Greetings UUCE Congregates and Families,





This 5-session series began on September 27 and concludes on November 1. You must have participated in the first event in order to participate in subsequent sessions.
- Energy Switch (Tuesday, October 10, 3:00 4:00 PM), hosted by Mary Haynes. This is a point-counterpoint series on climate change and energy. This month's topic is The Future of Natural Gas.
- Coffee with ... (Our guest, the date and time of this event is TBA). The Coffee With... series is a monthly event in which we get to know our UUCE staff and lay leaders. We'll start with an interview with our guest by the host Mary Haynes and will then open up the discussion for comments and Q&A time.

- Let's Talk About God (Thursday, October 12, 3:00 – 4:00 PM), hosted by Mary Haynes.
 - This is the second of a 3-part discussion, with one meeting per month. In this session we'll focus on the following topics: Is God all good? Is God all-powerful? How do we reconcile the existence of evil in a world with a good God? How is it that bad things can happen to good people if God is love? How do we make sense of praying to God when God doesn't answer our prayers to avert both man-made and natural disasters? How do we utilize the concept of a good God to make a positive difference in the world? You are welcome to join us for this discussion even if you didn't attend the first session. The survey is an exploration of your own views about God, there are no right or wrong answers, and it is submitted anonymously.

 Lamb. This two-part (and possibly three-part

 story of your life in a way that will ensure that you
 and your life are remembered well and accurately.
- Monthly Movie Night (Sunday, October 15, 6:00 8:30 PM). The movie for October is Descendants, which is the story of the descendants of the last slave ship to arrive in the US (which took place after such ships were no longer legally allowed). This is the same movie that we tried unsuccessfully to air in August. We've figured how to share a movie now.
- Stitch and Chat (Monday, October 16, 3:00

 4:00 PM), hosted by Marta Rieman. This is a monthly gathering (on the 3rd Monday of each month) of those who enjoy needlework to get together and chat while working on individual

- projects. It's an old-fashioned sewing circle with the modern update of taking place virtually.
- October 23, 7:00 8:00 PM). The Block
 Party is a monthly gathering of all the people who have joined the site. It's a purely social event, and allows members to interact in a large group for a period of time and then break out into very small groups so that participants get a chance to know one another better.
- October 25, 1:00 2:30 PM), hosted by Robin Lovrien. The book for this meeting is TBA. This group meets on the fourth Wednesday each month. David Johnston Conner was born on July 23, 1932 in Melrose, Massachusetts, the son of Raymond William Conner and Lucille Augusta Lamson. The family later moved to Cutchogue on Long Island, New York. David graduated from Stuyvesant High School in New York City in 1950. Soon after graduating from high school, David married Nancy Joy Knoud and to them were born three children: Timothy in 1953, Stephen in 1954, and Elizabeth in 1956.

In September of 1957, he was sponsored by a Baptist church in New York to come to the Bangor Theological Seminary (BTS) where, in addition to his studies, he participated in the Seminary Choir, singing bass. While studying there, he also served as the assistant minister at the First Baptist Church in Waterville, but

occasionally preached at the United Baptist Church in Waterville.

Not long after Rev. Walter F. Smith finished his pastorate at the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth (FUSE) in the spring of 1960, the Board of Trustees began looking for a new minister for the church, and at a meeting held on June 4, Herbert Lord read a letter from Board Chair Gordon Ramsdell that suggested that Mr. David Conner, a BTS student, be hired as minister at a salary of \$45 per week, plus the use of the parsonage with heat furnished beginning immediately, even though church services wouldn't resume until the first Sunday in September. Lewis Smith moved to accept the recommendation of the BOT. This was seconded by Herbert Lord, and the Board voted to hire him. A group consisting of Messrs. Royal, Lord, Mason, and Beal, along with the assistance of some of the women in the parish, formed a team to renovate the parsonage, located at 40 Elm Street.

Among the interesting sermon titles that Conner used during his pastorate at FUSE

were "Tea and Sympathy," which looked at the possibilities of a Unitarian service of communion, "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Hancock County," "Natural Law," "Was Calvin Right When He Burned Servetus at the Stake?: Bring wood, matches, etc. pending our decision in the matter," and "The Church's Girdle."

By November of 1960, both David and his wife Nancy were singing in the Acadia Choral Society, then under the direction of Mrs. Tsuin Hwa Hsu [Malen Hsu's mother]. At Christmas, the Women's Alliance presented the new minister with a gift of \$15, and soon after, on Jan. 4, 1961, Mr. Conner spoke to the members of the Alliance at the home of Mrs. Neal Raymond. By the following April, Mr. Conner had become involved with the Ellsworth school system, where his oldest children were in elementary school, and he was elected President of the Ellsworth PTA. The next month, FUSE held its annual meeting during which Mr. Conner reviewed the previous church year and expressed hopes for a more ambitious program for the ensuing year.

