



And all your acts are a blessing.



### FROM OUR UUCE BOARD PRESIDENT

This month's Soul Matters focuses on commitment, and I am grateful for your commitment to UUCE. You step up for so many things--committee projects, fund-raising events, and more.

As we look ahead to next month's annual pledge drive, I want to thank you for your continued support of our community. About 70% of our budget expenses are met through your pledges and you show care and concern through your pledging, and in many more ways.

Two fundraisers, the reworked Yard Sale and re-imagined Holiday Cookie Drive-by, happened earlier this year, raising more than goals which were revised due to the pandemic. The deadline for this piece is the same day as the Virtual Goods & Services Auction reinvented as a Virtual Arm Chair



Auction. I am writing this while sitting watching the silent and live auction bids that have obviously exceeded the goal \$8,000, providing a successful sweep with these three fund-raising events! # UUCE'S 2021 GOODS & SERVICES AUCTION

Also, many thanks to our incredibly generous donors and all the adventurous souls who were willing to try out a new computer thing and bid on line and by Zoom. And to Rev. Sara, always our inspiration! # Dr. Stephen D. Berger Memorial Bench

Interview with Nancy Avila by Janet Szarmach, January 12, 2021

Dr. Stephen Berger (Nov. 24, 1940 – Oct. 14, 2015) was a member of UUCE from 2010 to the time of his death. Bar Mitzvah'd at age 50, Stephen had no religious training growing up, but began exploring different temples when he discovered his Jewish roots. After moving to MDI in 2010 with his wife, Nancy Avila, Stephen discovered UUCE. At that time, the services were lay led, which appealed to both Stephen and Nancy. After Rev. Sara Hayman arrived, Stephen worked with her as a worship associate and also led services himself. Stephen was a part of a Small Group Ministry and participated in book discussion groups as well as serving on the Board of Trustees. In 2015 he was given a leadership award. Nancy fondly recalls that he shared an enjoyment of puns with John Fink. UUCE, she says, was the first place Stephen felt as though he truly belonged.

After his memorial service, his family laid Stephen's ashes in the UUCE garden which, because of Stephen's love of the church and his involvement with it, Nancy and their children felt was the most appropriate place to put them. His bench was placed at the back of the daffodil garden. The design of the bench, which is made of iolite, includes a book, representing Stephen's enormous love of books and learning. He also loved trees, so Nancy chose to also incorporate a tree in the design.


### **UUCE OFFICE**

Love is the spirit of this church, and service its law; this is our great covenant: to dwell together in peace, to seek the truth in love, and to help one another.



### **WARNING ABOUT SCAMS** AGAINST SENIORS

Financial exploitation takes many forms, including but not limited to telemarketing fraud, home repair scams, stock and securities scams, among others. Here are the most common requests lately from fraudsters to the public:

- Purchase of gift cards to send to someone
- Requests to send foreign wires
- Unexpected refund/overpayment of any type
- · Computer services, asking for access to your computer
- · Grandchild in jail needing money for bail
- Someone telling you not to talk with anyone about the request/situation
- Anyone telling you to lie to your financial institution
- Romance scammers—talking with people on chat sites who ask them to perform financial transactions

### If you suspect a scam involving yourself or a loved one, take these steps right away:

- 1. Contact your bank or credit card issuer.
- 2. Report it to your local police or sheriff's office, and local adult protective services agency.
- 3. Submit a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission at ftc.gov.



# MARDEN & CARRIE DUNBAR

**John Marden Dunbar,** known as Marden, was born on Oct. 15, 1895 in Trenton, ME the son



of Franklin H. "Frank" Dunbar of Steuben and Adelma Frances Trufry of Trenton. After military service in World War I, he returned to Trenton and on July 25, 1922 he married **Caroline F. "Carrie" Royal,** born in Hancock County in 1898 to Elmer Horace Royal of Ellsworth and Ida Frances Hopkins of Trenton. The couple went on to have six children: Ralph, Mary, Harold, Keith, Caroline "Cookie," and Kathleen "Kathie." Marden worked as a carpenter and was an active member of the Unitarian Church. Carrie was active not only in the Unitarian Church, especially in the Women's Alliance, but also in the Ellsworth Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star.



# CHARLES R. BEAL

**Charles R. Beal** was born on Feb. 11, 1903 in Northeast Harbor, the third of the five children of Nahum Everett Beal of Ellsworth and Margaret M. Barron of St. John, New Brunswick. On Oct. 31, 1927 in Nashua, NH he married Jean Chalmers, the youngest of the five children of Alexander A. Chalmers of Fetteresso, Scotland and Susan Amelia "Minnie" O'Brien of Pugwash, Nova Scotia. The couple went on to have two children: Dana Richard Beal and Mrs. Jean Heritz, both of Cincinnati, OH. Charles was a draftsman for GE in Schenectady, NY until 1968 and in 1969 he moved to Ellsworth. He died on April 23, 1975 in Portland but was buried in Woodbine Cemetery in Ellsworth. His wife Jean later moved to live near her children in Ohio where she was active in the Rebecca Eastern Star and Pythian Sisters. She died in Montgomery, Ohio on July 21, 1989.

