Glorious Summer Greetings from the Carl Stehman Wing!

I am writing this article having just arrived home from our Annual Church Picnic at Lamoine Beach. What a glorious time we had! People of all ages playing together, sharing food together, and getting to know each other better. As I enter into my fifth year as your RE Coordinator, I remain humbled and grateful to our congregation for the love and care you give our children. Thank you!

Hogwarts Downeast School of Witchcraft, Wizardry and UU Promises is in full swing. In July we explored our UU Promises with the help of Harry Potter and some Visiting Professors. We focused on our first promise of *Each Person Is Important* with a Sorting Ceremony with Mac MacDonald and Kathy Button. Lisa and Pepper led Fire and Ice Charms, and Robin Lovrien led OWL Posts, which explored our second promise to *Be Kind in All You Do*. Our third promise, *We Are Free to Learn Together*, was explored by Helen Kazura and Cecily Judd through their lesson: Defense Against the Dark Arts. Through Quidditch, Michael and Nathalie Arruda guided the children to explore our fourth promise, *We Are Free to Search for What Is True*. Thank you to all of our Visiting Professors in July and to Eryn, Mikayla, and Lynn Marie.

CHANGE FOR GOOD: In July the children brought in their coins for our Global Social Action Project, the CHANGE FOR GOOD Kiva Project, which has been endorsed by the Religious Education, Green Team, and PASA committees at UUCE and by our Board of Trustees. At this time, the children have given about \$15 in pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters to give a microloan through Kiva. Kiva is a nonprofit organization that is a clearinghouse for world citizens to provide interest-free microloans in the amount of \$25 to other world citizens who are seeking to better their lives by starting/expanding their business, furthering their education, and improving their living conditions. Kiva currently has a 98% repayment record on the loans it facilitates. Our monthly theme for August is *Generosity*, and during the August 7th Time for All Ages, you will learn more about Kiva, the impact of microloans, and our Global Social Action Project, in which we will partner with the Green Team and PASA during our October Faith in Action Project. At that time, the children will take a special collection, asking the congregation to match their contributions of coins collected in July. Please note: This collection is a separate effort and will not replace our weekly offering. **Adults, start saving your coins for the special collection on August 7. Our goal is to raise \$100 and provide four microloans through Kiva, with members of our Green Team and PASA guiding us during our fall Faith in Action Sunday.** What a wonderful opportunity for our children to experience faith in action, public witness, and how together we can be generous and empower people.

The Religious Education Committee is working faithfully on our 2016-2017 offerings. We are so delighted with our Soul Matters curriculum, which will mirror the monthly themes of Sunday worship. In an effort for better communication we will be creating a closed Facebook group for RE parents and friends within the next few weeks. The purpose of this group is to share information related to RE at UUCE (upcoming lessons and take-it-home ideas), share UUA RE-related articles, and promote discussion and support among our parents. We are looking for guides to explore prepared lessons with our children, mentors for our Tweens and the Coming of Age curriculum, and more RE Committee members.

SAVE the DATE: OCTOBER 2—Faith in Action Sunday. We will make our Kiva loans and then explore hunger in Maine and learn about the Hunger Crop Walk. More information to come, but start thinking about pledges and walking one mile in Ellsworth after potluck.

Our Place in the Web of Life: An Introduction to Environmental Justice



This course curriculum consists of five units, each of which takes about two hours to complete. Designed using the best practices of “transformative learning,” the curriculum promotes a type of learning that is not just about acquiring new knowledge, but has the potential to shift the way people think, act and feel. It invites analysis and emotional and spiritual reflection. It poses ethical questions and requires participants to move beyond simply acquiring more information toward wrestling deeply with considerations of real impact and congregational accountability. For example, in one unit we will be mapping all the people, plants, and animals near and far that are touched by our actions as a congregation. We will also examine some of the environmental, economic, and social injustices we are a part of, and perhaps some of the justice-making we are or could be a part of.

