

AS WE MOVE INTO LATE FALL

Sara and Intern Minister Bettina, three protocols for the pandemic have become church policy: a guide for reserving and using UUCE space, a check-list to be completed when using the facility, and action to take in the event someone diagnosed with the virus has been part of a group meeting at UUCE. These will be available from the office and will also be a part of a weekly e-News in the near future. A UUCE transition group is working on the transformation in how our community stays connected, working to keep us in touch through technology once we can return to full-community, in-person gatherings.

I am also grateful for the members of UUCE who reached out as we enter over half a year of physically distancing to make sure that our connections remain strong and our members and friends know that we are there for them. Additionally, a huge THANK YOU for being a part of what keeps our congregation connected.

By the time you read this, we will also have had our October Parish meeting on Sunday, Oct. 25th. The meeting was an information session, with the update on the almost-complete parking lot expansion (and appreciation expressed to the task force for this project comprised of Nancy Avila, Mary Susan Haynes, and Dave Szarmach, and extra gratitude to Mary for chairing the group as well as shepherding the project through research, concept, proposals and bids, and being the point person for contact from both the contractor and church members with questions or concerns); financial updates from Treasurer Sarah Curts; the above mentioned church policies for protocols during the COVID-19 pandemic; reports



from PASA and the Green Sanctuary team; an announcement about now being the time to register for or request a change in small group ministry (https://uuellsworth.org/small-group-ministry/); the announcement of the Fall Grounds Cleanup (Nov. 8, details to come); the formation of an elections committee to be voted on by the congregation at the January meeting; and a discussion on the Cookie Walk fundraiser possibilities for this year.

I love this time of the year and I love serving our congregation as your Religious Education Coordinator.

In October we focused on DEEP LISTENING. Weekly lesson plans were emailed and posted on our UUCE website each week. Linda Uberseder and Anne met with the children for Children's Chapel, we went apple picking and had a train ride through Ellsworth. Several of our families showed up for peaceful Black Lives Matter vigils in Ellsworth, putting our love in action.

GROWTH CURVE AHEAD

Relationships are messy. Being human hurts.

I spent the weekend on virtual retreat with my colleagues — other student ministers preparing for service. It was a rich and intensive two days of music, small groups, featured speakers, and sharing.

Some deep 'aha' moments arose. I got to see the best of who I am — the strength and courage I bring to ministry — and the worst, or perhaps I should say some rough edges, some nonintegrated history that still brings me pain.

Good news, right? I'm human! Those rough edges are the growth curve, the learning edge, the sacred place where another layer of healing can begin.

But it's not easy. I've made the needed external amends. (No egregious offense here, folks, just a minor misstep that has given rise to deep and ancient pain within me.) Now I have to sit with these turbulent feelings of anger, confusion, shame, and pain.

The Buddhist teacher Sharon Salzburg tells us that these difficult states of emotion are visitors, not to be confused with the totality of who we are. My task is neither to slam the door in the visitor's face nor let the visitor take over my house, but to practice something in-between: a gentle hospitality that says, "Come. Sit at my table. You are welcome here."

My task is to hold the painful emotions and the larger reality of who I am, and to do so with grace.

And so I breathe into my heart center. I breathe into my pain. I breathe into emotion so big I don't know what to do with it. I do the other things I know are helpful: I journal about it. I dance. I call my therapist. I reach out to friends. I pray.

And slowly, slowly, the edges of emotion begin to soften. I start to see the gift that is there. I don't know how this will resolve itself but I know that resolution will come. I know that somehow this upset will lead to awakening. To another level of wisdom, integration, and growth.

I know that love is bigger in the end.

I used to experience this state of emotion like Winnie-the-Pooh with his head stuck in the honeypot, stumbling frantically in the dark. Pooh and Piglet had seen their own footprints in the snow and decided they



must belong to a Heffalump, a fearsome creature that lived entirely in their own imaginations. They set a trap, using Pooh's honey as bait.

But Pooh awakened hungry in the middle of the night and decided to go get a taste (just a smackerel, you know). He stuck his head all the way in to get to the honey at the bottom of the pot, and couldn't get the pot off again.

Poor Pooh! The Heffalump could arrive at any moment. Terrified, Pooh bumped around, stumbling over roots, growing ever more frantic until finally he managed to smash the pot open on a rock. Terrorizing himself with groundless fantasies and imagined fears.


I've moved from bumping around with my head in a honeypot to practicing hospitality when painful emotions arise. Such movement, such growth, in 20-some years!

Won't you join me in celebrating the growth that is possible, in my life and in yours?

How do you deal with difficult states of emotion when they arise? Can you practice hospitality to the unwanted feelings that are really only our forgotten selves, crying out for recognition and for healing?

Can you return, ever and always, to love?

- Sarah has heard from the bank and our parking lot loan has been approved; Gary will go there tomorrow for the closing.
- Thanks to Pepper for her successful leadership in the new "Name Your Price" yard-sale this year.