# NAHUM E.& MARGARET M. BEAL

Nahum Everett Beal was born in Ellsworth in May of 1868, the oldest of the three sons of Charles Wallace Beal and Helen Mar Hall, both of Ellsworth. On Nov. 15, 1893 in Boston, at the age of 25, he married Margaret M. Barron, born on July 14, 1874 in St. John, New Brunswick, daughter of Richard and Helen Barron of Canada. The couple was to have a total of five children: Helen, Harold, Charles R., Ella, and Eleanor. After their marriage, they moved back and forth between Maine and Massachusetts, living at various times in Cambridge, Mount Desert, and Somerville. Margaret died in Ellsworth on Feb. 16, 1946 and was buried at Woodbine Cemetery. When Nahum died on May 24, 1950 he was living in Medford, Massachusetts. It is not known where he was buried.

# VINCENT C.BOUCEK

Vincent Celestine Boucek was born on Apr. 4, 1908 in Trieste, Italy (then part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire), the youngest of the six children of Leonhard Bou ek, of Semonice, East Bohemia, and Marie Havelka, of Lažany, Central Bohemia. Vincent first set foot in the United States on Mar. 20, 1920 when he and his five siblings arrived with their mother Marie into the Port of New York aboard the S. S. Manchuria to join their father Leonhard who had settled in Pittsburgh, PA. They were listed on the ship's manifest as Czechosolvakian Slovaks and their last address was the city of Eggenberg, Austria. They listed their nearest relative as Mr. Jozef Havelka of Nadejkow Tabor, Czechoslovakia, who was probably Marie's father.



Vincent met his future wife during a sports competition at Lattimer Junior High School in Pittsburgh. **Helen Catherine Vorech** had been born on June 6, 1910 in Pittsburgh, the oldest of the five children of Joseph Vorech of Malastrana (old Prague) and his wife Kamila Abrahamova, also of Bohemia. They were regarded as "free thinkers" who were "facile" with the arts. After graduating from Allegheny High School, both Vincent and Helen went on to college, he to Carnegie Tech (now Carnegie Mellon University) and she to the University of Pittsburgh. They eloped and were married on April 2, 1932 in Pittsburgh by a Presbyterian minister. They were to have three children: Bob, Tom, and Camilla.

Vincent was employed as a development engineer in the steel industry at U. S. Steel (USX). He performed well and was rewarded by numerous gifts of stock. When their kids were in their teens, they used to go to a Methodist Sunday School, which their didn't like. Later, Vincent and Helen heard about a Unitarian minister, Rev. Irving Murray, 25 miles away at the First Unitarian Church of Pittsburgh, but they did the drive anyway and, according to Helen, "We fit right in." They joined the church there in 1947 and remained active until their move to Maine

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in August of 1970. Although they had visited the (old) Ellsworth church during visits to MDI in the 1950s and 1960s, they didn't really become active until after their move to Maine. Vincent co-chaired the building committee for the new church and their remained active until Vincent's death at the Bar Harbor hospital on Sept. 24, 1975. Helen followed him thirteen years later, passing on Jan. 13, 1999 at their home in Southwest Harbor. Her body was cremated in Washington, DC.

# HERBERT C. & A. EVELYN LORD

Herbert Curtis Lord was born in Surry on Nov. 21, 1894, the second of the five children of Elwyn Cook Lord of Surry and Lillian C. Clark of Ellsworth. On June 10, 1924 in Marlborough, Massachusetts, he married Alice Evelyn Howe, born on Apr. 17, 1894 in Marlborough, the third of the six children on Oscar Whitney Howe of Marlborough and Ida May Brown of Stow. They settled on the Surry Road, and were to have three children: Herbert C. Jr., Priscilla Leverett, and Thelma L. Lord. Herbert worked as a clerk in the Ellsworth Post Office, and Evelyn was Hancock County's first Home Demonstration Agent. During WWII, she worked with the Maine State Extension Service on Food Conservation and 4H Club work. She served as president of the Ellsworth Unitarian Church, and was active in the Eastern Star, the Surry Garden Club, and the Ellsworth Literature Club. She died on Jan. 12, 1976 in Glens Falls, New York, and he followed her five months later in June, also in Glens Falls. They were buried in the Village Cemetery in Surry where their gravestone describes him as "scholarly, artistic, friendly," and her as "optimistic, venturous, resolute."
