

MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE OFF TO A GREAT START

Janet Quirk, who was elected chairman of the Search Committee, tells us that there have been three meetings thus far, alternating between Ellsworth and Castine. They have been making excellent progress, and questionaires will be going out to both congregations in September. Janet is really pleased with the marvelous cooperation between the representatives of our two churches. THE RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COMMITTEE has been meeting through the summer. Tentative curriculums have been identified. However, because of a need for more information on children planning to attend this fall, and the shortage of teachers, it has been decided not to start classes until we can hold a **meeting with all parents on Sept. 17**, right after the Sunday service. Child care will be offered on Sunday, Sept. 10 and Sunday, Sept. 17, during the <u>regular</u> service.

At this time there is also a need for regular care for infants throughout the year. During the last few years we have been very fortunate to have a regular member volunteer for the majority of the Sunday services. This is no longer the case, and input from parents of very young children would be appreciated so that a satisfactory solution can be found.

TOUGH TALK FROM OUR TREASURER—Reimbursements to our church for UUA/NED (Unitarian Universalist Association/ Northeast District [Maine, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia]) annual membership assessments have been quite slow coming in, and I wanted to take a moment to remind you and also explain the process.

Each church is assessed \$20 by UUA and \$4 by NED per member. Our church has already paid \$2,300 to UUA and \$460 to NED. Last fall our budget committee decided to ask as many people as possible to reimburse our treasury for that amount. It was voted on, and approved, at our fall parish meeting to handle this matter this way. This amount is over and above your yearly pledge.
