Greetings UUCE Congregates and Families,

Another month down and another letter written. November is behind us, and we are moving into December. During this time of holiday hype, I want us to take a second and breathe. Not everyone has the joyous memories of the holidays that you yourself hold. Although this is a time of joy and happiness, it is also a time of trauma and mourning. We are heading into the darkest parts of our lives both literally and metaphorically. As our days grow shorter and our nights longer, let us put forth just a smidge of extra effort for those around us and part of us. We are a community of caring, and we should show it to each other.

With the sad portion of this piece behind us, I wanted to update the congregation with what we are going to be doing for one of our most important assets, our youth. We are going to be presenting a Religious Exploration offering for the youth that may seem slightly different than what has been offered in the past. We are going to be splitting youth into two cohorts.

Cohort A: Will consist of any youth between the ages of 5-10. This age group will have exceptions but only if those exceptions are discussed with the REC (Religious Exploration Coordinator) and/or the RE Committee Chair. This cohort will be held during the worship service twice a month, dates have already been picked for these meetings and will be published in the next issue for Kindling the Flame. These sessions will be a scripted lesson which will tie to our UU tenets and usually will include a craft or activity or story.

Cohort B: Will consist of any youth between the ages of 11-16. This age group will have exceptions but only if those exceptions are discussed with the REC and/or the RECC. This cohort will be held twice a month but will be held as a REC Event that may or may not be taking place during the service or even on a Sunday. These dates and activities have not been mapped out yet, but we will be discussing options with the families to make these activities as accessible to all as possible. These dates will require an RSVP so we can ensure that we have enough youth participating, if not we will cancel the event and wait till the next one.

Although we are not identifying them as their own cohort, children 4 and under are still welcome in the Nursery care when requested. Please let us know if you require these resources so we can make sure that they are availability when needed.

As usual, we welcome all feedback on this change and any other change that comes along with it. We are here to help how we can. Knowing how we can help arms us to help in bigger and better ways. Please embrace this upcoming season with that same sentiment. Let us all begin to help in bigger and better ways.

Malaga Island. Last summer the 8th Principle task force sponsored a field trip to Malaga Island, home to a mixed race fishing community until 1912, when the state of Maine forcibly removed community residents, committing eight to the Maine State Institution for the Feeble-Minded. The full story of that mass eviction has been relatively untold and the injustices unacknowledged. But as of September 19, Malaga Island, now managed by the Maine Coast Heritage Trust, is officially listed on the National Register of Historic Places. needlework to get together and chat while working on individual projects. It's an oldfashioned sewing circle with the modern update of taking place virtually.

- UUCE Mighty Book Club (Wednesday, December 27, 1:00 – 2:30 PM), hosted by Robin Lovrien. The book for this meeting is The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray. The discussion for this book was postponed in October. This group meets on the fourth Wednesday each month. Information about the book choice for November will appear in the UUCE weekly e-news, will be emailed to all UUCE Zoomers members, and will be posted on the UUCE Facebook page.
- Regular posts which you can enjoy viewing/ reading, with the invitation to comment on and also to share your own. Regular posts include birthday greetings to our members, our popular Tuesday Tunes feature in which you can view music videos and share your own favorites, Quotes and Comments, Friday Funnies for a laugh, and observations of notable days, sometimes accompanied by an informative article or a yummy recipe.

We have some exciting groups planned for later his winter that will keep us connected to ourselves and to one another during Sara's absence. Here's a short description of what we're working on:

- Build the Life You Want This 8-session offering is based on the work of Dr. Arthur Brooks, a professor at Harvard, and Oprah Winfrey, and draws on the expertise of Harvard scientists who have been studying happiness for decades. We'll have discussions and do worksheets designed to help us find contentment, and yes, become happier with the life that we create.
- Divided We Fall and How to Love Our Enemies- As UU's we are called by our faith to fully respect the humanity and dignity of every person. However, most of us have found that harder and harder to do as we (and pretty much our entire country) become more politically and culturally contemptuous of those on "the other side". This group will examine ways to break that pattern and help us learn how we can assist in healing ourselves and our nation of damaging divide.

These sessions will be held online but not through the Zoomers site, so you don't have to become a member of the Zoomers to participate. We'll send out information about the schedule for both groups and how to sign up after the beginning of the new year.

- 4. You will be taken to another screen. Tap on Zoom meeting, which is at the bottom of this screen and you will be taken to your event.
- 5. You can also RSVP to events on this screen. Just tap on the one that applies (i.e., Going, Maybe or Not Going).
- 6. You can add the Event to your calendar from this screen, and you can access the Zoom link.

