From the UUCE Board

Summary of August Board meeting. All board members were present

Reports:

Finances: Board President David Wilcock and Vice Pres. John Fink will move ahead with design plans for the storage space renovation, which will take place later in the fall. This item was a holdover from last year's board priorities.

Treasurer: Don Martin reported the church finished the year \$5K in the black. There are sufficient funds to do the renovations to the storage space.

Fundraising: Lobster bake (Aug. 16) ticket sales were going well; the yardsale (Sept. 6) is moving along with donations and people signing up to help; no report on the auction (Anne O, chair, was not at the meeting.)

Loaves and Fishes Lease: L & F needs a statement assuring that their lease can be renewed when the current one expires in 2031. The board passed a unanimous motion to allow the President to add such a statement to the current lease.

Minister: The service trip to Guatemala was successful on many levels; however, only one youth from our church attended. Rev. Sara will be involved in planning with the other churches for a service trip to New Orleans in the spring whether or not anyone from our church participates. The board fully supports her involvement in this.

Rev. Sara will NOT be on vacation the week of Aug. 18 as previously announced.

RE Coordinator: Report was previously submitted and was accepted by the board.

Use of church by non-affiliated persons: A recent event at the church was advertised in the bulletin and weekly newsletter despite the fact that the performers were not affiliated with the church nor invited by any specific committee. The board felt that such events should not be advertised in church publications. P. Strong will draft language to limit insertion of such events in church publications.

Board Priorities Task Force: The task force reviewed the priorities list created after the board retreat in June and determined that nearly all items are currently being addressed in some way. One item remains to be addressed: disposal of items belonging to the church, especially those which may have some historical value to the church.

Other agenda items were postponed so the board could go into Executive Session to discuss the report on the evaluation of the RE Coordinator.

Treasurer's Corner



July is the first month of the church year and we are off to a good start. I hope we can keep it up! We have a large overall budget this of \$146,835.00 and personnel expenses of \$94,895.00 that we are responsible for and was approved by the congregation.

Total Income for July 2014 was \$22,277.37. This was high as it included \$9,945.00 prepaid Pledges. It was \$14,664.51 more than the total expenses for the month, which were \$7,632.86. Total income was 15.7% of budget which was 7.7% more than the year-to-date percentage of 8%.

Total Expenses for July was \$7,632.86, 5.2% of budget, which is 2.8% less than the year-to-date figure of 8%

Pledge Income for July was \$19,658.08 or 18.05% of budget which is 10.05% more than the year-to-date figure of 8%.

Plate Income for July was \$926.53 or 9.55% of budget. Plate income-church for July was \$730.18 or 9.13% of budget. Plate income – plate split charity for July was \$195.95 or 11.53% of budget.

Total Fundraising is at \$50, which is 1% of the Auction budget of \$5,000.

Rental Income for the month was \$1,641 or 17.55% of budget. Rental income – other, was \$641.00 or 10.68% of budgeted amount of \$6,000.

Expenses for July were \$7632.86 or 5.2% of budgeted figure of \$146,835.00.

It is too early in the year to calculate where we stand. I believe things are positive.

Update on the 5th Annual Lobster Bake

Despite a slight drop off in ticket sales. The Lobster Bake was very successful. We sold 47 tickets and everyone who came said they had a good time – no returns requested.

Hannaford Card Sales - Update



Did you notice the new chairs in the entryway? Hannaford card sales provided one of them and the Aesthetic Committee the second one.

Please note that they may not stay where they are as plans are eventually to create a sitting area in the hallway outside the administrator's office.

One \$200 card purchase brings us a cool \$10.00 profit (5%) to save for the future. We've been averaging approximately \$1000 in sales each week. That translates into \$50 a week profit for the UU. Doing the math, one of those lovely chairs represents 8 and a half weeks of sales, two chairs equals 17 weeks, or almost 4 months of sales. We're committed to a LONG slow slog toward renovations that will cost thousands. And we are *in need of renovations*...did you notice our front door has loose

boards and note the faded exterior entryway? The outdoor lights are more or less just bulbs showing...we want to change these and several internal things.

Although we are not doing badly for a congregation this size, and your participation rate is steady, we hope to do better as time goes on. Still we may have to ask the Board to consider a Capital Fund Raising Drive at some point as 4 or 5 YEARS of selling Gift Cards is daunting and may be considered too long to wait.

But again, Thank You ALL for your ongoing participation in this effort.

Cover were removed from the baseboard and heaters cleaned, this will eliminate odor and improve heating output.

The carpet was steamed cleaned; the same process was done to the front entrance. I supervised all the work and was satisfied with the work done. I want to thank Dan Wheatly, John Fink, Nate, Lilja and Winslow Hanson, Jill McDonald, and Rev. Sara who removed and put back all the furniture and fixtures in the sanctuary and front hall. I hope this effort will make a better and cleaner church experience.

The YMCA is moving!

The YMCA will be ending their arrangements with the church on August 29th. As the Board member who has been responsible for coordinating the lease arrangements, I want to tell you that it went very well. A special thanks to Anne Ossanna, our R.E. Coordinator, who worked very hard to make this successful. I also want to thank the congregation and committees who adjusted their schedules and meeting places so that our R.E. wing would be available for the YMCA use. Despite having less space for rent, we exceeded our rental budget (not including the YMCA) of \$5,500.00 by \$1,068.00 to \$6,568.00. Our Administrator, Alison Stephens' efforts were responsible for making this all happen. It was very successful financially for this church to rent to the YMCA, as we took in an additional \$14,000.00 in rental fees. Thank you for your patience and cooperation.
