

By the time this newsletter is in your hands, it is likely that we will already be at war with Iraq. President Bush has said that if the U.N. won't act, he will lead "a coalition of the willing." When this was written on March 17, that coalition included probably three countries willing to commit troops to battle: the United States, Great Britain and Australia. This is a far cry from 1991, when Mr. Bush's father gained U.N. support, many nations were willing to commit troops, and others were willing to pay for the war.

Just as the world is divided about whether to launch a war or let the inspections work, our nation has been divided as well. Honest, intelligent, patriotic Americans can be found on both sides of the debate. Both sides agree that Saddam is a murderous dictator. Both sides agree that he should be disarmed; yet we disagree on the prudence and necessity of a preemptive war.

In a democracy, the highest political office is not that of president, but of citizen. It is the patriotic duty of citizens to let their public servants know when they are not doing a good job.

The National Council of Churches, the Maine Council of Churches, the Unitarian Universalist Association and Bush's own United Methodist Church have stated their opposition to war, but have not been able to get a hearing with Mr. Bush. Although Bush is a "born again" Christian, he does not seem interested in hearing the views of religious leaders who are not part of his core constituency. Moderate and liberal religious leaders have legitimate concerns regarding the geopolitical scene and the American soul.

Bush speaks frequently about God, usually with the implication that God is on the side of building an American empire. He often quotes the words of Jesus to draw neat lines and challenge the whole rest of the world: if you are not with us, you are against us. (Jesus said this in Matthew 12:30, but also said the opposite in Mark 9:40.) Jesus, however, was not a supporter of empires and emperors.

Writing recently in Newsweek, Martin Marty, a former seminary professor of mine, expressed his concerns about whether Bush has the humility to see the nuance of this conflict. Religious statements from Bush frequently cause concern among our European and Asian allies and anger in the Islamic world, as when Bush called for a "crusade" against terrorism. Sometimes the company the president keeps gets him in trouble, as when the evangelist who prayed at Bush's Inaugural called Islam "a very evil and wicked religion." Bush seems unconcerned that the demonization of his adversaries – an" us and them" mentality – can inhibit self-examination and repentant action, critical components of any faith.

Bush has stated that "our nation is chosen by God and commissioned by history to be a model of justice." To many, such statements do not reflect the humility in foreign policy that Bush advocated during the presidential campaign. He would do better to echo the words of Abraham Lincoln, who called Americans an "almost chosen people." Twice in the twentieth century German soldiers marched to war with "God is with us" written on their belt buckles. Mr. Bush would do well to consider the possibility that there is a danger in such hubris.

CASH FOR EMPTY CARTRIDGES

Our church has enrolled in the "InkBank" program, which collects and pays for empty printer cartridges--both ink jet and laser. So please stop throwing your "expired" cartridges in the trash. Bring them to church and deposit them in the box available in the Community Room or hallway leading to it. The box will soon be one supplied by InkBank, but for now is "home made."

All brands are acceptable except Epson, or any cartridge that has previously been re-inked or repaired.

There is no expense to us; InkBank will collect the cartridges from time to time when we notify their regional representative to come and pick them up. Most ink jets will earn from \$1 to \$3 for us; most laser cartridges up to \$14 each.

The added bonus: InkJet refills and resells the cartridges, which means fewer useless plastic cartridges in our local trash. And, we can all ask friends and neighbors to save their "empties" for us, too.


