dramatic impact. As UUs work on the issues of the day in their own communities, meeting their legislators, and neighbors, and UUs from across their state, their experience of the faith deepens and changes. Sometimes the world changes too. I make time to support UU State Advocacy Networks as UUA President, and I hope all UUs join me in supporting them as an integral part of our faith movement.”

Along with UUs, both laypeople and clergy, from 14 churches across Maine, Karen Volckhausen and I attended the third gathering of the newly formed MUUSAN. We learned that UU State Action Networks were started in 2006, spreading across the country and working together for social justice. A Steering Committee of ten guides the activity of the MUUSAN. UUCE is fortunate that David Wilcock has been asked and has agreed that he will serve as a Steering Committee member. He was unable to attend this meeting, however, since he was in Ghana. Currently, MUUSAN has chosen to focus its work on three areas: Revitalizing American Democracy, Healthcare, and Climate Change. All three groups are swinging into action quickly as they focus on issues coming before the Maine Legislature and aligning with existing coalitions such as Maine Equal Justice's "Health Care for Maine" and "Citizens Unite Against Citizens United" led by Maine Citizens for Clean Elections. Granted, there are other pressing issues before this state and nation in which a UU voice is needed, but narrowing the focus makes our impact more certain.

There was much general conversation about how powerful our voices are when we represent ourselves as religious, justice seeking people. I hope there are others in UUCE who will be as interested in this work as Karen, David and I are and who will join with us in this effort. Please step forward.

Charlie Bassett's Memorial Service

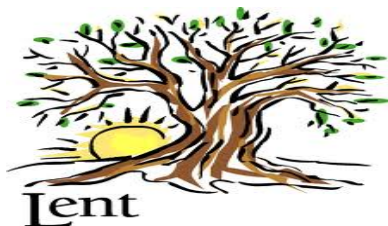
Saturday, May 4, 2013 at 10am at UUCE
