

This is not a social media site, but there are options available for posting a topic for chat to everyone on the site, or to have private chats with one or more members. - UUCE Zoomers Block Party This is a monthly gathering of everyone who has joined the Zoomers site. The purpose of the Block Party is to give everyone a chance to see one another in one place at the same time. We'll have some time together as a large group and then break into very small groups for chat time so that we have to a chance to talk to and get to know people we wouldn't necessarily otherwise connect with.


If you would like email notifications of new offerings, be sure to sign up for the Daily Digest when you establish your account. That way you won't miss anything that's happening on the site.

SANKOFA CORNER



REV. ROBERT COLE (1815-1897) OR "WHY IN THE HECK WAS A BAPTIST MINISTER HANGING OUT WITH A BUNCH OF UNITARIANS?"

One of the most interesting cases of strange bedfellows in the history of the Unitarian Church of Ellsworth was that of Rev. Robert Cole. He was clearly a strong supporter of the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth (FUSE) from the date of its inception: Oct. 31, 1865. But wait! He was a Baptist minister! What in the world....?????

Robert Cole Jr. was born on April 9, 1815 in Cornish, ME, a town in York County less than half the size of Surry (but at least it has a Dunkin' Donuts). He was the fourth of the twelve children of Robert Cole Sr. and Nancy (Thompson) Cole, both of Cornish. His father worked as an innkeeper in Limerick, just south of Cornish, but he probably also had property in the town of Lovell, about 30 miles to the north, as three of his first eight children were born there. In any event, around 1823 the family moved to the Penobscot County town of Levant where the remainder of his children were born and where young Robert was educated. The family appears to have held on to the inn in Limerick for as long as ten years after Robert Sr.'s death in Levant in 1831.

Once Robert Jr. finished his schooling, he enrolled at Colby University in Waterville where he studied for the ministry, but upon graduation he appears to have had some role in the management of the inn in Limerick as he is shown living there in both the 1830 and

1840 censuses. In the latter part of 1841, he placed a series of ads in the Portland Press Herald trying

to find a buyer for the property. By November, he announced that he would be succeeded by a Mr. E. R. Lamos, "who is a gentleman every way calculated, it is believed, to accommodate and please the public." (Well, he perhaps accommodated and pleased the public for six years, but as of November of 1847, the Limerick House was taken over by Lemuel Rich 3rd, who intended to operate it "on strictly temperance principles." Hmmm....)

So what does a recent graduate from a ministerial program do now that he is free of the burden of keeping an inn? He goes into politics, of course! In 1843, we find him serving as one of the two representatives from the town of Limerick to the Democratic State Convention meeting that year in Bangor, a total of 327 delegates.

Notwithstanding his political ambitions, he also found time for romance, and in 1844 in Levant, he married Mary Fiske Mann, born about Feb. 23, 1816 in Hillsboro, New Hampshire, the oldest child of James Mann of Vermont and Mary "Polly" Fiske of

Hillsboro, NH. Robert and Mary would eventually go on to have three children: Frances M. "Fannie," Adaline M. J., and Charles R. Soon after the birth of his daughters, Rev. Cole was called to the Baptist Church in Harrington, ME. But then politics called him to Augusta and he represented the Harrington district

of Washington County for one term in the Maine legislature.

Tavern Stand For Sale.

THE SUBSCRIBER offers for sale his well-known stand at *LIMERICK VILLAGE*. It is the only house which has been occupied in the said *Village*, as a tavern, for several years. The house has been recently improved at considerable expense, and all the buildings, wells of water, &c. pertaining to it are rendered convenient.

An inclination to change his business is the only inducement the subscriber has to sell an establishment which to him has been a source of income for twenty-two years. **ROBERT COLE.**Limerick, August, 1841.

Soon after the birth of his son Charles in 1853, we find him traveling to Waterville again to accept an honorary degree from "Waterville College." After his return to Harrington, he moved west to Brooklin, ME where he served as pastor of the Baptist church in Brooklin for a time. Then, in 1857, in the words of Ellsworth historian Herbert T. Silsby, "he picked up and left Brooklin, 'leaving a people devotedly attached to him and without a call – without encouragement from any one' he moved to Ellsworth. He commenced preaching in Ellsworth before various people and groups. He soon had an 'interested and intelligent congregation' and he had won 'the confidence and esteem of the community and the favorable regards of the other denominations.'"

That he was highly regarded in Ellsworth is evident from the fact that in November of 1858, he was the surprise recipient of a "Donation Party," a social gathering held to honor a well-deserving member of the community, frequently a member of the clergy, and in the midst of the occasion, "a liberal donation in money and in goods necessary for family use was made." In Rev. Cole's case, more than \$90 "and other articles sufficient to swell the sum to over one hundred dollars was contributed." The author of the article noted that "Mr. Cole has been laboring in our village since last May, earnestly and zealously, and without any certain means of support. We are therefore pleased to record this voluntary contribution, and this act of sympathy extended to him at this time."


