


Blessed are the seeds waiting in the darkness for the call of spring.


Thursday, April 7th at 4pm Rev. Amy Fiorilli, Facilitating





GRATITUDE FOR A NONANXIOUS PRESENCE

FROM OUR INTERN MINISTER VANESSA WILLIAMS

I have learned much in ministerial formation since starting seminary in 2019. I have learned framework for entering and leading in ministry; I have learned and practiced preaching; I have learned how to meet people where they are pastorally. While there are many more



lessons integrated into my life and still in progress, I think the one most integral to my continuation as a minister is my work in developing a non-anxious presence.

A nonanxious presence, first described by Rabbi Edwin Friedman is the demeanor of one "who provides a calm, cool, focused and collected environment that empowers others to be relaxed" (Wheeler).

In seminary we are told this is key in ministry from the first day of study. As we investigate theology, our own inner workings and how to minister this non-anxious presence is repeatedly lifted up. We get it, or at least think we do—until faced with a crisis. It is then we realize we need help, leverage, a means of handling the complexities of ministry and life gracefully.

As graduation is closing in the pressure is mounting for me. And in short Murphy's law of "anything that can go wrong will go wrong" has been the running trend. And I, cannot say I'm coming through unscathed, but I've retained a certain level of composure and steadfastness that I cannot imagine having had before seminary.

While I am grateful for all the lessons of academic study in seminary, it has been in the real life scenarios of ministry, including with and to my internship congregations that I most credit this growth. When things are getting particularly challenging I reflect on the *Serenity Prayer*, and remind myself to breathe. Just breathe.

Such a simple practice and reminder to maintain stability is ironically one that is a challenge to learn. In this process of ministerial formation we empty ourselves, only to look at the pieces and reassemble (or discard) them to form a more stable, grounded, ministerial persona, secured with nonanxious presence. I cannot say I am fully formed, or even will be upon graduation date. But the skills and presence gained will not dissipate, they are part of me now. And for this, to you dear congregants, I am grateful.

FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT GARY SHELLEHAMER

The word sustain is from the Latin sustinere and is about supporting, preserving and enduring. It derives from a combination of words: sub (base) and (teneo) support. As the theme of this year's Stewardship Pledge Drive, Sustaining Beloved Community--recognizing how together we are the base that works to not just maintain but to nourish and grow UUCE.



Almost 70 percent of our operating budget comes from your pledges. They are the foundation of our community. Your pledge enable us to maintain our facility and to continue working on our community connection, our mission, and our core values through actions within our circle of UUCE members and friends, as well as into our world.

This month, your Stewardship Committee will be contacting you to sustain UUCE through your pledge for the coming fiscal year. I want to thank Doug Bird for calling attention to the Gender/Sexual Diversity Alliance of Ellsworth High School requesting Ellsworth City Council about Rainbow Crosswalks in the downtown.

I also want to thank Rev. Mark Worth for attending the city council meeting to advocate for their request.

I was not able to attend the council meeting but wrote a letter sent to each member of the council in which I supported the student alliance. Because, in part, I spoke as a member of UUCE who is serving as board president, I want to share the letter with our beloved community:

I encourage the Ellsworth City Council to approve the request by the Gender/Sexuality Diversity Alliance of Ellsworth High School for the painting of rainbow street crossings in the downtown of the city. As the President of the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Ellsworth, a resident of the City, and a gay man, I encourage Ellsworth to recognize the value of all our citizens, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity (as well as a number of other self-defining characteristics that make us each unique and valuable individuals).

As the President of the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Ellsworth, our covenanted principles within the Unitarian Universalist Association recognize the worth and dignity of all individuals; an acceptance of one another; the need to strive for justice, equity, and compassion in human relations; and the recognition that we are interdependent with one another and with our world.


As a gay man--with memories of growing up with verbal and physical assaults, questioning my own value because of how I was treated, and feeling that I needed to hide my true orientation from others--I hope for acknowledgement that we are now more accepting of our differences as we work together for the betterment of our world.

Approving the painting of the crosswalks is a small token of acceptance in our community.

The council voted 4-3 to approve the painting of the crosswalks and I have asked the student's advisor to let me know when the painting will be done in case there is anything volunteers from UUCE can do to assist in the project.

SANKOFA CORNER



A SKETCH OF THE LIFE **OF JOHN THOMAS** (1847-1902)

ohn Thomas was born sometime around September 1847 in Charleston, South Carolina. By the early 1850s, he and the members of his family were sold to an elderly white woman. He remained with her until he was 18 years old (around 1865) but was freed when President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on Jan. 1, 1863.

