Dear Ones,


Years ago, I copied these words by Angelus Silesius into my journal that's full of beloved poems and quotations I mean to live by:

LANDSCAPE & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

We now have a ramp leading out from the back door of the sanctuary - constructed under the direction of Ken Hanson, chair of the Building Committee.



Thanks to the vision and dedication of Paul Kelly and Kate O'dell of the Green Sanctuary Committee, we now have a functioning compost system in place. This past summer the church gardens benefited from the processed compost (black gold) that it generated.



The plants in the gardens have all been cut back and will lay under a bed of leaves until the spring. One last lone daisy.

The Winterberry and Holly have produced an abundance of beautiful red berries that the birds are feasting on. The cherry tree before the birds ate all of the fruit.

Since commencing the 3-church collaborative internship in August 2021 life has been a whirlwind of activity for me. And this last month things opened up that allowed this collaborative internship to really take precedence.

In August, due to constraints around Covid-19 precautions, my Clinical Pastoral Education in a hospital (required for school and by the UUA for ministers in training) was delayed; and as a result, pushed into my internship year. Thus, as September started my responsibilities included clinical placement hours, seminary classes, and internship (as well as also being called "Mom", of course)—Being the ever determined individual I thought, "I can do this."

The **Build Back Better Act** has passed the House of Representatives and will soon make its way to the Senate. The Act as it now stands represents a compromise with conservative Democrats and is not everything progressives wanted. But it still contains a lot that will benefit our nation, such as: an extension of the child tax credit; more than half a billion dollars for climate measures; affordable housing; universal Pre-K; paid family leave, and medical leave for all workers; stronger labor protections for workers; expanded access for older citizens to home and community-based care; deportation protection for undocumented immigrants for five years; support for lowering the cost of some prescription drugs; addition of hearing services for Medicare recipients; and expanded access to healthcare, among other provisions.

Unfortunately, our Representative, Jared Golden, voted against the Act despite the fact that a majority of Mainers favor the bill.

- 1. Tell Jared Golden you are disappointed in his vote. (Click here for a letter you can sign through the League of Conservation Voters.)
- 2. Thank Rep. Chellie Pingree for her vote in favor of BBB.
- 3. Urge your Senators to vote in favor of the bill.

SANKOFA CORNER



REV. WILLIAM DANIELS WISWALL (1787-1853)

Wiswall on Oct. 23, 1787 in Milford, Massachusetts, the seventh of the nine children of Timothy and Diadama (Daniels) Wiswall of Milford. He grew up in Milford and at the age of 21 was one of the young men of Milford to show up to march against an expected British attack on the town. The attack never happened, but the threat persisted and eventually erupted in the War of 1812. Nevertheless, on April 3, 1809, the town "voted to give the soldiers that turned out or were drafted in Dec. 1808 Two Dollars each, for their holding themselves in readiness to march at a minute's warning."

Lot Wiswall later enrolled at Harvard College from which he graduated in 1816 with an A.B. [Bachelors] degree. During the Commencement exercises on August 28, he appeared with three of his classmates on what was called a "Conference on astronomy, anatomy, the instincts of animals, and the moral and intellectual nature of man, as affording proof of an intelligent Creator." Three years later, he began taking classes towards an A.M. [Masters] degree at Harvard's famous Divinity School where he studied between 1819 and 1823. On Aug. 15, 1821, during the reading of dissertations by the Gentlemen scholars, we find Lot Wiswall speaking "On the defects of self-love as a principle of action." He received his A.M. degree that very month.

On the evening of Aug. 24, 1826, "Lot Wiswall, of Cambridge," was one of the eleven passengers aboard the steam brig New York which was sailing just off Petit Manan light. Around 9:00 p.m., a fire was discovered on the vessel, and the passengers had but ten minutes to escape in life boats to Petit Manan Island. The vessel was entirely consumed including nearly all of the passengers' baggage. One unfortunate gentleman, a Mr. Milo J. Whiton of Lee, Massachusetts, lost a trunk containing \$1800 in cash.

Mr. Wiswall went through a course of divinity studies at Harvard, and as late as September 1826, the name "Lot Wiswall" is still listed among the records of Harvard University as a "Candidate for the Ministry," but for certain reasons, he appears to have never formally graduated. He supplied Unitarian pulpits in various places, but never settled as a pastor. He lived mostly in Cambridge.

For whatever reason, Mr. Lot Wiswall decided to change his name in 1833. In the List of persons whose names have been changed in Massachusetts, 1780-1883, under Middlesex County, we find: "[t]hat Lot Wiswall, of Cambridge, may take the name of William Daniels Wiswall." Two years later, Rev. William Daniels Wiswall, had found a short-term position preaching to the Unitarian congregation in Castine, Maine starting on Dec. 24, 1835 and going into 1836, whereupon he returned to the Boston area. By that point, the small community of Unitarian thinkers in Ellsworth became aware of him and began negotiations to lure him to Ellsworth. He finally accepted their invitation and on July 5, 1837 he was formally ordained by the fledgling Ellsworth congregation. His pastorship was brief and by 1839 the congregation was running into financial difficulties and was on the verge of failure and Rev. Wiswall was not rehired.

By the age of 52, Rev. Wiswall had met 38-year old Ann Payson, born on Sept. 12, 1801 in Charlestown, Massachusetts, the daughter

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of Samuel and Grace (Welsh) Payson of Charlestown. The couple were married on Oct. 6, 1840 in Charlestown. He immediately planned to erect a handsome mansion on his family's homestead in Milford. Work had already begun on the foundation when his wife suddenly died on June 8, 1841 in Chelsea, MA and all of his plans were scuttled. The work on the house was abandoned and the ruins of the unfinished mansion remained for years.

His wife's death may have had a significant effect on his life. Five years later, famed Unitarian preacher Rev. Theodore Parker once hired Wiswall to substitute for him at the church in West Roxbury. Although Wiswall did show up at the church, for some reason he didn't preach. In Rev. Parker's preaching records for Jan. 18, 1846, he noted: "No preaching! (Wiswall was present!)"

Rev. Wiswall died on Nov. 30, 1853 in Roxbury, Massachusetts. His cause of death was listed as "paralysis."


