It's occurred to me lately that in the absence of up-to-date information, we human beings make-up what we think is happening! This update below about several things at UUCE is long-overdue! I apologize and I pledge to provide more regular updates moving ahead. Thank you for your patience, continuing engagement and generous support of our beloved UUCE congregation.

WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH OUR ENGINEERED AV TECH SYSTEM?

On Sunday, July 11th, members of our congregation voted to purchase and install an engineered AV Tech System that will allow us to conduct hybrid worship services with people in attendance in our physical sanctuary and folks simultaneously attending on-line via live ZOOM. On Wednesday of that very same week, we placed the order and crossed our fingers that the equipment would be delivered sooner rather than later, knowing, too, that projected delivery times ranged anywhere between 5-10 weeks. Today, Wednesday, September 1st, makes exactly 7 weeks since we placed the order and several key component parts of this tech system have not yet been delivered. The end of 10 weeks brings us to September 22nd. Deep breath. We are disappointed it's taking this long, AND, we hope that all the ordered equipment will be received by September 22nd. These manufacturing and delivery delays mean we'll continue to worship together entirely on ZOOM for the time being.

In the meantime, church volunteers are working hard behind the scenes to ready the sanctuary and community room space for the system installation. Outlets have been installed (two in the sanctuary and one in the community room) which will power the mounted cameras. My minister's office has been largely emptied and readied for the placement of a new tech desk. The door in my office that used to open into the sanctuary has been converted into a wall and window which will allow the Tech system operator to be able to look into the sanctuary. In the coming weeks, wiring will be put into place and monitors mounted. In short, we're doing all we can to be ready to move ahead quickly when the other equipment arrives. Thank you for your support and your patience during this process. We continue to believe we've made the right decision for our needs into the future. We'll keep you posted!

MAINTAINING CONNECTIONS SAFELY

FROM OUR UUCE BOARD PRESIDENT

As we monitor the impact on our community of the DELTA variant, we are maintaining our connections while doing as much as we can to ensure our health and safety. Taking precautions such as masking for indoor groups of up to 15 and encouraging social distancing for outdoor activities (with participants wearing masks if a member of the group requests it) has led to some frustration but is one way we look out for each other. The revised church policy uses CDC guidelines as a base, while recognizing that local data fluctuates. We take the extra precautions mentioned above to ensure our safety.

Meanwhile, work on the new AV set-up to allow interactive hybrid inperson/online services continues. The materials needed to create the system are ordered and arriving slowly because both the manufacturing and shipping have been hampered by the pandemic.



Your board met for a retreat to review the past year and to vision UUCE's future. Items for the fall include finalizing a charge to a task force—planned when you voted to update our bylaws—that will examine various ways for more inclusive methods of conducting congregational and board meetings, and perhaps, following research by the Task Force and their recommendations to the board, using some of the methods of conducting meetings for the "best fit" for inclusivity at UUCE congregational and board meetings at 2021 and 2022 meetings.

The retreat also allowed your board to revisit end statements that you adopted last year, reflecting on work done and moving into our future.

While the DELTA variant has postponed in-person services and congregational gatherings, UUCE is still maintaining connection as your board, ministries, and committees renew the work of our beloved community.

OIN A SMALL GROUP!

"Small Group Ministry (SGM) offers a way to explore life's ultimate questions, deepen your spiritual growth, and develop a richer sense of connectedness and community. SGM creates a sacred time where the stories of our lives are heard." ~ Rev. Dr. Thandeka, UU Minister

- Small Group Ministry is a vital part of many UU congregations. Groups of 10-12 people meet, usually monthly, to reflect on and discuss significant life topics.
- Small groups are great places to get to know other people and to get to know yourself. Over time, participants build deep connections with one another, with the congregation, and with the sacred in their lives.
- Our UUCE Small Groups meet each month for 2 hours. Some meet in-person (when possible) and some via Zoom. The new year starts in October and groups meet through June. (You can even change to a new group each year.)
- Small Groups are facilitated by either a group facilitator or through shared facilitating (a
 different member of the group takes a turn each month). During their time together, members
 reflect on thought-provoking topics that follow the Soul Matters curriculum and the church's
 monthly theme.

SANKOFA CORNER



REV. FRANK E. HEALEY A SPIRITUAL UNIVERSALIST

ev. Frank E. Healey was born on Feb. 12, 1830 in Potsdam, New York. His parentage is not certain. Essentially nothing is known of his childhood. By 1858, he was living in Lowell, Massachusetts, just over the state line from Nashua, New Hampshire where, on July 5, 1858, he married Maria L. Dimick, who had been born in Lyme, New Hampshire on Sept. 15, 1832, the daughter of John and Lydia P. (Turner) Dimick. Soon after his marriage, we find him associated with St. Lawrence University, a Universalist seminary founded in 1856 in Canton, New York where he attended for over a year, but did not complete the full course. He left the school in 1860, and just a year after he left St. Lawrence, he was in attendance at the New Hampshire Universalist Convention at the Lowell Street Church in Manchester from June 19-21, 1861 during which a "Letter of Fellowship [was] granted to Frank E. Healey of Winchester."

Thus began the preaching career of "a Universalist clergyman," as he is referred to in any number of documents in the years to come. A couple of his early activities include: officiating at the wedding of George W. M. Hibbard and Mrs. Rebecca P. Sanders in Lisbon, NH on Dec. 10, 1861, and participating in the dedication of the church at Andover on May 1, 1863 where "a hymn was…read by the Rev. F. E. Healey of Lisbon."

