


#### HOSPITALITY MINISTRY




# Crossing the Threshold: Entering Intentionally Into This New Year

# THOUGHTS FROM THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Here we are at Thanksgiving time quickly rolling into December and wondering when that first big snow is on the way. You see, our slogan for 2020 is *Fuel Our Flame*. Think about all the ways we all "fuel" our ministries through our efforts,

including working on committees, participating in fundraisers, or even giving extra in the plate split on first Sundays. We love the logo design for this next campaign and thank the artistic talent of Lisa Williams for developing it.

We on the Stewardship Committee realize that so much is done year-round to support the ministries of our church. "Don't you guys do the Pledge Drive?" you ask. Well, yes, we do, but that's ahead of us in the spring. From time to time we would like to share information about the efforts of others.

Rev. Sara and Nancy Guy carefully consider local agencies helping others that need our financial support in the first-Sunday plate split. Nancy describes the agency for that quarter of the year in the NUUS. Plate-split contributions are collected for



three consecutive first Sundays and then that total amount is sent to the particular agency. We have collected two first Sundays now for MUUSAN, the state advocacy group in our UU faith, for a total of \$255, with the December 1 plate split to be added to that! Thank you, everyone, for your kindness. It was a heartwarming story listening to Nancy describe the previous quarter's contribution given to the *neighbor4neighbor* fund in the amount of \$666. Nancy received a letter of thanks from the agency and was told that our check to them saved the day. The next plate-split agency starting on the first Sunday in January will be the Beth Wright Cancer Resource Center. Thank you, Nancy and Rev. Sara, for selecting local agencies so our support of others reaches into the community.

Let's stay informed. If you have questions about anything, we will try to help or will get the right person to speak with you. Our committee of seven includes Connie Bailey, Robin Lovrien, Stefanie Alley, Margaret Thurston, Evelyn Foster, Betty Massie, and myself.






# Message from Our Intern



# Rev. Arthur Herbert Coar's Years in Ellsworth: 1898-1902

Toward the close of the month of October 1898, Rev. Walter Reid Hunt resigned his pastorate to accept a call to the Unitarian Church at East Orange, New Jersey. His resignation was formally accepted at a parish meeting held at the close of service on Sunday, October 30.

The Society was unanimous in its desire that the church should not be closed for even one Sunday and the pulpit committee was instructed to enter into correspondence with Rev. S. A. Eliot, Secretary of the AUA, in regard to calling a pastor. The first two Sundays after Mr. Hunt's resignation had taken effect, we were fortunate in having Rev. H. W. Smith of Toronto, Canada, to occupy the pulpit and on Sunday, November 20, Rev. Arthur H. Coar of Cambridge, a recent graduate of the Harvard Divinity School, came to preach as a candidate on the recommendation of Rev. Mr. Eliot. At a parish meeting held on Tuesday evening, December 6, Mr. Coar was unanimously invited to become pastor for an indefinite period, his year to begin on November 20, the date of his first occupancy of the pulpit. In order to have as many clergymen as possible present at the ordination and installation of Mr. Coar, and in the hope that some of our former ministers could attend, it was thought best not to have the exercises take place until after Christmas and the date was fixed for Tuesday, January 17. A severe storm which prevailed in the morning kept away many expected guests from neighboring churches, but the sun shone brightly during the forenoon and except for our disappointment at the absence of our guests, everything passed off as well as could be desired. A collation was served in the vestry at noon at which the Society entertained out-of-town visitors and the pastors of all the churches in the city and their wives. At two o'clock, the services were held in the church at which every pastor in the city participated.

During the year, special attention was paid to the work of the Sunday School. In April, Mr. Coar formed a Confirmation Class for the young people of the church, and meetings were held in the vestry on Sunday evenings for studies in matters pertaining to Unitarian belief, and on Sunday, July 23, five members of the class formally united with the Society.

In the summer of 1899, in which our church was represented by Mr. Coar's participation and by delegates at a number of interesting events. The Hancock County Conference of Unitarian Churches met at Lamoine in July and held three sessions which were full of interest and inspiration to all who were present.

The fiscal year of 1899-1900 was one of prosperity in the church. The course of lessons in Old Testament History, used by all the classes except the Kindergarten, proved of unusual interest and the teachers' meetings held at the home of Mrs. Wiggin on Friday evenings were attended by many of the adult members of the Society and became one of the principal features of the church work. In connection with the work of the school, on Sunday evening, January 28, Rev. Mr. Coar gave a lecture on Palestine, illustrated by stereopticon views loaned by the Unitarian Sunday School Association.