On Tuesday September 6, 1859, the Hancock Baptist Association was organized at the West Meetinghouse in Eden [Bar Harbor] and they

chose Rev. Robert Cole for Moderator and Rev. H. C. Estes for Clerk. Rev. Cole also kept himself busy with other Baptist affairs, primarily the construction of two new Baptist churches. He would, on occasion, supply the church in Surry, and his labors later resulted in a new

church building. And in Ellsworth, his efforts led to the dedication of the Ellsworth Village Baptist Church on Nov. 30, 1859. Six weeks later, on Jan. 11, 1860, an ecclesiastical council convened and it was unanimously voted to recognize the new church society as a "regular Baptist church."

When the census was taken in 1860, Rev. Cole was listed as a "B. Clergyman," the "B." standing for Baptist. Be that as it may, Rev. Cole resigned from the Baptist church and Society that year due to ill health. His 1897 obituary perhaps captured this period of his life best with these words: "Early in the '60s, Mr. Cole's religious views underwent a change, and finding his more liberal ideas inconsistent with his position as pastor of the church, he retired from the ministry. A few years later, he interested himself in the effort to establish a liberal church here, and was one of the most active in the movement which resulted in the building of the Unitarian church in 1867." Rev. Cole continued to perform weddings in the Ellsworth area, and even preached at the dedication of the Baptist church in Surry in 1863 which was a success due to his management, but he was gradually moving in the "liberal" direction.

By 1864, Rev. Cole was also making changes in his career choice. In that year, he bought the Main Street bookstore business from Messrs. Sawyer and Burr and also became the Ellsworth agent for a number of out-of-state companies, including the Ulmer and Tyler brand of "Grey's Patent Washing Machines." He also advertised that "a large stock of new goods has just been received at the Book, Stationery, and Variety Store now occupied by Rev. Robert Cole."

The next twelve months brought tragedy to Rev. Cole's life. On October 7, 1864, he lost his mother, Nancy (Thompson) Cole, and on the evening of October 18, 1865, his house on Pine Street in Ellsworth was consumed by fire. His wife and daughter were at the time on a visit to New Hampshire, Rev. Cole was at his bookstore, and their domestic was out, so no one was lost to the flames, but very little of the contents of the house was saved, and lost with it were many of the early records of the Baptist Society.

Not quite two weeks after the fire, the organizational meeting of the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth took place at the Ellsworth Village Baptist Church on Oct. 31, 1865. There is no record that Rev. Cole was in attendance but he was undoubtedly aware of the event. Indeed, those citizens of Ellsworth who were of the Unitarian persuasion had been attending services at the Baptist church throughout the early 1860s and several of the pewholders in that church were the founders of the FUSE. Rev. Cole was undoubtedly familiar with all of them.

It is not recorded where he lived after the fire destroyed his home, but he went right back to work at the bookstore where he was selling subscriptions to the magazine Hours at Home and pushing all kinds of books, paper hangings, stationery, and fancy articles. In February of 1866, he was part of the effort to establish the Ellsworth Village Library Association as a legally organized society, with Maria S. (Black) Perry, a granddaughter of Col. John Black, as president, and FUSE founder Miss Catharine S. "Kate" Dyer as second Vice-President and Treasurer. The Constitution of the Association was left at Rev. Cole's bookstore for people to examine and sign to become members.

During the summer of 1866, the Unitarian Society was taking the first measures toward building a church, and on September 13 of that year, the Society elected Rev. Robert Cole to be the head of the Building Committee, the other members being James Harrison Hopkins and Isaac Hull Thomas. A lot on the corner of Main Street and Oak Street was purchased and Rev. William H. Savary, minister of the Unitarian Society, procured plans for a church edifice from the office of

L. L. Woodcock, Architect, in Boston. The Building Committee also hired Ichabod and Otis Winsor Kent to build the church building. Soon after the work started, Rev. Cole, as Chair of the Building Committee, visited several towns in Maine and also spoke with the Secretary of the American Unitarian Association (AUA) in an effort to solicit material aid in carrying on the work. Among the donors that he spoke with were Unitarian churches in Bangor, Portland, Kennebunk, and Saco and he received a thousand-dollar interest-free loan from the AUA. One of the individual donors was George Nixon Black of Boston.

At the Aug. 28, 1867 dedication of the new Unitarian church, "Mr. Cole of the Building Committee formally presented the Edifice for Dedication." He also spoke of the origin of the Society, and of the attempt to build a church and "feelingly acknowledged the generous aid received from the Unitarians of Bangor, Portland, and other places."