After the start of the Civil War, Healey was enumerated on the Consolidated List of all persons of Class I, subject to do military duty in the Third Congressional District, which was drawn up in June of 1863. He was described as follows: "Healey, Frank E., Age 33, White, Profession: Clergyman, married, Place of Birth: New York." Whether he actively served in the military is not known.

We find him next attending the Vermont Convention of Universalists in Morrisville on August 27, 1867. He is listed as having come into the state within the past year and was at the time living in Barnet, yet was also serving half-time at the Universalist church in Lyndon. In 1868 we find him serving as Standing Clerk of the Northern Association of Universalists which was holding its annual meeting in St. Johnsbury on Sept. 23-24 of that year.

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In 1869, it was reported that Rev. F. E. Healey of Lyndon, VT had received a call from the Universalist Board of Missions in New York and was offered an inducement of about \$1800 per year. The Burlington Free Press reported that "Mr. H...seems greatly attached to his present relation, and it is not probabl[e] that he will accept."

Beginning in 1871, Rev. Healey began a long-term association with the Derby Line Free Church (now known as the First Universalist Parish of Derby, VT) which moved to West Burke in 1871. He was frequently called upon to speak at the dedication of Universalist churches in the area, including the Church of the Messiah in St. Johnsbury in 1873. In 1878 he attended the Universalist General Convention in Providence, RI.

The 1880 census of Derby, VT lists Frank Healy, minister, 50 years old, born in New York as well as his wife, Maria L., at age 47, and two children: daughter Kate, age 17, born in New Hampshire, and son Frank, age 14, born in Pennsylvania. Kate went on to pursue musical studies at the Boston Conservatory of Music, and in 1885 Frank Jr. took possession of the jewelry business of E. E. Boomhower, which his father had purchased for him. By 1885, the Healey family had taken up residence in Morrisville.

During the 1880s, Rev. Healey kept up a regular schedule of preaching in the following towns in Vermont: St. Johnsbury, North Monroe, Barton, Morrisville, Glover, Wolcott, Cady's Falls, West Concord, West Burke, Canaan, Barre, and East Charleston, and also at Camp Diamond in New Hampshire. One news article wrote the following: "Mr. Healey is one of the ablest preachers in northern Vermont, and his discourses last Sunday delighted the large and appreciative audiences that listened to them."

In 1889, Rev. Healey went east and accepted a call from the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth, Maine. The church historian, Mary Ann Greely, wrote: "On May 5, Rev. Frank Healey preached for the first time as a candidate and having been hired for a year, began his pastorate on Sunday, May 26. The year of 1889-1890 was marked by no special feature until the resignation of Rev. Mr. Healey on May 18, 1890."

It is of interest to note that three months into his pastorate in Ellsworth, Rev. Healey traveled to the town of Etna to participate in the 13th annual meeting of the Maine Spiritual Camp at Camp Etna which lasted ten days, beginning on Aug. 29, 1889. A announcement about the meeting stated: "The following will also be present: Rev. Frank E. Healy, of Ellsworth...A cordial invitation is extended to all mediums in or out of the state to attend." Two months

later, he also attended the National Conference of Unitarian and other Christian Churches in Philadelphia, PA. Delegates from Ellsworth were Rev. Frank E. Healey, Mrs. Ann F. Greely, and Mrs. Abby M. Fulton, M.D.

In the fall of 1893, Rev. Healey authored a book entitled Human Destiny, a topic which he had earlier preached about in sermons dating from the spring of 1886. "The Lyndon Union say that Rev. F. E. Healey, formerly of this town, has written a book...which is now in the hands of the binders, and will be ready for delivery in a short time. Much interest is manifested in this book and it is predicted that it will have a large sale. Human Destiny is the title of the book, a subject on which Mr. Healey has in years past spent much time in reading, thinking and talking. He is a good reasoner, a candid man, and a fine writer, and his book will no doubt be very readable." The online description of the book is as follows:

Human Destiny - Man is immortal, evil is transitory, good is permanent: a study, by Frank E. Healey. Published 1893 by Republican Press in St. Johnsbury. Subjects: Spiritualism, Future life.

The 1900 Census of Everett, Massachusetts listed Frank E. Healey as a boarder in the home of James and Eliza Rozegrant. It noted that he had been born in Feb. 1830 in New York and was employed in a bakery alongside Nellie Brainard, a widow who had been born in Vermont in January of 1859 and was also boarding at the Rozegrants. It is significant to note that Rev. Healey's wife, Maria, who was still alive, was not living with her husband at the time. Maria died nine years later in Watertown, Connecticut in June of 1909 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Kate Snow, who was listed among her survivors alongside her son Frank E. Healey Jr. Interestingly, there was no mention of her husband. Her funeral was conducted by Rev. Edward C. Downey, pastor of the Universalist Church in Watertown.

In August of 1910, we read in the Orleans County Monitor of Barton, VT that "Rev. F. E. Healey, a former Universalist pastor here, is boarding at Charles Varney's for the summer. He is in poor health." He passed on January 8, 1913 in Sutton, VT of catarrhal pneumonia at the age of 82 years, 10 months, 24 days. He was listed as a "Universalist preacher." The Jan. 22, 1913 edition of the same paper wrote: "Mr. Healey was a very popular Universalist preacher when in the prime of life, and was at one time located in West Burke. Mr. Healey was eighty-two years of age and his mind has been in a shattered condition for some years. The funeral occurred on Thursday afternoon at the G. A. R. hall here. Rev. G. M. Davis officiated and selections were sung by Mrs. May Cheney and Miss Marion Walter. The burial was in Hillside cemetery. Those from out of town to attend the funeral were his children, Frank Healey of Fitchburg, Mass., and Mrs. Kate Snow of Watertown, Conn., and a friend, Mrs. Braynard of East Cambridge, Mass."
