RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

The Religious Education Committee is pleased to announce that 4 R.E. Classes will begin on Sunday, January 8th, from 10:45 to 11:45 am. The classes and leaders will be as follows:

HOW MIRACLES ABOUND (Ages 3-5)- Joni Fitzgerald and Kay Hanson (Kay will teach from March to June.)

In this curriculum, miracles are explored; such as the miracle that all creatures have a place in nature, the miracles of the cycles of life; the miracle of our body, etc. Each miracle has a corresponding UUA principle; such as "We care about our universe", "We help take care of our world." The children will be involved with a lot of arts, crafts, music, and movement that will help them experience the uniqueness of our hands, the place of snails in nature, how winter affects us, et al.

EXPERIENCES WITH LIVING THINGS (Ages 6-8)- Charlie Schelling and Ellen Hatch

Stories, songs and experiences such as becoming an earthworm are offered in this curriculum. Much like "How Miracles Abound", this will offer our 6-8 year olds ways in which to begin to connect themselves to basic UU values, using the medium of the natural world.

"EXPLORING UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM" (Ages 9-11)- Nancy Guy and Charlie Lerner

The heritage of the UU Church of Ellsworth, exploring the music of Malvina Reynolds, finding out about what Unitarian Universalists think about Jesus, God, and the Bible are all on the menu of this curriculum, one that is geared to helping our 9-11 year olds discover what it means to them to be a Unitarian Universalist.


"WORLD RELIGIONS" (Ages 12-14)- Sandy Phoenix and Kate Morse

CHILDREN'S CHAPEL BEGINS JANUARY 29th— As many of you know, the congregation of children in our church has been sharing the first part of our services every Sunday since September. By doing this, we have had the opportunity of being together as a whole community and sharing the experience of worship together for a time. This has also provided an education and a challenge to your ministers— both intern and seasoned— about how to facilitate intergenerational worship! LIFESPAN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION BREWING!— Beginning weekly on Monday night, February 13, from 7-9pm, a range of Adult Religious Education experiences will be offered. "Lifespan R.E. Night will include 3 main dishes on the menu. Courses will begin at 7 pm; at 8 pm all three groups will break for refreshments, returning to the individual groups from 8:15 to 9 pm.

(1) "HOW CAN I HELP?", an 8-session program will be offered by Kathleen Allan, based on the book, How Can I Help? Reflections on Service by Ram Dass and Paul Gorman, which explores the personal side of service to others. CHARLES' COMMENTARY- THE PLIGHT OF TRANSYLVANIA- 1988

Because of his progressive Unitarian faith, Francis David died a martyr's death in 1579. In 1858 the first English Unitarian minister, Rev. E. Tagart, visited Transylvania. He bought a gift of 2000 pounds to help the Unitarians, then persecuted by the Austrians. In 1926, Frederick Weis, an Amerian Unitarian minister (father of Virginia Bourne of Castine) visited and interviewed many Transylvanians and wrote, "The future of Unitarian Christianity in Transylvania hangs in the balance. Every day the Romanian government, by unjust laws and misused power, causes the issue to become more doubtful."

Unitarians in Transylvania once again suffer the threat of increased oppression. The plight of the liberal religious men and women I talked with and shared hospitality with last year, during my sabbatical, is precarious. The Ceausescu government of Romania wishes to fully "Romanianize" Transylvania. They wish to neutralize the entire Hungarian-speaking minority, including not only Unitarians, but also Lutherans, Calvinists and Roman Catholics.

Some 8000 villages and cities are scheduled for destruction. This is a destruction not only of buildings, but of people and their way of life. They are to be moved to large, concrete, high-rise agroindustrial centers. The Romanian claim is that this is planned in order to enhance agricultural production.

Many Transylvanians are not waiting to see what happens. 10,000 have already sought refuge in Hungary, Yugoslavia, and the Soviet Union. I think of Bishop Kovac, and Michael, Fulop, Sandor and other Unitarian ministers I met, the villages and churches we visited, and I feel a chill. If I were to return, even next summer, would they still be there? Would their churches or villages remain standing?

The United States, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom, Canada, and many others signed the Treaty of Paris giving control over Transylvania to Romania. In that treaty, Romania agreed to respect the Transylvanians without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion. That commitment has never been kept. Now it looks as though it will be totally forgotten, unless we do something about it. The Romanian plans violate not only the Treaty of Paris, but the Helsinki Accords and the United Nations Treaty outlawing genocide.

Our UUA president, Bill Schulz, wrote that he was "...in the process of approaching the top leadership of the Presbyterian, Lutheran, and Roman Catholic churches with the request that they join me in seeking appointments with the ambassadors and other appropriate officials of the signatory powers of the 1947 Paris Peace Treaty. ...We will make a similar direct approach to Romania itself..."

The UUA is also asking the United Nations to undertake an investigation of Romanias's treatment of her minority populations, and is attempting to get permission from Romania for a small delegation of UU's to visit our churches in Transylvania next spring.

SOME OF THE THINGS YOU CAN DO RIGHT NOW:

- (1) Write the American Secretary of State urging that the U.S. government begin consultations at once with the other signatories of the 1947 Paris Peace Treaty in order to persuade Romania to cease its abrogation of the treaty.
- (2) Write the American Ambassador to the United Nations with the request that this situation be referred to the UN Commission on Human Rights and that a UN investigation be undertaken of Romania's treatment of minorities.
- (3) Send financial support for the Transylvanian refugees in Hungary to our church, payable to our church, and we will transfer the funds to the International Association for Religious Freedom, which is distributing contributions.
- (4) Possibly plan to be part of the IARF Congress in 1990, meeting in Hamburg, West Germany, Aug. 2-11. And then join in the tour of East Berlin, Budapest, and Transylvania. More information about that will be available soon.
