UUCE ADULT EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Renewed and revitalized to hopefully address some needs of Covid isolation, the Ed Comm is at work to structure and rename itself to be more consistent with the UUA's renaming of the RE programming to *The Tapestry of Faith*. They suggest *Adult Faith Development* and we are discussing variations, realizing that this committee provides a wider scope of programs than even that new title would express.

We are formulating our Mission Statement to also reflect the UUA's charge to restructure governance in more inclusive ways as defined by their two year study of inclusion, racial justice, and White Privilege/Supremacy. Their recommendations and charge to all churches/societies are a published booklet, "Widening The Circle of Concern" and was presented and used as a guide in GA this year. It is available in the UUA Bookstore and given to each church minister and GA attendee. We will be using it as a guide as well as the currently suggested 8th Principle, which we soon will be bringing to UUCE for discussion.

OUR STRUCTURE: Our Comm has accepted as part of our structure, six UUCE Resource Teams: Tech/hosts, MC/Facilitators, UUCE Presenters, Creators (idea folks, musicians), Research, and Mentors. We already have about a dozen folks who have agreed to sign on to teams. We are hoping to have 10-12 folks on each team possibly accessed via google.doc for your committee use. It is exciting to see the enthusiasm as we identify folks willing to grow our community by participating and utilizing their skills. We also invite your participation by attending our

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committee primarily as an observer or a scheduled speaker so as to give you time, and email input is welcomed. Once established, we plan to meet quarterly and utilize after church breakouts to discuss current issues needing immediate attention. All welcome.

OUR AGENDAS which will include the added meeting notes and our Mission Statement will soon be located on Google's Doc for your perusal. We will operate primarily by consensus but if stalled over time, we will agree by consensus to go to democratic vote for that issue.

December being filled with Holiday gatherings, we will offer only one new program entitled *Adult Story Hour* on December 27th at 9 am Zoom. *Adult Story Hour* is an opportunity for a congregant to tell their spiritual journey which led them to become UU and how they bring these values into their lives. They might even allow Q&As! Stay tuned for our UUCE Celebrity speaker! Let's get to know one another!

UPCOMING PROGRAMS which will largely start happening in January are: UU Jeopardy; Movie nights both family and adult versions; Religious/Spiritual/Ethical Affinity Groups to study and celebrate your specific Faith or other interest (Christianity, Judaism, Humanists, Wiccan, Buddhist, etc.) with like minded folks in ongoing small groups, starting with training for startup organizers, structure/programming designed be group; Death Cafes with Lori Johnson and her team. Perhaps some informal morning groups and some outdoor intergenerationalfun depending on Covid protocols.

TBA ASAP: A youth service program, details soon. Also, Techy 201, TBA by Sara, to learn breakout, movie showing, sharing screen, etc. Zoom has some great tutorials to get the basics. Let Sara know if you are interested in participating.

Looking forward to the talents and skills that only you can offer our community. Let's open our hearts wide, so that we can grow into expanded Beloved Community where ALL are included as we dismantle out White Privilege and address our racism.




Meanwhile, any new ideas are welcome, especially for a big marquee event for our live auction. Don't hesitate to share!

A SPIRIT OF ANTICIPATION

In my childhood, Christmas began on the first Sunday of Advent, when my mother hung the silver-and goldfoil angel on the brick fireplace. Each week she brought out more decorations, until the house was full of Christmas, culminating with the decorated tree we did not see until Christmas Eve.

My father took us out on long errands on the 24th—all the way to Sheffield to buy the Christmas hare, or visiting with godparents, or caroling under the brightly lit tree outside the town library. Then we went home, where we ate a simple supper and waited impatiently for the magic of Christmas to begin.

Our living room, when we were finally allowed into it, had been transformed. The tree sparkled with glass bulbs, colored lights, and *lametta* (tinsel). Presents were heaped underneath. The *Christkind* (Christ child) brought the tree and the gifts, we were told. We didn't know about Santa Claus until we went to school.

We weren't allowed to open our presents right away. First we had to light the final candle of our Advent wreath. We had to sit on the couch and sing carols,



both in English and in German. My father's rasping voice contrasted with my mother's clear soprano. The candlelight shimmered in her hazel eyes. We had to eat another round of cookies, baked in batches throughout the month—nussemausen and



lebkuchen and raisin-studded stollen — as my parents sipped eggnog from tiny glasses.

Christmas Eve was all the more special because we had built toward it all month long. Each Sunday we lit another candle of our evergreen wreath, gathering around the table for hot chocolate and cookies and songs. We ended each session with a German song that counted down the days until December 24 (the proper date of Christmas, by the way).

The most fun of all was when we sang it on the 23rd, and heard my mother say "morgen" — "tomorrow" — Christmas would come.

The season of Advent mirrors that sense of anticipation. It's a time of waiting. A period of gestation, as the earth turns cold and people turn inward. In the Christian tradition, Advent is similar to Lent. A time to ponder our human frailty and look ahead to the promise of new life.

"How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of the messenger who brings good news, the good news of peace and salvation, the news that the God of Israel reigns!" wrote the prophet Isaiah in the sixth century BCE.