TECH TIP: If you would like to get email notifications for events that you are planning to attend, make sure that you have let the Zoomers site know that you want notifications by completing the following steps:

- website, click on your profile picture (or the circle on the upper right of your screen if you haven't uploaded a picture).
- 2. Click on Personal Settings
- 3. Click on Notifications
- 4. Toggle Email Updates to On if you want Notifications
- 5. Toggle to On for anything you would like notifications for
- 6. Scroll down to Spaces and toggle to On for any Groups or Topics for which you would like notifications

Harry in 1930

Harry Chamberlain Meserve Jr. was born on Sept. 7, 1914 in Rye, New York, the youngest child and only son of the five children of Rev. Harry Chamberlain Meserve Sr. and his wife Bertha Francis Murkland. He grew up in Weston, MA and graduated from Phillips Academy in Andover. Harry later married and d three children by his first

had three children by his first

wife, the former Louise Warren Bloomfield of Waban, a village within the city of Newton, MA. His first child was Emily Louise Meserve (1940-1981), followed by Harry C. Meserve (1942-2018), and Peter L. Meserve (b. 1945). By his second wife, Katharine "Kay" Mann

of Richmond, MA, he had a third son, David M. Meserve (b. 1949).

Harry received an A.B. degree from Haverford College in Haverford, PA. He later earned an S.T.B. degree from the Harvard Divinity School, and an honorary D.D. from the Meadville Theological School in 1955. He served Unitarian congregations


in Cohasset, MA, Buffalo, NY, San Francisco, CA, and the Northern Westchester Fellowship in Chappaqua, NY.

In addition to his ministerial career, beginning in 1957 he served as a member of the executive staff for Humanities and Social Sciences of the Rockefeller Brothers Fund in New York. In 1960 he became director of programs at the Academy of Religion and Mental Health in New York. He founded the Academy's quarterly, the Journal of Religion and Health, and served as its editor from 1962 to 1993.

From 1965 to 1974 he served the Unitarian church in Grosse Pointe, MI. When he began his pastorate there, Harry was described as a minister "who has up-to-date ideas on religion. He contrasts healthy emotion and neurotic emotion in religion. The first kind of emotion, he says, directs one into society, the second bottles one up in his own self-concern for his soul's salvation only."

Among his denominational activities, he was on the Board of Directors of the American Unitarian Association, the Starr King School for the Ministry, and the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. And he was also active in a variety of other organizations. From 1949 to 1957, he was chair of the Northern California Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union and was a leader in the fight to defend civil liberties and improve race relations in the Bay Area. He was also active in the Urban League of Detroit, and was chairman of the Committee on Religious Resources for the President's Special Assistant for Mental Retardation from 1962 to 1965.

Harry was the author of a number of books and publications, including Faith in the Making (1946), No Peace of Mind (1955), The Practical Meditator (1981), and About Community (1998).



Harry and his wife Kay settled in Kay's family's old stomping grounds of Southwest Harbor, Maine in 1974 and Harry served as parttime minister in both Ellsworth and Castine, ME from 1974 to 1980. When he retired in 1980, the Ellsworth congregation


named him minister emeritus. Eight years later, on Oct. 14, 1988, the congregation hosted a "Celebration of the Fifty-Year Ministry of the Reverend Dr. Harry C. Meserve." During the celebration, Harry was the recipient of words of appreciation from Doug Houck, President of UUCE, Peter Boss, President of the Castine Unitarian Church, Natalie Gulbrandsen, Moderator of the UUA, Glenn Turner, District Minister, Gordon Ramsdell, long-time member of UUCE, Rev. Charles Stephens, then minister of UUCE, and by the UUCE choir.

In retirement, Harry served as a trustee at the Southwest Harbor Public Library and served on the Southwest Harbor Conservation Commission, the Comprehensive Plan Committee, and the board of the Mount Desert Island Historical Society.

As if he wasn't already busy enough, from 1981 to 2000, he and his wife also edited an informal monthly newsletter of articles, editorials, and reviews entitled View from the Cove. When over 200 Views had accumulated, Harry, Kay, and editor Nicols Fox selected 106 of the best and most timely, and arranged them in a logical order. They were later published in 2005 by Infinity Publishing as Views from the Cove. Editor Fox wrote: "A thoughtful observer of his times, the late Dr. Meserve, an unrepentant liberal, offers a perspective on society, culture, spirituality, and politics that is too often missed or ignored today. With wry humor and counterintuitive wisdom, he focuses on

Norwood Cove in all four seasons and on his community, then on issues for the nation and the world beyond."

Harry died on Nov. 8, 2000 in Bar Harbor, ME at the age of 86 and his wife Kay followed him on Jan. 20, 2002.
