Sara, Mary Murray & Camino Approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile one-way. The tranquil and gentle path along the on top of Great Pond Mountain, Penobscot River is a great place for a stroll or to soak in the sites of Fort Knox and $\frac{1}{2}$ the Penobscot Narrow Bridge.

The 6-foot wide walkway is paved with bricks, and is mostly flat. Many benches along the walk offer plenty of places to stop and rest and take in the view. There is a hill a quarter-mile west the US-1 bridge that goes up then down again over about 0.1 miles, with a maximum grade of 13%.

Your UU Church of Ellsworth is in the planning stages for our participation in this year's **COMMON GROUND FAIR**.


But, WE NEED YOUR INPUT!!!

In the Jardens at UUCE

We have been busy weeding and mulching and are grateful that we have had a good amount of rain this spring. All the plants look happy and some have really "blossomed" this year.

On this past Sunday, several people remarked on the beautiful yellow flowers along the circular drive. They are Sundrops (Oenothera fruticosa), also called Narrow-leaf Evening Primrose, although they aren't actually related to Primrose.

Also along the circular drive we have planted a patch of sunflowers – acknowledging our solidarity with the people of Ukraine - and will place a Ukrainian flag in the spot as well. So far no critters have eaten the young sunflowers but keeping the deer at bay has been a real challenge this year.

They have munched on several delectable blooms even as we try to stay vigilant about spraying deer repellent. We also have "predator eyes" – little solar devices we've placed around the church property that flash what looks like a pair of red eyes at night.

We've added a small herb garden in the back in what once had been a circular sand box.

REV. HERMAN HENRY GEERTZ (1914-1964), **PART 2:**

"WHAT?! THE UNITARIANS ARE CALLING A GERMAN PASTOR IN THE MIDDLE OF THIS WAR?"

When Herman Henry Geertz came to candidate in Ellsworth in the summer of 1942, the United States was thoroughly involved in a war with Germany in Europe. Mr. & Mrs. Geertz arrived in Ellsworth on June 20, 1942, and he preached two Sundays in a row, June 21 and June 28, using the week in between to get to know the Ellsworth community. Geertz expressed some concerns to Dan Fenn, chair of the AUA's fellowship committee, who later wrote to FUSE board president Lyle L. Brown: "[Geertz] was quite disturbed by an apparent feeling of suspicion evidenced during the week because of his German name...I can feel very strongly the inadvisability of having Mr. Geertz settled in a seaport town where there is any amount of this sentiment which would be interfering with the possibility of his fulfilling the ministry of your church." After the Geertzes had left Ellsworth, a special parish meeting was held on Wednesday, July 1, during which Geertz's candidacy was discussed. Rev. Henry Hallam Saunderson, a long-time friend of the Ellsworth church, spoke at this special meeting and, in Fenn's words, "did a splendid piece of work...in interpreting the whole situation to the parish." What follows is a letter from Rev. Saunderson to Dan Fenn in which he summarizes his presentation to the congregation. [Underlining is Saunderson's.]

My dear Fenn,

I am glad to get your letter of yesterday, and I hasten to reply, and very frankly. The situation is critical both for the young man beginning his ministry, and for the church striving for survival.

I began coming to this part of the Maine coast when I was an undergraduate in Harvard College; so I have known the Ellsworth church for a long time. The people regard me as a friend who can be trusted. I speak very frequently, and associate with the people. So I was invited urgently to attend, and share in the meeting which voted the call to Mr. Geertz.

In the beginning of my address to the people at the meeting, I made the very emphatic statement that I would not advise them how to vote. I said that anything I said about the young man, in praise of him, was not to be construed as an expression of an opinion that he ought

to be called; nor was anything I said about the difficulties of the situation to be construed as a suggestion that it would be better not to call him.

Then I pointed out the qualities of his preaching, and other work, and the evidence he gave of being a growing man. (I attended the service both Sundays when he preached.) I spoke of his education, and of my knowledge of the Newton-Andover school, where I have lectured frequently. In these matters I could speak very favorably of the young man.

When it came to the matter of his German origin, I pointed out that three things were to be considered very carefully:

- 1) The actual truth about the man.
- 2) The doubts that there might be in the minds of the members of the church.
- 3) The prejudices which might exist, or might develop later, in the community.
- 1) As to the man himself, I had the facts, which the people of the church <u>had not yet learned</u>. His father and mother were German born; but they left Germany before the first World War because they hated the German <u>autocracy</u>, and wanted to find the American Way of Life. They came to our Middle West. The man became a devoted and successful Congregational minister. Their children were born here, educated here, and were reared in devoted loyalty to America.

So this young man, candidate for the position of minister of their church, is a native-born American citizen of <u>unquestionable loyalty and devotion to this country</u>. He has a brother in the armed forces of the United States. In his second sermon, this candidate had given clear-cut expression to his faith in the American cause in this war. In conversation with me, he had declared his detestation of the German government.

- 2) I said to the people at the meeting that they ought to know these facts about the candidate. And I said: "You should search your minds and hearts to know if you are able and willing to put aside all doubts about him, and to work together devotedly, under his leadership. If you vote to call him, it means that you have made that search, and have found a clear affirmative answer to it."
- Then I said that they were confronted with a very serious question as to how the man would be received in the community, and also what might be said in the community about "The Unitarian Church bringing a German into this town." I pointed [out] that there was no reason for such prejudice; but that the prejudice, the suspicion, might already exist, or might develop.

Then I said, "You must search again your own minds, your wills, and see if you are ready to face the community with <u>unflagging courage</u> on this issue, in case you do call the man. If you are ready, in any emergency which may arise, <u>to stand up and fight for your man</u>, you can face the future with confidence." Again I pointed out that any <u>adverse attitude</u> toward the man would be based on <u>prejudice</u> and not on <u>reason</u>. And I pointed out also that a stalwart defense of the

church, on an issue of decency and fair play, would be a wholesome thing for the church.

And finally I said that they must know their own minds, and take the whole responsibility of casting their votes.

Every individual in the meeting was then called upon to speak and express himself in this issue. Then there was a <u>written</u> ballot. The ballot was entirely "Yes;" it was not necessary to <u>make it unanimous</u>, for it was unanimous <u>already</u>. The people are ready to stand their ground. They are a very staunch group of good people.

Mr. Geertz and his wife both told me, before they left Ellsworth, that they had been treated with much kindness, but had been conscious of an atmosphere of <u>reserve</u>, and they knew the reason for it. They felt uncertain about the wisdom of accepting a call, in case it were voted, but the <u>unanimous</u> vote by a meeting which <u>faced squarely</u> the issue, may give them confidence to undertake the job.

Please keep me informed of developments.

On July 2, the day after this special parish meeting was held, the church secretary, Mrs. Eva Osgood, penned the following letter to Mr. Geertz:

Dear Mr. Geertz -

At a special meeting of the First Unitarian Church of Ellsworth called last evening, July 1, it was voted unanimously to call you to be Pastor of this church, beginning September 1, 1942.

The attendance at the meeting was not large, but a good representation of the active, interested members. And today has brought expressions of pleasure on the part of some who could not attend the meeting. They were glad of the decision made by those attending.

The salary you will receive is \$1,300.00 and the use of the parsonage. Our constitution and bylaws calls for no limited term of pastorate. The agreement goes on as long as both minister and church are satisfied. When either minister or church feels the time has come to make a change, they are free to do so.

The trustees will make the parsonage ready for occupancy.

We hope for a favorable reply to our call and we will be very happy to welcome you and Mrs. Geertz in September.


UUCE OFFICE