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Isaiah (or one of them; the prophecies were likely written by different people in different time periods) also spoke about making straight in the wilderness a highway for God; hammering swords into ploughshares and spears into pruning hooks; and the wolf and the lamb living as one.

This is the dream at the heart of the Jewish and Christian traditions — a world united in peace and good will. It's the sentiment we read on Christmas cards and sing in carols. It's a dream we Unitarian Universalists share, as well.

This Christmas season will be different for most of us. Family gatherings will be small. Some of us will be alone on Christmas Day, or in the same couples or family groups as any other day of the year. There is much to mourn.

Yet the enforced isolation also holds a gift: a time to sink more deeply into the heart of the holiday. With beloved traditions on hold — Christmas parties, Christmas pageants, Christmas caroling — we have time to reflect on what it's all about.

The dream of world peace. The birth of hope, in all its many forms. The reminder that there is always new life and that it can come in the most unlikely of ways.

May this Advent season offer you moments of peace and of joy. May you be blessed by a spirit of anticipation, preparing yourself for new life ahead.



Who's Who on the Remembrance Plaque at the Doorway? PART 3

[Note: Names written in **bold face** were also active in the activities of the Ellsworth Unitarian Church.]

WALTER K. & PHILIP D. MASON

Walter Kelliher Mason was born on Sept. 20, 1893 in Ellsworth, the son of Fred Livingston Mason. In the summer of 1914, Walter was associated with a free mail delivery system in Ellsworth, and he was a letter carrier two years later when he married, on Nov. 4, 1916 in Ellsworth, **Maud E. Raymond,** born in October of 1878 in Ellsworth, daughter of Wallace L. Raymond and Mary Elizabeth "Lizzie" McQuinn of Ellsworth. Unfortunately, their marriage did not last long for in October of 1920 their divorce was decreed on the grounds of cruel and abusive treatment. [Maud later married Walter Rupert Spaulding, born on Apr. 15, 1881 in Royalton, Vermont. Maud died on Oct. 16, 1963 in Ellsworth, and Walter died on Sept. 7, 1969, also in Ellsworth.] In June of 1931, Walter was arraigned before the Ellsworth Municipal

Court on a charge of larceny. He pleaded not guilty and was adjudged not guilty. Walter died on Feb. 9, 1973 at a Bangor hospital. He was buried at Woodbine.

His brother **Philip Dutton Mason** was born in Ellsworth on Nov. 14, 1895. On Sept. 11, 1922 in Ellsworth, he married Ruth Hazel Treworgy, born on June 14, 1892 in Ellsworth, daughter of Charles J. Treworgy and Georgia A. Fernald, both of Ellsworth. Philip and Ruth had four children: May, Philip Dutton Jr., Hope, and Donald Treworgy. Philip worked as a telephone installation repairman for New England Telephone and Telegraph. He was extremely active in Masonry, was a member of the Arcadia chapter of the Masonic lodge of Ellsworth, and was for a time captain general in the Blanquefort commandery of the Knights Templar. He was also a member of the Anah Shrine temple in Bangor and the Hancock County Shrine club. Philip died on Feb. 6, 1951 at a Togus hospital in Chelsea. Ruth passed away in Ellsworth on Nov. 7, 1983. They were buried in Woodbine Cemetery.



EMBERT C. & EVA N. OSGOOD

Embert Chase Osgood was born o Mar. 24, 1874 in Ellsworth, the youngest of the five children of Irving Osgood of Blue Hill and Alwilda M. "Allie" Foster of Bristol. On June 23, 1903 in Ellsworth, he married **Eva Belle Nealley**, born Feb. 28, 1880 in Ellsworth, the daughter of Joseph William Nealley of Ellsworth and Lettice Cornelia "Lettie" Chapin of Orrington. They took up residence at 35 Church Street in Ellsworth and had two children: **Katharine Chase**, known as "Kay," and Carl Chapin. In addition to taking up the reins of his father's photography business, Embert was also

a director at the Union Trust Company. He was active in Masonry, a member of the Lygonia Lodge for over 50 years, and was also a member of the Arcadia Chapter and the Blanquefort Commandery. For 17 years he was also grand master of the exchequer of the Grand Lodge of Maine Knights of Pythias and chancellor commander of Donaqua Lodge. Eva was chairman of the board of trustees of the Ellsworth Public Library, a former president and secretary of the Ellsworth Literature Club, president of the First PTA in Ellsworth, secretary of the Woman's club, and president and secretary of the Women's Alliance of the Unitarian Church. Embert died at a Bangor hospital on Sept. 5, 1957. Eva passed on Dec. 13, 1974 at her home in Ellsworth. They were buried at Woodbine Cemetery.



HOLLIS L. RAMSDELL, JR.

Hollis L. Ramsdell Jr. was born on July 2, 1923 "at the Oaklands" in Gardiner, Maine, the son of Hollis LeRoy Ramsdell of Lubec and Julia M. Estey of Ellsworth. He graduated from Ellsworth High School in 1940. He was active in the Bayside Grange and at the Unitarian Church. While a student at the University of Maine, he withdrew in 1943 to enter the military. He was a squad leader in Battery C, 486th Coast Artillery Battalion, Anti-Aircraft. He participated in the




Normandy Invasion, took part in the battles of St. Lo, Falaise Gap, and Mons, and died of wounds in Belgium on Sept. 9, 1944. He was given a funeral service with full military honors four and a half years later on Sunday Apr. 24, 1949 at Woodbine Cemetery.

