Unexpected Grace

As I write this, the Washington, D.C. Council has just passed marriage equality. Not by some tiny little margin, but 11-2. That means a margin of victory over 80%. Our legislature passed it. The Vermont and New Hampshire legislatures passed it. The prophetic voice of our elected leaders is rising. And in that rise, especially in states where the controversy is high, we are seeing examples of what it is to lead.

Leadership is tricky, edgy business, shot through with adrenaline and risk. There's no way to know when you take a stand how your constituents are actually going to respond. You can guess. You can poll. But in the end, people can get scared or change their minds or be cranky. Leaders can be perceived as being pushy or out of touch when they take a controversial stand. But the fact is, we need leaders so people can follow them. In every arena there are some people who are so passionate that they are willing to do anything, including stick their necks out, to help things be better. They will sing, dance, talk to people, write letters, learn new skills, go way, way outside their comfort zone, so that something really important can happen. And those people are on the cutting edge so that everyone else can know they are not alone, so that everyone else can open their minds, so that everyone else can take a chance and feel safe about it. When leaders stand up, they create space, a wake in which others can follow.

The UU Church of Ellsworth is in a position to lead. We have talent, we have wisdom, we have strength, we have the capacity for dedication when the cause is important and real. We led in the No on 1 Campaign and our presence in the community feels different now. We have more people who know who we are and more people who know what we stand for. As we move into this new year and new decade, leadership is needed. How shall we serve our community? How shall we lead?

Call to Participate in UUA Decisions on Social Witness

Some of you have attended a General Assembly (GA) of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and have shared in the excitement of participating in the decision making process there, together with congregants from all over the world. This winter you can participate in GA affairs right here at UUCE. The UUA calls on all congregations to participate in a number of social witness decisions in the next few months. We will hold a congregational meeting in January 2010 to discuss the issues involved and to vote on the following questions:

1. Do you approve placing the Draft Statement of Conscience (SOC) on "[Peacemaking](#)" on the Final Agenda for General Assembly (GA) 2010?
2. Which five of the following six proposed Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs) do you recommend be placed on the Final Agenda of General Assembly 2010?
 - [Ending Slavery](#)
 - [Energy, Peace, and Justice](#)
 - [Immigration as a Moral Issue](#)
 - [National Economic Reform: A Moral Imperative](#)
 - [Nuclear Disarmament](#)
 - [Revitalizing American Democracy](#)

Message from the President

New Year, New Approach

Before I tell you about what your Board of Trustees is embarking upon, I need to mention something personal first. Many of you are aware that I have made a big change in my personal life. After twenty-one years of a child and community focus, I have returned to the work-world, as the new Director of the Jesup Memorial Library in Bar Harbor. I hadn't really thought about going back to work, but the opportunity to be a librarian again and in the town I have lived in and loved for sixteen years was just too compelling. So, that forty hours a week I'm now at the library is forcing some changes in how I have been doing things. Please bear with me as I may appear a little less attentive for a while as I adjust. I don't love you any less; I'm just juggling my time.

Now, your Board is also making some changes. We had a great mini-retreat in November to review what we'd been reading and to develop an action plan. (Thanks very much to Evelyn Foster for the use of her space and hospitality!)

One of the first questions we confronted was: are we (the Board) leaders or caretakers? In other words, are we just sort of churning along and reacting to what is before us, or are we actively identifying what needs to be done and figuring out how to tackle it and move ahead? We concluded that we are trying to move from the caretaker to the leader role. One of the ways we could do better would be to set up some "portfolio clusters" (aka subcommittees) to examine these areas: "housekeeping," stewardship, outreach, and community building. Each group will meet and begin to line out some specific actions.

The second big question was both very complicated and at the same time easily answered. What is our "product?" What is it we hope to achieve by being a part of this church? The only answer that resonated with everyone was "spiritually mature." In an attempt to define what that actually means we each spent a few minutes reflecting ways we might begin to live this. Since everyone's definition was unique, all the methods and practices were individual, but were very thoughtful reflections.

The last big idea we addressed was the essential elements of a Covenant of Leadership. This is beyond a group covenant of how we will work together; it gets to the fundamental basis of how we will be your leaders.

We agreed we need to be leading the congregation *somewhere*; we will develop spiritual discipline; we will read; we will give (see also the Not There Yet section); we will nurture younger leaders; we will adapt to rapid change; we can't please everyone; we will consider how other traditions live their faith; we will say "yes;" and, we will reach out without losing the focus on ourselves. We also decided that we were not all to the point of agreeing that this will be our primary volunteer commitment; that we will give at a specific higher percentage; that we will take risks; and, that we are in a state of abundance not scarcity.

Our Action Plan for the next four months will solidify our Covenant of Leadership, will make us develop our own credos and share them with the congregation (a little scary for some of us), and will move us forward in identifying our mutual ministry. We will work through our portfolio clusters to initiate some specific actions to bring the congregation along the path we have taken. We identified a particular need to work with the young adults among us to encourage their movement into our leadership ranks.

We have set out a very ambitious plan. We will accomplish as much as possible, understanding that perhaps everything will not work exactly as we might have initially expected but that we will all be better off for our work together. Thank you very much for your support of the Board through this process.
