- Zoom greeters need to be on Zoom by 10:15 and greet folks in the chat and try to collect contact info via chat and then send that to me so we can do outreach.



Save the Date, Saturday, May 20. Field trip to Malaga Island, off Phippsburg,

Maine. The 8th principle task force is planning a field trip to Malaga Island on Saturday May 20. The island was populated by a mixed race cultural community from the mid-1800s to 1912 until they were forcibly removed by the state of Maine, their homes were destroyed, 8 of the 47 residents were institutionalized as feeble-minded, and the buried dead were exhumed and relocated off the island. UUA Bylaws Article II

Did you know our UU Principles may be changing? After a multi-year listening project, the Article II Study Commission appointed by the UUA has proposed revisions to Article II of the bylaws, which includes our 7 principles.



The proposal will go to a vote at the June 2023 General Assembly. If it passes it will be submitted for a final vote at GA 2024. KEEP ON MOVING FORWARD


FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT GARY SHELLEHAMER

Love is the spirit of this church, and service its law; this is our great covenant: to dwell together in peace, to seek the truth in love, and to help one another.


STAYING CONNECTED