NEAL A & HELEN N. RAYMOND

Neal Alexander Raymond was born on Mar. 25, 1882 in Hancock, the son of Wallace L. "Wallie" Raymond of Presque Isle and Mary Elizabeth "Lizzie" McQuinn of Ellsworth Falls. As such, Neal was the brother of three other active members of the church: **Grace**



M. (Raymond) Royal, Maud E. (Raymond) (Mason) Spaulding, and Mary E. (Raymond) Lysaght, the Raymonds being one of several significant "dynasties" in the church. On June 25, 1919 in Ellsworth, he married Helen F. Nealley, born on Nov. 4, 1889 in Ellsworth, daughter of Joseph William Nealley of Ellsworth and Lettice Cornelia "Lettie" Chapin of Orrington. They settled on High Street and had one son, John Ellis H. Raymond. In 1901, he worked as a florist with the Mary A. Clark Company, and in 1923, he became a member of the M. A. Clark firm, becoming



president of the company in 1942. In that same year, Neal and Helen sold their High St. home, and in 1943, Neal was elected to the Ellsworth City Council, eventually becoming chairman. In 1944, he became a trustee of the soon to be constructed Eastern Memorial Hospital, and in 1946 he became president of the hospital. He was involved with the Lejok Lodge of the IOOF of Ellsworth, once serving

as a noble grand, the Nokomis Rebekah Lodge, the Lygonia Lodge of Masons, the Arcadia Chapter, the Blanquefort Commandery, the Anah Temple Shrine of Bangor, the Bayside Grange, the Woodbine Cemetery Association, the Maine State Florist Association, the Ellsworth School District, and the Woodlawn Association. Not to be outdone, Helen was a Noble Grand of the Nokomis Rebekah Lodge of Ellsworth, Worthy Matron of the Irene Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, and past president and treasurer of M. A. Clark, Inc. Needless to say, they were both active members of the Unitarian Church of Ellsworth. Neal died on Aug. 30, 1956 at a hospital in Damariscotta, and Helen passed on Dec. 5, 1973 in Ellsworth. They were buried at Woodbine Cemetery.

JOSEPH & ETHELYN REMICK

Joseph Warren Remick was born on Nov. 8, 1874 in Ellsworth, the son of Joseph Warren Remick Sr. of Trenton and Cordelia J. Jordan of Ellsworth. On Oct. 17, 1900 in Trenton, he married Bertha Ethelyn Jordan, born on Feb. 23, 1879 in Trenton, daughter of John Wilson Jordan of Ellsworth and Susie J. Nichols, born in Maine but whose parents were from New Hampshire. Joseph and Ethelyn had three children: Charles Edward, Florence P., and Herbert Currier. After graduation from Ellsworth High School, Ethelyn attended the Eastern State Normal School in Castine, and was for 35 years a teacher in the schools of Hancock County. She was a member of the Study Club of Bar Harbor, the Unitarian Alliance, and the Bayside Farm Bureau. She was also very active in the 4-H Club and served as the Hancock County Club Project Leader. Joseph had worked for the S. S. Pierce Co. in Boston before returning to Maine in 1908 and starting a farm in Trenton in 1913. He was a past master of the Bayside Grange and a member of the Farm Extension Service of Hancock County. Joseph died Feb. 21, 1958 in Bar Harbor, and Ethelyn died on June 24, 1977 in Trenton.

VICTORINE W. ROLLINS

Andrew Howard Rollins was born on July 23, 1884 in Ellsworth, the son of Charles F. Rollins of Ellsworth and Elvira F. Frost of Hancock. On Oct. 5, 1910 in Ellsworth, he married first **Victorine Bellatty Wyman**, born on Oct. 14, 1883 in Ellsworth, daughter of Edward Benjamin Wyman of Tremont and Ernestine B. Bellatty of Ellsworth. After graduating from Ellsworth High School in the class of 1903, Howard taught school for several years in Ellsworth, then worked for the U. S. Railway Postal Service for 42 years. He and Victorine had one daughter, **Ann**, who grew up in her parents' spacious home on Beals Avenue (see photo). Victorine was an active member of the Unitarian Women's Alliance, the Ellsworth Garden Club, and the East



Surry Extension Association. After Victorine died on May 30, 1954 in Ellsworth, Howard married second, on Aug. 1, 1963 in Ellsworth, Mrs. Beulah Holt (Bunker) Blance, born on Aug. 14, 1897 in Gouldsboro, daughter of Henry Cobb Bunker of Hancock and Mary Frances Bunker of Gouldsboro. Beulah was also a member of the Women's Alliance. Howard died on May 8, 1973 in Ellsworth and was buried at Woodbine. Beulah died on August 22, 1976 in Charleston, South Carolina at the home of her daughter. She was buried at the Greenwood Cemetery in Winter Harbor.
