SANKOFA CORNER

REV. GEORGE ARCHIBALD RILEY (1905-1955)



George Archibald Riley was born on September 4, 1905 in Reeds Ferry, a neighborhood of Merrimack, New Hampshire, the oldest child of John William Riley, a farmer from New Brunswick.

and Isabella James (MacLay) Riley from Scotland. As a student at Manchester (NH) High School, from which he graduated in 1924, he was known as a serious student and also an outstanding athlete. Although he came from a Methodist and Presbyterian background, he entered the liberal Universalist Tufts College and the Crane Theological School in 1924 where he majored in theology and graduated with the class of 1928,





receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts. While at Tufts, he was the circulation manager for The Tufts Weekly, a student newspaper. He was also a member of the Beta Kappa fraternity. Beside his name in the 1928 yearbook is the quote: "They're only truly great who are truly good"

His first practical experience in ministry was a summer assignment in Berlin, NH in 1926, followed by a second assignment in Nottingham, NH in 1927. He served as acting minister in the Universalist Church of Marlboro, MA from Dec. 1927 to June 1928, and had a stint at the Universalist church in South Paris, ME from then until May of 1929. After a few years of association with the Universalist denomination, he wrote to the American Unitarian Association (AUA) saying: "I would like to enter the Unitarian ministry because I feel that it is more liberal than the Universalist, affords more opportunity for constructive work, and is the denomination in which I would find myself the more at home."

His first formal call to Unitarian ministry was here at the Ellsworth church, where he began serving on December 1, 1929 and was ordained here on |an. 12, 1930. Representatives of the AUA were expected to be present at the ordination, but on the drive from Bangor they were beset with a flat tire and their inexperienced taxi driver didn't know how to replace it. Of course, no one had

a cell phone in 1930, so they had no way to let anyone at the church know that they wouldn't be able to make it, and several "scathing" remarks were made by members of the congregation. Eventually, all was forgiven.

It was during Rev. Riley's third year of work at the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth, and the third year of the Depression, that Ellsworth was hit with the devastating fire of Sunday, May 7, 1933. Our church building was not affected, and Rev. Riley was lucky that his home at 60 Hancock Street narrowly escaped the fate that befell his neighbors across the street. During the rehabilitation work that followed the fire, a member of the AUA happened to pass through Ellsworth and found Rev. Riley "efficiently officiating behind a coffee pot." An AUA official then wrote to Rev. Riley: "There is something about serving the **tables** of the Lord, but I should think that serving the **cups** of the Lord would be even better, for a cup of hot coffee does hearten one a lot."

Rev. Riley later wrote to the AUA: "This has been an exceedingly difficult year in Ellsworth. Besides the general depression, there has been the fire, the extended banking reorganization, and the deaths of some of our people whom we could ill afford to lose. I think, however, that we will be able to make both ends meet and can look for better times another year."

While in Ellsworth, Rev. Riley continued his studies at the University of Maine, receiving an M.A. Degree in 1935 in Economics and Sociology. His thesis was entitled "History of Tanning in the State of Maine." He completed his pastorate in Ellsworth on November 24, 1936, and was feted with a farewell party that evening with the entire parish in attendance.

Among his accomplishments in Ellsworth, he increased church membership, formed a Young People's Religious Union (YPRU), organized a Laymen's League chapter, and helped the church prosper generally. At the state level, he served for two years on the executive committee of the Unitarian State Conference, was chairman of the Resolutions Committee, assisted in planning a Laymen's Ministers conference in Kennebunk, and was on the committee for the Annual Retreat at the Bangor Theological Seminary. He also served for five years as president of the Hancock County Conference of Unitarian Churches during which time attendance increased to over 400 participants. While in Ellsworth, he served as chairman of the annual Red Cross drive for two years, and also helped organize a Community Forum in Ellsworth which met at the local theatre on Sunday afternoons for two winters.

Riley also engaged in social service work, and for five years was chairman of the municipal committee on child welfare, in charge of delinquent children and mothers' aid cases. He worked with the state social service worker over a period of five years in the Ellsworth area. He was also active in various sports events, including organizing a church basketball league and directing a town baseball team, and won the singles championship in a county-wide tennis tournament organized by the Ellsworth Outing Club. He also enjoyed travel, and over the course of two summers he traveled to Scotland, England, Scandinavia, Germany, France, Czechoslovakia, Holland, and Denmark and gave presentations on his travels in many forums.

After his pastorate in Ellsworth, he became minister of the Channing Church in Rockland, Massachusetts from 1936 to 1942. During this pastorate, he continued his studies at the Harvard Divinity School, and was granted the S.T.B. degree (Bachelor of Sacred Theology) in 1941.

On August 28, 1938, in Rockland, he married Mary Louisa Lamar of Rockland. The couple had two children: a daughter, Isabel MacLay Riley, born in Boston in March of 1941, and a son, John William Riley, born on May 20, 1943, also in Boston. The couple eventually separated.

Rev. Riley later went on to serve Unitarian congregations in Roslindale (1942-1946) and Clinton, Massachusetts (1946-1948). On May 1, 1949, he was installed as minister of the Castine Unitarian Church where he served for one year.

Rev. Riley was also an educator and taught American and modern European history in private and public schools. He served on the faculties of Emerson College (in 1944), the Browne and Nichols School in Cambridge, and the Maine Maritime Academy. In addition, he served as program director of boys' summer camps in Massachusetts and New Hampshire for several seasons.

He died in Abington, Massachusetts on March 23, 1955 at the age of 49, and he was buried in South Weare, New Hampshire. His wife, Mary, later remarried a man named Swift and moved to Nevada.

Mr. W. Beach Miller, writing in The Unitarian Yearbook, 1955-1956, wrote: "George A. Riley was a man of steadfast spirit who never wavered in his loyalties. Sincerity was the keynote of his life and ministry. He sympathized with all men in their troubles and his ministry reflected his keen sense of social responsibility. He was only intolerant of injustice and sham. His devotion to his profession and family caused him to neglect his own health. For years he worked without a vacation or even a brief period of rest."