MINUTES:

Sarah made a motion to accept the minutes, and Sally seconded.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

- The PPP loan forgiveness form will be completed as soon as possible.
- Sarah and leff are working on the end of the FY 2019-2020 annual report.

MINISTER'S MONITORING REPORT:

- Thanks to all the people who worked on the Yard Sale. And thanks too for the use of the Junction parking lot.
- Thanks to Sarah and Jeff for working together to finalize FY '19-'20.
- · Sara is working to set up an expanded pastoral care system to meet the needs of the congregation
- Last night Sara met with the Committee on Ministry team and talked with them about reaching out to more members of the congregation. The BOT will each take 10 names from the new directory and, with the use of a script, tell them about the different ways they can obtain assistance from the church. Sara will put together the lists. The living tradition which we share draws from many sources:


- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;

Who's Who on the Remembrance Plaque at the Doorway? PART 2

[Note: Names written in **bold face** were also active in the activities of the Ellsworth Unitarian Church.]

S. SCOTT ESTEY

Samuel Scott Estey was born on Oct. 8, 1871 in Whiting, Maine, the last of the nine children of Samuel Richard Estey of Eastport, Maine and Elizabeth Kelley of Trescott, a small village near Lubec, Maine. On Aug. 17, 1893 in Ellsworth, he married Mary E. Morrison who was born on June 11, 1872 in Ellsworth, the daughter of Eben Eldridge Morrison of Ellsworth and Lydia Morrison of Mariaville. They lived on the Bayside Road in Ellsworth where they raised five children: Florence R. (known as Henna), **Julia M., Bertha Curtis**, Samuel Eben, and Horace S. On his 1893 marriage certificate, Scott identified himself as a lumberman, but on the 1910 census, he was operating what would become the Pioneer Dairy Farm, Ellsworth's largest milk farm. In 1907, the Bayside Grange was formed, and Scott was chosen to be its first master. In 1939 he was working as chairman of the Hancock County soil conservation committee, and in 1942 he was elected president of the Hancock County National Farm Loan Association. Mary taught in a rural school of between 60 to 75 students alongside Miss Kettie Remick. Later in life, she was active in the Bayside Grange and the Order of the Eastern Star. Mary died on June 16, 1927 in Ellsworth. Scott outlived her by 32 years, passing away in Ellsworth in 1958. They were buried in Woodbine Cemetery.

HAROLD GERARD GRAPEL

Harold Gerard Grapel was born on Oct. 26, 1900 in Red Bank, New Jersey, the son of Gerhard Henry Grapel and Nellie Antoinette Clark, both of Brooklyn, New York. He was a brother to active church member **Gertrude Mason**. He married Mary E. Lynn, born on Jan. 21, 1900 in Newark, New Jersey, daughter of Bernard J. Lynn and Mary Ann Mulcahy, both of New Jersey. They appear to have had no children. In 1920, Harold was working as a clerk in a tobacco company. He and Mary later settled in Westfield, NJ where in 1940 he was working for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company in Plainfield, NJ. Mary died in 1968 and Harold in 1972, and both were buried in Woodbine Cemetery in Ellsworth.

GEORGE S. & MARY H. HAGERTHY

Dr. George Simpson Hagerthy was born in Surry on Aug. 2, 1870, the son of George Carlisle Hagerthy and Clara E. Carter, both of Surry. On Oct. 2, 1897 in Ellsworth, he married **Mary C. Higgins**, born on Oct. 25, 1873

in Hulls Cove to Josiah H. Higgins of Eden (now Bar Harbor) and Harriet S. Caswell of Camden. George and Mary had five children: **Madella R., Chandler L.**, Vena Caswell, Marjorie Frances, and **Bertha Louise**. George attended dental school in Philadelphia, then moved to Hancock St. in Ellsworth where he worked as a dentist for nearly 40 years. Mary was active in the Nokomis Rebekah Lodge where she once served as noble grand in that order. She was a sister to church members **Julia Niccolls** and **Leonora Higgins**. George passed away on Feb. 14, 1932 in Ellsworth, and Mary died in 1941, also in Ellsworth. They were buried in Woodbine Cemetery in Ellsworth.