Sankofa Corner

by UUCE Historian Wayne H. Smith

Rev. Reuel Williams Beach Minister of the Ellsworth Unitarian Church 1946-1952

Rev. Reuel Williams Beach was born on Oct. 9, 1884, in Dedham, MA, the son of Rev. Seth Curtis Beach (1837-1932), a Unitarian minister in Augusta and Bangor, ME, and also in Dedham and Wayland, MA, who wrote the hymn "Mysterious Presence, Source of All" in 1866. He was also the grandson of Rev. Sylvester Judd, another well-known Unitarian minister.

In 1906, he received his BA degree at Harvard University but also took courses at Boston University's School of Theology and the Harvard Divinity School. From 1904 to 1942 he was engaged in the printing business at University Press in Cambridge, MA, starting as a typesetter at a weekly wage of \$5. Years later he left University Press as vice-president and director and became president of Cosmos Press, Cambridge, Mass.

He married his wife, Ruth Stetson, on Nov. 19, 1909. During World War I he was a corporal in Company M, 12th Regiment of the Massachusetts State Guard. Later, in World War II, he was an Executive in Office of Aide for Information in the First Naval District. Also during WWII, based on his many years of experience as a lay reader, church school teacher and superintendent, standing committee member, choir singer, etc., he offered his services to both the Unitarian and Congregational headquarters in Boston as a lay interim preacher, to fill any vacancy where a pastor was needed. This was during the period of WWII when many churches were in need of pastors, as many ministers has entered the armed forces as chaplains. The Congregational headquarters accepted his services, and he became interim minister at East Weymouth, MA. He was ordained into the ministry in October 1942 at East Weymouth Congregational Church by "half & half Unitarian and Congregational ministers." He served as an interim there from 1942 to 1946.

Rev. Beach came to the Unitarian church at Ellsworth, where he served as minister for six years, from November 6, 1946, to September 1, 1952. He was formally installed at a ceremony on January 15, 1947. Throughout 1948, he conducted weekly worship services at the Hancock County Jail and also worked successfully with chronic alcoholics, both in cooperation with AA and independently. He lived at Hancock Point. In 1947, he received a Bachelor of Sacred Theology degree from Boston University's School of Theology, and in 1951 he was granted Final Certificate of Fellowship by the American Unitarian Association.

Following his work at the Ellsworth church, he divided his time between serving as chaplain at the Bangor State Hospital and the Eastern Maine General Hospital, but by 1954 he had left Maine to attend the University of Southern California for a Master's in Theology. Among the activities he pursued while in California were a Master's in Religious Science from Institute of Religious Science in 1954, working as a



psychological counselor at the Pasadena Presbyterian Church in 1956, and attaining a Ps.D. and D.D. at College of Metaphysics in 1958.

A few years later, Rev. Beach wrote: "As a retired clergyman, aged 77, my activities are almost all in the past." At one time he had been a member of the Cambridge Club, the Economy Club, Rotary Clubs in Bangor and Cambridge, the Dramatics Club, and the Social Union. He had served as director of the Cambridge YMCA, was a member of the Executive Council of the Boy Scouts, and a trustee of the Avon Home for destitute children of Cambridge, Masonic bodies, etc. He considered himself a theist.

About his preaching style, one of his former professors, Rev. Charles E. Park, once recommended him in the following words:

He was in my preaching class for a whole year, and it was a delight to have him. His preaching was perfectly lucid in straightforward simplicity, vivid presentation, and consequential thinking. He talks the language of the common man, and somehow he manages to say just what he means in a most refreshing way. . . . I have always been exhilarated by the thought of his going into the ministry, for I think he will raise the index of our professional self-consecration, as well as the standard of simple, straight-from-the-shoulder, worthwhile preaching. Don't let him get away. His views are influenced more by a deep feeling of reverence than by any sort of theological dialectics; yet he belongs with us. He is a conservative Unitarian, by family background as well as by personal inclination.

Rev. Beach died on Jan. 24, 1964, in Pittsburgh, PA, at the age of 79, leaving two children: Rev. Curtis Beach (b. 1914) who was associated with the Neighborhood Church in Pasadena, CA, and Barbara Beach Atherton (b. 1917), who was associated with the Arlington Street Church, Boston.

We here at UUCE still have a connection to Rev. Beach in our midst. Our own Cecily Judd is a fourth cousin twice removed of Rev. Beach. Her connection is shown below:
