

Headlining the festival will be the <u>Curbside</u> Queens. Warming up the stage will be The Wayside, an Ellsworth-based band, and Midnight Rose, of Hermon. Local LGBTQIA+ community members will have the chance to mingle and build connections as well as enjoy music and personalities on stage. August 30 11am - 1pm. Cultural Connections in the Park: Talk and Storytelling with Dwayne Tomah, Passamaquoddy.

Sieur de Monts Spring, Acadia National Park. The Cultural Connections in the Park series occurs on select Wednesdays from June through September. Dwayne Tomah, Passamaquoddy, will be hosting a talk and storytelling program regarding his work with the Passamaquoddy wax cylinders, which are the earliest known field recordings of Native Americans. These recordings, preserved on wax cylinders in 1890, include Passamaquoddy narratives, vocabulary, number lists, and songs. The Passamaquoddy Tribe and the Library of Congress have worked on restoring, digitizing, and revitalizing these recordings as digital repatriation. All of these programs are sponsored by Dawnland, LLC, are offered in partnership with the Abbe Museum, and are free and open to the public.

Hancock County Neighborhood Support
Team (HCNST) is seeking volunteers to support
Ukrainian refugee families on MDI. HCNST is a
community-wide, church-based (but open to all),
non-denominational effort to resettle refugees
under a Federal Government Program. Their
immediate need is for volunteers to work with a
group of 5 to 10 to shepherd them through all of




And YOU, you UUCE-ers, are all a bunch of rock stars! With your support, we met our stewardship goal of \$149,625! Way to go - and thank you lots!

Margery (1928-2022) and Irving Forbes (1922-2008)

Margery Forbes was born Zella Margery Shrecengost on Sept. 14, 1928 in Roswell, New Mexico, the third child and only daughter of Darling Jacob Shrecengost, of Pennsylvania Dutch extraction, and Mary Zella Graves, of Texas, although her family was originally from North Carolina. Margery married Irving Forbes in 1964. Irving had been born Alexander Irving Forbes on Sept. 11, 1922 in Milton, Massachusetts, the third child and only son of Dr. Alexander Forbes, a well-known physiologist from Milton who later taught at Harvard. Dr. Forbes' grandfather was Ralph Waldo Emerson. Irving's mother was Charlotte Irving Grinnell, originally from Manhattan. Charlotte's great-grandfather, Ebenezer Sanders Irving, was a brother to the author Washington Irving.

Irving became involved with music while he was in high school at the Milton Academy. When he was 16, he used to go hear members of the Boston Symphony play and he got enamored with the bassoon. So he drove himself to New York, stayed

with his grandmother, went to all the pawn shops in New York, and finally came home with a bassoon. He had a bassoon teacher and he managed to get into a youth symphony which was funded by the government at that time. He graduated with great difficulty from

Milton Academy in 1942. He immediately enlisted in the Navy and went all the way down to the South Pacific. He was always different from the other guys. He wasn't interested in sitting there and shooting crap and talking about all their exploits with women. That didn't interest him, but he did play the piano for the religious services. They finally ended up in the Solomon Islands. He was playing for a church service there when he succumbed to being baptized a Christian during the church service. Irving's father later wrote him a letter saying he had been informed by someone that this had happened, and he told Irving more about the Unitarian religion and his own beliefs. Irving later regretted that baptism, as he had been raised in the big Unitarian church in Milton.

After the war, Irving married his high school sweetheart, Ellen Fuller, in 1944. She had already started going to Oberlin College. They both went to Oberlin. He went one semester, and then left. When he came back, they got married. They were the first married couple in Oberlin College and they couldn't live on campus as students. He finished his bachelor's degree at Oberlin. They had four children: Alexander was the first, then Benjamin Channing (Ellen Fuller was related to the Channings), then Elizabeth Charlotte, and then Lawrence Irving Forbes.

After they married, Irving got a job in Colebrook, NH, the northernmost town in New Hampshire, right next to Canada. That was his first job. Then he got a job in Portsmouth, NH, and from there they went to Kittery, ME, which is right across the river. They bought a house in Kittery, and all four children grew up there.

In the meantime, Margery had started college at the New England Conservatory in Boston. After her graduation, she went on to get a Master's degree there.

She had gone to Tanglewood one summer and got enamored with chamber music, so that's what she did for her Master's recital. At some point, Margery married a man named Richard Bacon Johns and they had moved to Kittery Point. Irving needed a piano

accompanist, and Margery assumed that position. He was working on a Master's degree at Boston University, and he had to give a bassoon recital. He actually did the recital at the University of New Hampshire where he played a Vivaldi concerto with a small chamber orchestra. But BU insisted that he do a recital there, so Irving had Margery go down there as his accompanist and play in this recital, to which nobody came because he didn't really know anybody there. Well, his sister came, and his teacher, and so he did his recital at BU and got his Master's.

Irving began teaching at Philips Exeter Academy in 1959. He had been teaching in the public schools in Kittery, where he had all kinds of troubles. The principals were never rooting for the music department. He would try to have a glee club and they would have to meet at 7:00 in the morning because there was no space in the school program. He did create a men's group (a boys' choir) and he would take them down to Philips Exeter where they had a wonderful men's glee club, directed by Arthur Landers, just to expose them to good music. In 1959 Arthur said to him, "Why don't you apply for a job here?" So he applied and Landers hired him, but Ellen did not want to move to Exeter. By that time, they had grown apart and she wanted to get rid of him. During his first year or two at Philips Exeter, he commuted the 25 miles from Kittery Point to Exeter

nearly every day, and that grew pretty tiresome. In the meantime, Irving had gotten closer and closer to Margery, whose husband had decided he didn't want to be married and had left. Eventually both Irving and Margery divorced their spouses and years later, in 1964, Irving and Margery got married in Lincoln, New Mexico. After the marriage, Margery moved to Exeter, NH and became engaged in teaching piano privately. She and Irving became active in the Exeter Unitarian church and Irving became choir director "right off the bat."

When Irving was hired by Exeter Academy, he had to teach all of the band instruments, and he also directed the orchestra, which he loved. In 1965, Arthur Landers became incapacitated and Irving suddenly became chairman of the music department which was a pretty robust department. He also had to direct the men's glee club which eventually became co-ed, which

pleased Irving because he could do four-part pieces. Irving worked at Philips Exeter for 28 years, from 1959 until he retired in June of 1987.

Margery and Irving moved to Maine in July of 1987 and Irving found their new home near Peters

Cove on the East Blue Hill Road, not far from

Harbor Island which his father had purchased back in the early 1900s. Irving and Margery immediately joined the Bagaduce Chorale and a woman whom they met there was a Christian Scientist who told them that they were looking for an organist for their church, so Irving volunteered to play the organ there for about six months. They then started attending the Unitarian Universalist Church of Ellsworth, joining about 1988, and fairly quickly Margery started serving a two-year stint as church pianist, which she did until Kathy

Sikkema took over in the early 90s. Irving also began directing the UUCE choir which then consisted of Phil and Pam Person, Howard and Carol Glefke, and John and Evangeline Bicknell.

On Oct. 19, 1991, Irving and Margery led several church members on a hike along the Peters Brook Trail near their home. It was an auction items that they offered during the Goods and Services Auction that the church has continued to hold for years. As Margery explained: "It was a fundraiser, and he would take them out to Big Peters Brook. We live on Little Peters Brook, and then a little ways down you come to Big Peters Brook, which is now under the auspices of the Blue Hill Heritage Trust, so there's a sign there. And Irving would

take them up along the brook. I can't remember how far. There's a kind of a nice waterfall. And then they'd come back and we'd have lunch here, and that is what you'd bought."

In later years, Irving made a mark in local music by creating the Peters Cove Mens' Chorus and also by leading the yearly "Messiah Sing" at the Blue Hill Congregational Church every December. After Irving died in 2008, their two sons, Douglas and Eben, and Douglas's two grandsons took Irving's ashes out to Harbor Island. There's another little island off that which Irving just loved called Baker Island. He had found a granite boulder there and carved his initials in it with his birthdate: 1922. So they took his ashes out in June of 2014 and buried them on that island.

Margery continued being active in musical affairs in Maine. In 2014 she made the decision to move to Massachusetts to be near her son Eben. She passed on Sept. 22, 2022 in Northampton.