JENNIE D. HEAD

Jennie Mildred Davis was born on Mar. 12, 1993 in Ellsworth, the daughter of James W. Davis of Bangor and Nellie Conway of Ellsworth. On Dec. 23, 1902 in Bangor, she married Merrill Richards Head, born on Nov. 20, 1872 in Waldoboro, the son of Osmay S. Head of Waldoboro and Sarah Elizabeth "Lizzie" Richards. They originally settled in Waldoboro, but their daughter Helena E. was born in Ellsworth in 1905, and by around 1915 they were living on Oak Street in Ellsworth. Two more children were to be born to them: James Davis and Mae Buttner. In the meantime, Merrill and his business partner George P. Smith built up a men's clothing business on Main St. where they practiced "good business methods and square dealing." After the famous Ellsworth fire of 1933, their business is one of the first to be reestablished on what was then called "Emergency Street." In January of 1942, Merrill suffered a heart attack at his store and spent several months recuperating at a private hospital in Ellsworth. Merrill was active in Republican politics, enjoyed playing bridge, and frequently performed in a four-part male harmony group. Jennie was very active with the Women's Alliance, and outside of her church activities, she also enjoyed bridge. After her husband's death, she and her daughter Mae took over the running of her husband's clothing store. Merrill died on Nov. 30, 1949 at Togus Hospital in Chelsea, but Jennie outlived him by 21 years, passing on Dec. 1, 1970 at a nursing home in Sullivan. They were buried at Woodbine.

EDWARD E.& LOUISE A.KAMPS

Edward Emil Kamps was born on Nov. 18, 1877 in Hoboken, New Jersey, the son of William Kamps and Minnie Volger, both from Germany. on Sept. 3, 1904 in Boston, he married Louisa Alma Keissling, born on Jan. 30, 1883 in Dedham, Massachusetts, the daughter of Charles Frederick Kiessling and Lena Johanna Pipping, both of Dedham. Edward and Louise had a total of eight children: **Edward Carl,** Ernestine Louise, Pauline E., Albert William I, Albert William II, Helen Magdeline, Alma M., and Harvey H. Edward and Louisa spent virtually all of their life in Dedham, but their son **Edward Carl Kamps** remained in Ellsworth. Edward died about 1943 in Dedham, and Louisa passed away on Nov. 1, 1962 in Dedham.

FRANK S. & ADAH M. LORD

Franklin S. Lord was born on Feb. 23, 1855 in Surry, the son of Abraham Lord and Eliza J. Smith, both of Surry. In 1880 he married **Adah M. Wood**, born in August of 1855 in Ellsworth, daughter of Nathan M. Woods of Montville [continued on next page]

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F., Harvard Harlow of Augusta, **Edith M.**, and **Ruth Edith**. After a few years as engineer of the steam tug Little Round Top, he engaged in the coal business and was one of the proprietors of the Ellsworth Ice Company. He eventually became active in Democratic politics, serving as an alderman in 1897-1898, later as an assessor of taxes, and was many times urged to be a candidate for mayor. He was one of the trustees of the Unitarian Church and was elected president of the board in 1913. He was also active in Masonry and in Odd Fellows. He was elected representative from Ellsworth to the Maine Legislature not long before his death, which came on Nov. 11, 1915 at a hospital in Bangor where he failed to rally after an operation. Adah remained active in the Irene chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and at the Unitarian church where she served as secretary to the Women's Alliance. She died in 1947 and was buried beside her husband at Woodbine.

WILLIAM & MARY R. LYSAGHT

William Lysaght was born on May 25, 1886 in Portland, son of John Scott Lysaght of Portland and Martha Jane Archibald of Colchester, Nova Scotia. On Aug. 21, 1911 in Ellsworth, he married Mary E. Raymond, born on Aug. 23, 1886 in Caribou, daughter of Wallace L. "Wallie" Raymond of Presque Isle and Mary Elizabeth "Lizzie" McQuinn of Ellsworth Falls. They had no children. William worked as a supervising agent out of Cleveland, Ohio but spent his summers in Ellsworth. He died on Jan. 1, 1938 in Providence, Rhode Island and was buried in Woodbine Cemetery in Ellsworth. Mary remained in Ellsworth for the rest of her life near her family. She was an active member of the Unitarian Church and also the Irene Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. She died on Feb 5, 1969 in Ellsworth, and was buried at Woodbine.

FRED L. & SARAH E. MASON

Fred Livingston Mason was born on Nov. 14, 1864 in Ellsworth, the son of Charles Wesley Mason of Orland and Cinderella H. Cook of Ellsworth. On Jan. 11, 1884 in Ellsworth, he married first Sarah Evelyn Kelliher, born on June 17, 1863 in Milbridge, the daughter of Solomon Y. Kelliher of Milbridge and Almira Packard Bartlett of Trenton. They settled on Beals Avenue where they had three sons: Fred Livingston Jr., Walter Kelliher, and Philip Dutton. After graduating from Ellsworth High School, Fred attended Boston University Law School and was a member of the Hancock County Bar for 48 years. He served as county attorney for two terms and in the Maine House of Representatives for two terms. His first wife, Sarah, died in Ellsworth on June 23, 1917. Nine years later, on Nov. 7, 1926, Fred married second Mrs. Minta I. "Minnie" (Emerton) Sargent who was born on Feb. 26, 1886 in Brooksville, the daughter of Joseph B. Emerton and Ellen F. Carter. Fred died on Feb. 24, 1936 in Hancock, and Minnie died on May 21, 1957 in Ellsworth.