September of 1961 marked the beginning of Mr. Conner's second year as minister of FUSE. In addition to delivering Sunday morning sermons, he was also occasionally invited to deliver sermons at other locations, such as the Maplecrest Nursing Home. At the end of September, Roy J. Hatt, of the Department of Education of the recently created Unitarian Universalist Association, came to visit the FUSE church school and prepare a field report. He specifically wanted to meet with the superintendent, Mrs. Ann Black, teachers from the church school, and the minister. They discussed the curriculum, the placement of classes, and children's worship and also talked over ways to improve the church school and strengthen the adult program. There were at the time 16 children enrolled in the church school, although the capacity was for 30 to 35. Mr. Hatt also made a presentation to about 12-15 members of the congregation concerning the objectives of

liberal religious education. Among the audience members were "Mr. Norge" (meaning Mr. Robert Noé), the former minister at the church, his wife (our beloved Dot Noé), and Professor and Mrs. Gordon Ramsdell. In his field report, Mr. Hatt described Mr. Conner as "intelligent and dedicated," and noted that he was now a full-time student at the University of Maine. He also wrote: "He hopes to complete his theological education at a school other than the Bangor Seminary."

On January 2, 1962, Mr. Conner assumed the added duty as chaplain for the Hancock County Civil Air Patrol Squadron, a position he was not altogether unfamiliar with as he had previously served as a cadet in New York State. His focus was primarily in the area of character and citizenship guidance programs with the local Cadet Squadron, yet he also assisted with special activities of the Senior Squadron.

At the Annual Meeting held on May 2, 1962, Mr. Conner's report "was read and placed on file." In the report, Mr. Conner notes that he had officiated at four funerals and two weddings, had delivered 39 sermons, and had paid 113 pastoral visits to church members. He also points out other activities that he engaged in, and gives thanks to various church members who had done their part to keep the church running smoothly. He states, "I am convinced that among the many churches of Ellsworth, we, potentially at least, have the most to offer. It is our task to develop and nurture that potential so that it may one day blossom and unfold."

As 1962 progressed, the church began to take a hard look at issues which had plagued it for several years, including its limited funds, a building that was falling apart, an aging population, and the ever decreasing number of children in the church school. The minutes of the Annual Meeting go on to say: "The business of what to do about a minister was presented, with the following choices: 1. Keep David Conner; 2. Have student supplies; 3. Become a fellowship;

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or 4. Close. As there was a tie vote on the final ballot and some members had left the meeting, the meeting was postponed until a new meeting could be called by the Board of Trustees. The vote was 16-16 with 7 abstentions."

During this same meeting, the Treasurer, Herbert Lord, indicated that during the previous fiscal year, out of a total budget of \$4707.08, expenses had included \$2500 for the minister's salary and \$639.99 for parsonage utilities and paint. The Finance Committee then presented its proposed budget for the fiscal year 1962-1963. Included in the budget was the following statement: "The major changes in this budget over the previous year's are: the inclusion of the parsonage utilities in the minister's salary, and a modest raise for the minister." The original allocation for the minister was to be \$4000.00

At the follow-up meeting, held on May 17, 1962, the minutes noted: "On a proposal by Fred Mason, seconded by Herbert Lord, it was voted to keep David Conner for another year. The vote was 20 yes - 15 no and 1 undecided. The proposed budget was changed to read Salary \$3000.00 and it was agreed to pay utilities, which item was estimated at \$550.00."

Mr. Conner, in addition to his duties at the church, also made himself available to other groups in the community. He continued his work with the Ellsworth PTA, he gave speeches to groups such as the National Honor Society, delivered invocations to meetings of the Ellsworth Cub Scouts' "Blue and Gold Banquet," participated in a panel discussion on the Cuban missile crisis, attended functions of the Women's Alliance, and wrote a letter to the editor of the Ellsworth American urging voters to show up at the polls to vote "Yes" on a referendum question that would give the people a stronger voice in the area of education.

At the Annual Meeting on May 1, 1963, the minutes read: "The minister's report was read, accepted, and filed." Mr. Conner's report on that date included the following paragraph. "My personal project for the year has been an attempt to be less abstract and more expressive in writing and preaching our sermons. It has been uphill going all the way but unless you are all kindly fibbing to me, there has been some progress." Mr. Conner left immediately after reading his report. Irving Copp made a motion not to hire our present minister for the next year. Herbert Lord seconded the motion. After considerable explanation and discussion, a vote was taken by secret ballot. The vote was 31 not to hire and 3 to hire. On motion by Evelyn Lord, it was voted to have President Smith appoint a committee to take care of supplies [i.e. supply ministers] for May 5 and 12 and June - 5 Sundays. It was moved and seconded that the Conner family be allowed to stay in the parsonage until school closes (June 14) at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

This last sentence has raised questions about what actually happened in June of 1963. When Elizabeth Conner, David's daughter, spoke with her mother years later, her mother indicated that the Board of Trustees had "thrown them out onto the streets," which left a bad taste in both her and her daughter's mouths. What actually happened will probably never be known, but let it simply be said that the Board must have done something that caused the Conner family to have a very negative opinion of Unitarian Universalism ever since.

After leaving Ellsworth, the family moved to the Lewiston-Auburn area. David and Nancy divorced sometime around 1968 and they both remarried, David marrying a woman named Helen Castle. David worked for a time with the Woman's Job Corps in Poland Spring. He later moved to Mechanic Falls and around 1973 came to Windham where he was the owner and operator of an antique business named Country Mother Antique Shop.

David passed away on May 25, 1978 in a Portland hospital after a long illness.