The meeting of the Hancock County Conference of Unitarian Churches, which had become an event of great interest to liberals throughout the county, was held in West Gouldsboro on August 1-2 and was attended by forty members of the Society. From 1899 to 1902, Rev. Coar served as Secretary of the Hancock County Conference. The church was also represented at the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Unitarian Association in Boston last May by the pastor and two delegates, and at the meeting of the Maine State Conference held in Waterville October 9-11 by five delegates, including Rev. Mr. Coar.

During the 1900-1901 fiscal year, regular services were held every Sunday morning with the exception of the usual vacation in August and one Sunday when Mr. Coar had been unavoidably kept away by illness.

A union service in which all of the Protestant churches united was held in the Congregational Church on Thanksgiving Day, and other union services were held on the first Sunday evening of each month during the winter in which our church was represented by the participation of the pastor.

The Sunday School was reorganized at the Annual Meeting on the first Sunday in November with Rev. Coar being elected to serve as Superintendent.

The usual Christmas festival was held in the vestry on Christmas Eve under the direction of Mrs. B. C. Hodgkins, Mrs. Charles I. Welch, and Miss Elizabeth Belcher. An appropriate play was presented by the children of the Sunday School after which presents were distributed from the tree and refreshments of ice cream, cake, and candy were served. At the close of the festival, the older members of the School and of the parish withdrew to church where Mr. Coar gave an impressive talk on the significance of Christmas.

The event of most importance in the history of the church for the year was the tenth annual session of the Hancock County Conference, which was held in our church Thursday and Friday, August 1-2,1901. The church was represented at the anniversary May meetings in Boston by the pastor and two delegates and at the Maine State Conference at Eastport by the pastor.

There was preaching in the church every Sunday morning from the beginning of the fiscal year 1901-1902 until the second Sunday in September, with the exception of the annual vacation during August. A union service of all the Protestant churches was held on Thanksgiving Day 1901 in which Rev. Mr. Coar participated. There were also similar services on the first Sunday evening of each month when questions of civic interest were considered. During the winter and early spring, meetings were held on Sunday evenings at the Unitarian and Congregational churches alternately, the respective pastors preaching. The general subject of Mr. Coar's addresses was "Christian Ideals." The collection taken at these meetings was devoted to subscribing to magazines for the Public Reading Room.

The Society was represented at the anniversary May meetings in Boston by the pastor and three delegates; at the Maine State Conference in Yarmouth by the pastor; and at the Hancock County conference of Unitarian and other Christian Churches which met at Bar Harbor, July 30-31, 1902 by the pastor and thirty-five delegates and visitors.

At the Annual Meeting on the first Sunday in November, 1901, the Sunday School again elected Rev. Coar as Superintendent. The course of study was on the Life of Jesus and the work under Mr. Coar's direction was of unusual interest. The study class met regularly through the winter and enjoyed to the utmost a course of talks by Mr. Coar on Temperance, the Labor Problem, and Home Life, which were followed by discussions by the members of the Society.

It was with universal regret that the Society learned that Mr. Coar had tendered his resignation to the Pulpit Committee to take effect in three months or on the first of September, 1902. In his letter, which is preserved among the official records of the church, Mr. Coar expressed the warm regard which he felt for the people of this, his first, pastorate, his appreciation of the unity which had always existed between pastor and people, his hopes for the future prosperity of the church, and his deep regret that personal reasons made it best for him to resign. In August a parish meeting was held and Mr. Coar was asked to reconsider his resignation, but as he refused to do so, a committee was chosen to draft a set of resolutions which were adopted at a later meeting wherein was set forth the Society's appreciation of the earnest, conscientious work which Mr. Coar performed during his residence of nearly four years, not only for his own church but for the benefit of the community at large, and the regret which the Society felt at his resignation. The first Sunday in September, Mr. Coar returned from his new pastorate at Farmington, Maine, to reopen the church and the Sunday School for the ensuing season.

Writing in October 1902, the church Historian, Miss Mary Ann Greely, included the following paragraph in her history of the church:

Within the present month there has occurred an event of such interest to the Society and so closely connected with the history, past and present, of the church that it seems fitting that it should have mention in these pages, although strictly speaking it may not be a matter of church history. On the evening of October first, there took place in the First Unitarian church the wedding of Rev. Arthur Herbert Coar and Miss Elizabeth Lombard Wiggin, the only daughter of two of the most devoted members of the church in its earliest days. Herself a child of the church, she was baptized at this altar and christened with the name of the wife of an honored pastor and became one of the most faithful of the younger members of the church and a teacher in the Sunday School. To Mr. and Mrs. Coar go forth the best wishes of our Society at the threshold of their new life.
