# THE RECONCILIATION MUST BE TELEVISED

"There is no shame in entertainment intended to restore, heal, repair, reveal, reframe, to midwife."

We invite you to read the thoughtful and intriguing proposal by Wesley Morris in the New York Times calling for a televised truth and reconciliation commission in the United States. Upstander Project community members will be familiar with the idea that reconciliation is only aspirational without truth-telling and reparations. Morris argues: "Entertainment, here, would be a sobering virtue, catharsis rather than a loophole. There would be serious room made for spiritual address and cosmic redress; for acknowledgments of country and native land stewardship; for many nights of Native Americans reinserting themselves in the nation's narrative, troubling it, setting it right; for breath work and silence that assists us through the heft of this undertaking. There should be readings and dancing and photography and bands and orchestras. There would be a place, as well, for comedy, some of which would arise on its own, some of which might necessitate actual comedians. Laughter helps."


- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;

# REV. JOHN WILLIAM TICKLE, A.K.A. JOHN WESLEY HEYES (1886-1958), Part II

We have seen that Rev. Tickle went through a number of major changes in his life during the second decade of the 20th century. He changed his residence from Lancashire, England to Maine in 1913, he changed his faith from Methodism to Unitarianism in 1914, and he changed his name from John William Tickle to John Wesley Heyes in 1919. This was not the end of the changes he would be making in his life.

Although his family was still recorded as living in Ellsworth in the 1920 US Census, he had already left Maine in September of 1919 to take up a clerical position at the American Unitarian Association in Boston. It is not known how long he remained in this position, but by the end of 1920, he found himself in Rocky Mount, North Carolina where he "seemed impelled" to attend a church service at the Church of the Good Shepherd. During that service, "the impelling call came to him to seek orders in this Church." Soon after, on Feb. 5, 1921, both Rev. Heyes and his wife Agnes were confirmed by Bishop Darst in St. James' Church of Wilmington, NC, in the Diocese of East Carolina. He became "attached" to St. John's Church in Wilmington where he was under the spiritual guidance of the Rector Rev. R. E. Gribbin. He was also "prepared" under the tutelage of Rev. D. G. MacKinnon, Rector of Christ Church in New Bern, NC, where he served as a lay reader and "won for himself a host of staunch supporters."

Having changed faiths again, he needed to be ordained (for the third time!) and so on June 21, 1922

he was ordained to the diaconate at St. Paul's Church in Vanceboro, NC, once again by Bishop Darst. The ordination ceremony was attended by a "reverent and interested congregation," many of whom were the "staunch supporters," choir and all, from Christ Church in New Bern who drove quite a distance to attend the ordination. After the ordination ceremony, there was a dinner for some 50-60 guests, and Bishop Darst asked a number of people to speak, leading up to some remarks by Rev. Heyes himself. Quoting from the Mission Herald, the organ of the Diocese of East Carolina:

Mr. Heyes' talk was something in the nature of a personal apology. He spoke with great power and forcefulness, and all who heard him were deeply moved. He told of his years of service as a minister in the Unitarian Church; and, taking care in no way to seem to cast a slur at that splendid body of people, yet told of the feeling of spiritual hunger and dissatisfaction he had felt through all the years. Gradually the feeling became more definite, and took the form of a yearning for the dignity of Apostolic Orders, and a Communion which would satisfy his growing conviction of the Divinity of Him whom he has served as the Man of Nazareth.

Well, at least we were a "splendid body of people."

Rev. Heyes' next step was to acquire more training in the ways of the Episcopal Church. By September of 1922, he had enrolled in a special one-year course at the Virginia Episcopal Seminary in Alexandria, VA. He supplemented this with courses from the College of Preachers in Washington, DC and later some summer sessions in

Sewanee, Tennessee. Halfway through his training, on Sunday, February 25, 1923, he led a special service at St. George's Church in Fredericksburg, VA. After his year of study was completed, he returned to the East Carolina Diocese and took up residence in the town of Swan Quarter, Hyde County, NC. On Sept. 10, 1923 he was the principal speaker at the exercises to open the Swan Quarter School for the school year. He soon became the "minister in charge of the churches in Hyde County."

How long he stayed in Hyde County, NC is not known, but by the time of the Census of 1930, he and his family were living in Greensboro, Hale County, Alabama, and on January 5 of that year, he had been "instituted" by Bishop McDowell as Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Greensboro and also as Rector of the Uniontown Episcopal Church.

