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## Unexpected Grace

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This church is positively hopping. Any day, any time, you might show up here and find the parking lot full, the building busy. It's good stuff: everything from twelve step groups, community meetings to violin lessons--and that's just the rentals. Rentals are good for us in a number of ways: they help us become better known in the community, they bring new people through our doors, they can be a way for us to support something we believe in, and they help us pay for the cost of having a building. It's all good. But even better, rentals are a smaller and smaller fraction of our building use--because we are using the building for our own programming, too. We're also recognizing that not all our programming needs to happen in the building. There's now a traveling UU kids playdate, a number of Touchstone Circles, the four continuing small groups programs, and, best of all, a wonderful developing habit of...fun.

Last month at the Mardi Gras celebration there were dancers and singers, Cathy-with-a-C on keyboard, stories and sea shanties and balloons and fantastic food, and people, people everywhere. We raised \$1000, which we will split with Loaves and Fishes, but as good as the money was the party itself. We like each other. And what happened among us was that thing that Henry Nelson Wieman called "creative interchange": when a group of people gather for creative common good and something ineffable, indescribable, possibly divine emerges.

This community does that very well. The love and care and affection and pleasure here is palpable when we are enjoying one another. And that is one of our best sides. The more we practice, the more we do it, and the more we do it in public, the more it becomes part of who we are, of how we understand ourselves, and of how we are known. And the better known we are for the best things we do, the more we and others expect it of us, and the easier it becomes to do it again. And again.

Coming to church should be fun. When it's something we love to do, something we enjoy, something we look forward to, then it shows. And when people have fun and good connections and community, that's when they engage. That's when

they trust. And that's when the deeper spiritual engagement begins. We need volunteers. We need board members. We need pledges. But all of that rises from and supports the work of the church: which is community and spiritual deepening and outreach.

We're doing well. The fun is not superfluous. I've said it before: people are pleasure-driven. Let's enjoy it. What would set you afire?

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On behalf of the UUCE, the Peace and Social Action Committee unanimously approved the **Ethical Eating** Draft CSAI for the UUA and will consider how our various activities tie in.

Peggy Strong, Karen Volkhausen, and Martha Dickinson, members of this congregation, recently participated in the **MOFGA delegation to El Salvador**. They visited small farms, coffee processing and fruit drying facilities, took part in community educational workshops and meetings, and got to know some wonderful people in the region around Carasque, which is Bangor's sister city. We hope to host a public program once Karen returns to Maine.

The 5<sup>th</sup> Annual **End Mountaintop Removal Week** will be held in Washington, D. C. the second week in March. We will collect signatures on a petition for Martha to hand to our congressional delegation during this intensive lobbying and educational effort. PASA endorses this effort.

We agreed to co-sponsor the March 20 teach-in at UU Church in Bangor on "**Bring Our War Dollars Home — The impact of the war in Afghanistan**". 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## Treasurer's Corner

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The Mardi Gras Dinner and Variety Show sponsored by the Music Committee in February, raised \$1,010. This brought the total of our fundraising for this church year to \$3,205. This leaves us with \$1,715 more to reach our budget goal of \$5,000. Our challenge will be to plan one or two more events to raise the additional funds.

From the Mardi Gras event, Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry will receive \$505.00, bringing our total raised for charitable organizations to \$4,704.87. Thank you for supporting this effort.

In reviewing our pledges, we have a total of eighty pledging units. Nineteen of these pledging units are nonmembers pledging \$14,150 to the canvass campaign and averaging \$744.73 per pledging unit. Thank you for your support.

Speaking about pledges, it is that time of year when we need to start thinking about what we plan to pledge to the church for this coming church year. If you recall, we had difficulty balancing our budget last year and we will need to raise more funds if we are going to avoid a similar situation again this year. You are probably tired of me always talking about money, but, as treasurer, what else do I have to talk about?

In January, four additional individuals paid their pledges in full bringing the total of pledges paid in full to \$21,830. This has definitely improved our cash flow. We have approximately a \$15,000 balance in our checking account which should carry us through the end of March, barring no unexpected expenses. Plate is running 21.49% behind budget or \$1,720.00. Rental is running 10.20% behind budget or \$714.00. Expenses continue to be in line running 53.21% of budget or \$5,475 under budget. Several committees have spent very little of their budget to date. We budgeted \$4,000 for shortfall this church year. Shortfall projection at this time is \$10,922.00. This would leave us with an additional \$6,922 in estimated shortfall. I continue to hope that the figure projected will be less than estimated for shortfall. Only time will tell. As of the end of January, financial figures are positive. The fourth quarter which begins in April will be the time to watch carefully. We have several large expenditures to pay.

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## From The Board

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Present: Ruth Eveland, President; Diana Cate, Vice-President; Don Martin, Treasurer; Eileen Brennan, Anne Ossanna, Cynthia Perkins, and Judy Rothrock. [Secretary Karen Volkhausen is doing her annual work in El Salvador.] Also attending: Bob Dickens.

Housekeeping. Diana reported on behalf of the Furnace Committee about our options for the replacement of our boiler. No decision is yet obvious; more research needs to be done and further reports will be forthcoming. As was supported at the winter Parish Meeting, Bob requested that we proceed immediately with the installation of a stove hood for the kitchen at a cost of \$6,800. The people who will construct and install it are more easily available at this time of year, and we are planning a number of activities soon that will make it necessary that we have this protection. The Board agreed to: apply to the Chalice Lighters program to help fund this work; authorize Bob to proceed with making the arrangements for its installation; and, authorize Don to make a drawdown from the MCF fund to pay for it with those funds to be replaced when other support is obtained. The bottom line is that this work is necessary to maintain our insurance.

The Leadership Development Committee requested that the Board approve its recommendation that our annual canvass be conducted with a bean supper (with homemade pies!). Since no one has stepped forward to organize this event, the LDC requested that our minister, Leela Sinha, be authorized as a co-coordinator with a lay leader yet to be named. There was a very thorough discussion of the pros and cons of this plan, and the Board finally agreed to support the LDC's recommendation.

There were a number of announcements from the NNED. Ruth urged people to try to attend the annual meeting to be held April 30th – May 1<sup>st</sup> in North Conway, NH. She heard the keynote speaker when you sent her to General Assembly and he was very impressive, talking about how they grew their congregation through what they called “Nurturing Relational Curiosity.” Also, Judy reported that the Elections Committee would like to add a youth

member to the slate if possible; the Board was very open to this possibility. There was some clarification about the process we will be using on March 15<sup>th</sup> for our all-day ministry evaluation meeting.

The Treasurer's report is included elsewhere in this issue.

The minister was on vacation and the DLREE was speaking on a panel at the University of Maine, representing our UU perspective.

Future. We agreed that our meeting in March will focus on the work of our portfolio clusters, particularly on the recommendations from the Stewardship, Outreach and Community Building groups. We will use this work to make a final recommendation to the Parish at the annual meeting in the spring about future direction for our congregation.