An unidentified Ellsworth woman wrote the following account of how Mr. Thomas ended up in Ellsworth. "At the close of the war of the rebellion, as the Union troops were marching through Charleston, S. C. to take transports for the North, a group of boys attracted by the regiment band followed the soldiers to the dock. As one of the young officers stepped aboard the ship, he turned to a boy who stood by his side and asked him if he would like to go North. The officer was Francis Jackson Garrison, a son of the great abolitionist William Lloyd Garrison. The boy was John Thomas. Arriving in Boston, the officer carried his ward to his father's house, where in the years before the war so many fugitive slaves had found shelter. Here he stayed for several months until Mr. Garrison sent him to Ellsworth in response to an application from Hon. Samuel Waterhouse for a trustworthy boy." Mr. Waterhouse was a founding member of the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth on Oct. 31, 1965, and it was in that year that the young John Thomas began attending functions at the church. He stayed with the Waterhouse family until Mr. Waterhouse moved with his family to lowa sometime in the late 1860s.

By the time of the 1870 Census, Mr. Thomas was listed as one of two domestic servants of John Black, Jr. and his second wife Sarah (Jordan) Black who were living at the Black residence on the Surry Road:

Sunday School records of the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth indicate that Mr. Thomas became associated with the FUSE community at the time of its inception. The Society was formed on Oct. 31, 1865 and Sunday School classes were established at the outset. The earliest records we have of individual classes date from 1874 and among the nine students in Miss Flora E. Osgood's class number 12 is: "John Thomas - colored," age 26, resident of Surry Road (John Black Jr.). John was ten years older than the rest of his classmates. He continued attending Miss Osgood's class for at least three years. In 1875, at age 27, he is among the ten students in her class, and in 1876, at the age of 28, he is one of her 13 students.

John remained with the Black family for about twenty years. Mr. Black died in 1879 and the following year, the 1880 census taker listed him as a black male, age 32, working as a servant in the home of Sallie Black and her mother Tempy Jordan. His profession/occupation was recorded as: "Works on Farm." Mrs. Black died on Oct. 8, 1890, having outlived her mother by two days, and the home was closed. After Mrs. Black's death, John began a decade of residence in the household of Isaac M. and Catherine B. (Caswell) Grant on West Main Street, next door neighbors of Everard and Ann Greely and it was there that we find him on June 12, 1900, when the census taker did the rounds of Ellsworth. At some point during his residence with the Grants, he had the opportunity to travel again to Boston where he paid a visit to William Lloyd Garrison, Jr. He was well remembered and kindly welcomed to the Garrison home, every courtesy being shown to the elderly colored man.

It was in the Grant home on Water Street that he died on Thursday, March 6, 1902 of heart disease. He had been employed by the Grants for about ten years. He had been in poor health for about a month, during which time he was tenderly cared for, and he had even been out and about the day before his death. He was 57 years old at the time of his death and unmarried. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and a constant attendant. His funeral services, held at the Methodist church on Saturday, March 8, 1902 at 10:00 a.m. with Rev. J. P. Simonton officiating, were largely attended and "no more touching tribute to a life of righteousness was ever given than was offered by the pastor." "A man of whom no one can ever say a word of harm," said a prominent businessman on the day of the funeral. "I hope everyone can speak as well of me when my turn comes,"

said a boy who had listened to the comments on every hand as the funeral passed up Main street."

How wonderful it is to see "the tribute which a whole town offers to a humble life which has been lived in its midst – a life of self-respect, temperance in all things, and faithfulness."

He had the distinction of being Ellsworth's only colored resident, and was well known in the vicinity. "John Thomas...was Ellsworth's link between the present and a past that has gone down to history as the most memorable epoch in the life of the nation."

"Lacking education, and of simple mind, John yet possessed principles that would do credit to many of larger pretentions. He was thoroughly honest, and a loyal servant. By frugality, he saved a little money, and at one time owned small interests in several Ellsworth vessels. This he lost, and of his savings

little if any remained at his death. John Thomas will long be missed in Ellsworth."

"From the viewpoint of the world, it was a most commonplace life, yet this ex-slave, without education, doing the humblest work, through strict morality, integrity, and faithfulness in small things as in great, has left behind him a reputation of which many a more favored man might be proud. With a simple-hearted faith in humanity, he became the victim of many a joke – thoughtless, rather than cruel, yet it may be said of him that he had the respect of all his fellow citizens."


UUCE OFFICE