While in Greensboro, he did have time for other pursuits. In a letter to the local newspaper, the Greensboro Watchman published on Aug. 21, 1930, he wrote: "[M]y boy, Duncan, did get a small dogshark (about 2 1/2 pounds) the other day. Believe it or not, the whole Heyes family was out fishing at 5 A.M. today. Luck---- Five catfish. I am no fisherman. I cannot lie about the kind, size, and number of fish caught. In fact, the only time a true son of Walton tells the perfect truth is when he calls another real fisherman a liar." [Who in the heck is Walton?]

In October of 1937, Rev. Heyes tendered his resignation at St. Paul's as of Nov. 1, and moved to Colorado, Texas. The local newspaper reported that "during their residence in Greensboro, the Heyes have endeared themselves to the people here." He told his parishioners to "bear in mind that their Texas home is located on highway 80, and that the latch-string will still be on the

outside and as good a meal as they can provide and a 'sleepy, comfy bed' offered."

He held his first services as rector of All Saints' Episcopal Church in Colorado on Sunday, Nov. 7, 1937. By 1940, he had transferred to the Episcopal Church in Eagle Pass, TX. On April 27, 1942 he registered for the WWII draft from his residence in Eagle Pass, but by the end of the 1940s, he was serving as Rector at the Emmanuel Episcopal Church of Lockhart, TX. While in Texas, he served as chairman of the used clothing drive for overseas relief which shipped over two tons of clothes out of Lockhart. He was a member of the Army and Navy Commission of the Diocese of West Texas, a trustee of the St. Phillips Junior College in San Antonio, chairman of the "Church Activities Committee" in the Lockhart Business Men's Club, and secretary-treasurer of the Lockhart Ministerial association.

On Easter Sunday of 1949, he began his final pastorate at the Epiphany Episcopal Church in Opelousas, Louisiana. Unfortunately, just 21/2 years later on Oct.

6, 1951, his wife Agnes passed away due to a heart attack. She had already endeared herself to the Opelousas community and the Episcopal Guild members voted to change their name to the St. Agnes Guild in her memory, and the church Sunday School presented the church with memorial communion cruets, dedicated in her memory. Her son-in-law, Rev. P. Walter Henckell, who was serving as Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in Baytown, TX, honored his mother-in-law in November of 1952 by dedicating the church's processional cross in memory of Agnes Fairbrother Heyes.


Rev. Heyes was not alone too long. On April 7, 1953, Rev. Heyes was married to Mrs. Leah Rae Crow of Lockhart, TX at Trinity Episcopal Church in Baytown, TX by his son-in-law, Rev. Henckell. The couple spent the next four years in Opelousas in the service of the Epiphany Church community, and Rev. Heyes became famous for his numerous donations of books to the local library. He also twice presented large US flags to the Opelousas Fire Company in memory of his late wife Agnes. In May of 1956, he and his wife invited the entire church community to come and visit them in their home at the Episcopal rectory to thank them for the "new look" given to their home by the church.

In June of 1957, Rev. Heyes submitted his resignation to the Epiphany Episcopal Church effective July 30. In retiring, Heyes said "[t]he Church of Epiphany needs a young man as Opelousas is a growing community. There's a promising future here. I am too old and too unwell to do all that is needed." Rev. and Mrs. Heyes moved to a new home in the the village of Washington, just north of Opelousas, where he still continued to serve as rector at the St. John Episcopal church. It was at his home there on October 2, 1958 that he suffered a severe heart attack. He was taken to the St. Landry Clinic where he remained until his death on Dec. 1, 1958.

The local
Opelousas
newspaper, the
Daily World,
described him as
follows:

He was a rector in the true Anglican sense, the leader and minister and counselor and confidante of his flock; a man of





many parts. Mr. Heyes was...orator and preacher; kindly and warm; irascible upon occasion; energetic; firm; capable; adroit; wedded to progress in public affairs; dedicated to conservatism; tolerant; on occasion intolerant. He was a man of principle and of principles, and his touch was felt in all facets of our community – civic, social, governmental (in small measure through his many civic club and fire company works), and charitable. Mr. Heyes was what we might best call a "good" man, and it is with gratitude that we reflect that he was allowed to spend his twilight decade among us.

Rev. Heyes was buried in Lockhart, TX near the homes of his children.

Writer's note: I had the opportunity to visit Opelousas, LA on July 2, 2017 after my attendance at the UU General Assembly in New Orleans. I took the opportunity to visit Rev Heyes' last church, the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, and take these two photos.
