Rev. Amy McCormick, who serves as settled minister to the Unitarian Universalist Church of Belfast, Maine, is also now serving as UUCE's sabbatical minister while our beloved Sara rests and rejuvenates. Amy's ministry had its beginnings at UUCE, when she began attending in February of 2014, realized ministry was her calling, and was then ordained at UUCE in June of 2019.

Our Service this morning is inspired by this quote from Paul Hawken who is an American environmentalist, entrepreneur, author, economist, and activist. Hawken was the co-founder and executive director of Project Drawdown, a non-profit that describes how global warming can be reversed.

"When asked if I am pessimistic or optimistic about the future, my answer is always the same: If you look at the science about what is happening on earth and aren't pessimistic, you don't understand data. But if you meet the people who are working to restore this earth and the lives of the poor, and you aren't optimistic, you haven't got a pulse. What I see everywhere in the world are ordinary people willing to confront despair, power, and incalculable odds in order to restore some semblance of grace, justice, and beauty to this world."







LEARNING LESSONS

Thank you to everyone who attended our January Congregational Meeting - we had the number needed to reach a quorum, so we were able to vote on the 3 agenda items. We voted:

1. To ordain Vanessa Williams - congratulations, Vanessa!

Her ordination will be on June 30, UUCE will host, and our three-church collaboration, including UUCBelfast and Castine, will ordain Vanessa. Expect to hear more from Anne Ossanna & Lise Williams who are leading Vanessa's ordination committee.

- **2.** To elect members to serve on our Elections
 Committee congratulations and my thanks go to
 Cecily Judd, Jill Jeude, and Gary Shellehamer. They
 will be asking for candidates for upcoming Board
 vacancies and for moderator, to be voted on at our
 May Congregational Meeting. Expect to hear more
 from them in the coming months.
- I had it to do over again I would have done things differently and where I've learned some lessons. Given the seriousness of this issue, and its political and emotional nature, I should have held several Congregational Conversations about it before it came to a vote, to discuss it in depth and give all sides the opportunity to be heard, in loving community. There was some opportunity for that at the Congregational Meeting, but looking back on it, it felt rushed and I apologize to the Congregation for that. Our bylaws address voting, but don't address what leads up to the vote. Even if the bylaws don't require it (and maybe their next update will), I think the better practice is to hold Congregational



Conversations on non-routine voting items. The leadership team and I are working with Rev. Amy to create a process for engaging in Congregational Conversations post-vote so we can understand more deeply what we support and make space for differing perspectives and opinions.

Another lesson learned was how we actually vote. Pre-covid, when we met in person, we voted anonymously by paper ballot. Now that we're meeting and voting on zoom, I'd like to find a way to vote anonymously, or at least near-anonymously. One suggestion was that we type in the zoom chat to the Secretary only, what our vote is, since it's the Secretary who counts our votes.

So, I definitely learned some lessons and I welcome your thoughts on how we can improve our processes.

You may see less of me over the next couple weeks, due to my upcoming surgery on February 7 when I'll have my left knee replaced. I understand that recovery to be pretty intense, so I've let Jill Jeude (Board VP) and the Board know that I may not be as present as I'd like to be. But! I fully expect to be auctioneering on February 17 on zoom at our Cabin Fever Fun annual auction, so plan on a fun night of live-auction unique items and the 2 weeks before of silent auction treasures!

REV. STEPHEN EDWIN PHINNEY (1940 - 2020)



Stephen Edwin Phinney at Brighton High School

Stephen Edwin Phinney was born on March 31, 1940 in Rochester, New York, the son of Robert Morris Phinney and Margaret L. (Smith) Phinney. He graduated from Brighton High School, near Rochester, where he was active in the Audio-Visual Corps, the Band, the Orchestra, and the French Club during all four years. Steve went on to study at MIT and attained his B.S. degree in physics at the University of Rochester in 1964. While studying at Rochester, he met and married his first wife, Lucy Elizabeth Walsh, in December of 1963. Steve and Lucy were to have three children: Sara, Jennifer, and Robert Stephen, and raised them in Dale City, Virginia.


Steve went on to complete his graduate work in astrogeophysics at the University of Colorado in 1972. He worked as a staff systems engineer at IBM Federal Systems Company from 1973 to 1982, then as an advisory systems engineer with IBM in Manassas, Virginia from 1982 to 1994. He then worked as a senior system engineer at Signal Corporation in Fairfax, Virginia from 1994 to 1999.

Steve's wife Lucy, a civic activist and author of Yesterday's Schools, a history of the Prince William County, Virginia school system, died of cancer on April 27, 1996 at their home in Woodbridge, VA. At this point in his life, Steve felt a call to ministry and so he went on to receive his Master of Divinity from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC in 2003. He served as an intern minister at the First Unitarian Church of Richmond, Virginia from 2002 to 2003, was granted Preliminary Fellowship with the Unitarian Universalist Association in 2004, the same year that

he married his second wife, Cynthia Jean Mortland, in Alexandria, Virginia. Steve was ordained on April 17, 2005 by the Mount Vernon Unitarian Church in Alexandria.

Rev. Phinney served as our interim minister from Sept. 2006 to June 2007. As he explained to a reporter from the Bangor Daily News, "My reason for coming is to help the congregation move into a position to call a new, permanent minister." He later added, "Unitarians are a religious community that follows an ethic that accepts people as they are...We don't have a creed or set belief. We encourage each person to discover their own spiritual path, and we enjoy the diversity of viewpoints within the congregation...Ours is a healing, liberal religion that centers on the principle of love."

Steve said that Downeast Maine was one of his favorite places to visit. He visited MDI several times, going back to as early as 1958. "I've hiked most of the mountains, canoed many of the ponds, and sailed to the islands." In addition to his love of the outdoors, Steve also enjoyed musical activities. He played the trombone and the piano and, like his wife Cynthia, enjoyed singing. He also enjoyed collecting and restoring antiques. He said, "My father taught me to repair and rebuild most items in the house." He also loved photography, and had a large slide collection of his family's life and travels.

After he left Ellsworth, he became the settled minister at the UU Westside Congregation in Rio

Rancho, New Mexico from 2007 to 2013. He retired from the ministry on July 31, 2013 and he and Cynthia moved to Aurora, Colorado where he passed from complications of the coronavirus on May 2, 2020.