In March of 1868. Rev. Cole moved his bookstore "4 doors above his old stand" on Main Street to a place "next above H. & S. K. Whiting's," and by the time of the 1870 census, he was listed as a "Bookseller," and his 16-year old son Charles R. Cole was identified as "clerk in store," being primed to take over his father's business. Rev. Cole would still officiate at an occasional wedding, such as the one in Hancock on July 13, 1870 for Mr. George W. Dow and Miss Jennie W. Bush. On February 8, he was installed as Chaplain of the Lygonia Lodge of Masons, and later in the year he had become the Ellsworth agent for Stephen Grover of E. Boston, Massachusetts, piano tuner and repairman. By 1874, he had enlarged his bookshop and added a second story to it which was to be occupied as a book-bindery by his son, Mr. Charles Cole, "a practical book-binder," offering "a good, neat, and strong binding...25 to 50 per cent cheaper than is done elsewhere." As if all this weren't enough, by the end of 1874, Rev. Cole had also become the local agent of the American Popular Life Insurance Company of New York.

In the meantime, the ladies of the Unitarian Church decided to organize under the name of the Unitarian Social and Benevolent Society and at their first meeting, on Sept. 2, 1875 in the room over Mrs. Ann F. Greely's store, it was voted to raise the church and build a vestry beneath. In addition to a building committee consisting of three women, an associate committee, made up of Robert Cole, John Dean Hopkins, and Carleton McGown, was also established. The construction was completed in just two months, and during the dedication ceremony, Rev. Cole, as chairman of the advisory committee, was invited to give a few remarks "in which he attributed much praise to the ladies and spoke of the close connection of the kitchen to the pulpit."

By this point, it was apparent that Rev. Cole had become an integral part of the Unitarian Society and was frequently being called upon to offer his services. When the second minister of FUSE announced his resignation in June of 1878, a committee made up of Rev. Cole, William Oliver McDonald, and Albert

M. Hopkins was appointed to write up an expression of the sentiments of the Society, saying: "[W]hile we...accept his resignation, we most deeply regret that the pleasant ties which bind us together must so shortly be severed." When the next minister, Rev. Charles Parker Lombard, was being ordained the following August, it was Rev. Cole who was chosen to open the ceremony with an

address. And on the occasion of the Annual Meeting on Oct. 1, 1879, Rev. Cole was elected vice-president of the Society. On July 23, 1882, Rev. Cole was one of eight ministers assembled as a Council to make a final decision on the ordination and installation of the Society's acting pastor, Mr. Loren Benjamin MacDonald, which was decided in the affirmative.

The 1880 census lists Robert and Mary F. Cole, ages 65 and 64 respectively, living in Ellsworth, and his trade was listed as "Book Store." He was still performing the occasional wedding ceremony, but his primary occupation was maintaining the store. Indeed, in September of 1881, he "raised his store and put in a new foundation. It has greatly improved

the appearance of the property." Rev. Cole was also active in social issues. Undoubtedly influenced by such woman suffragists as Mrs. Ann F. Greely, founder of the Unitarian Church, Cole had also taken up the cause, and was author of a petition for Woman Suffrage that was reported on by a House Committee of the Maine Legislature in September of 1887.

His son, Dr. Charles R. Cole, had by then given up the book-bindery business. He had married in 1880 Miss Ella Brooks, and had gone into the study of medicine and was, by 1887, living and practicing in Bangor. By the end of 1891, he had moved his practice to Rockland where he was visited by his father as the latter was returning to Maine after a "serious surgical operation" in Boston. The Ellsworth American reported that though he was still feeble after the operation, "he is gaining in health and his case is very hopeful."

Rev. Cole's wife Mary Fiske (Mann) Cole, passed

away in Ellsworth on September 18, 1894 and was buried at Woodbine Cemetery. Rev. Cole followed her on June 29, 1897, passing away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fannie Saunders in Ellsworth and was buried alongside his wife at Woodbine. During his 82 years of life, he had held many positions: innkeeper, student,

state representative from Limerick, state representative from Harrington, Baptist

preacher in Harrington, Brooklin, Surry, and Ellsworth, chairman of church building committees, wedding officiant, bookstore owner, temperance worker, woman suffrage supporter, and agent for a number of out-of-state companies that sold sewing machines, washing machines, and miscellaneous other goods. He was very interested in the cause of education and for over ten years held the office of supervisor of schools and was instrumental in the building of the brick schoolhouse on High Street in 1860, also known as the Pine Street School. He was also a loving husband, a doting father, and, well, just a good guy. And, although it took him a while, he was also a Unitarian.
