They are a Florida native whose ancestors first arrived there in the 1600's and they grew up next to their grandfather's strawberry farm near Plant City. They had previous careers in social services and education.

They journeyed from their Southern Baptist childhood through the United Methodist Church, Church of Christ, and MCC before finding their true home in our Unitarian Universalist movement in 2001. They graduated from Andover Newton Theological School in 2018 and were ordained in 2021. They have also served congregations in Syracuse and Watertown, New York. They love food and are very proud that they have managed to grow collards and okra here in Maine. They are just beginning to explore the state and are happy to have this opportunity to get to know folks in a community they've not been to before.

In many aspects of our lives, we are ignorant (i.e., we simply don't know). Therefore, a lot of the time we make things up or project our assumptions as if they are real. How we do this can either be helpful or harmful to us and our relationships, and it definitely impacts our quality of life. Let's talk about the stories we constantly tell ourselves ... and perhaps imagine some simple ways to transform our stories and make them better.

Rev. Dr. Kharma Amos (she/hers) is an ordained minister with 20 years of professional experience in pastoral ministry and denominational leadership. Rev. Amos holds plural ministerial standing in the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) where she was granted preliminary fellowship in 2020, as well as the Metropolitan Community Churches where she was originally ordained in 2002. She is a preacher, activist, writer, singer, educator, fundraiser, and administrator with a passion for engaging others who are committed to spiritual growth, inclusive community, and social justice.

Prior to beginning her work as the settled Minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Brunswick (Maine), Kharma served full-time as the Team Lead for Resource Development for Metropolitan Community Churches, where she was a member of the Senior Leadership Team and managed the denominational staff responsible for finance, fundraising & development, communications, IT, and the creation of resources for ministers and congregations. She also served as the half-time Minister of the Unitarian Universalists of Central Delaware.

Kharma received a Bachelor of Arts in Religious Studies from the University of Oregon (1998), a Master of Divinity degree from Lancaster Theological Seminary (2002), and a Doctor of Ministry degree from the Episcopal Divinity School (2008). She also served on the Board of Trustees of Lancaster Theological Seminary for several years. Kharma is committed to lifelong learning and participates in numerous continuing educational programs each year.

Kharma was born in Springfield, Missouri (USA) and has lived and worked professionally in Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Florida, and Delaware (USA). She currently lives in Lisbon, Maine with her wife, the Rev. Diane Fisher, a proud Canadian retiring from a 30-year career in ministry. They make their home with three wise cats and one extraordinarily spoiled dog.

REV. LEELA RAJANI SINHA (B. 1975)



Leela Rajani Sinha was born on May 5, 1975 in Stamford, Connecticut, the daughter of a Hindu father, Vinod Tarkeshwar Sinha, originally of Patna, Bihar, India, and a UU mother, Teresa Lynn Meyer of Sacramento, California. She attended Stamford High School and at the same time began attending services at the Unitarian Church in Westport, CT and she represented UCW at General Assembly as a youth delegate throughout high school. After graduation in 1993, Leela went on to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree from Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota with a focus on youth advising. Her senior thesis was actually a web page that dealt with the transition from the LRY (Liberal Religious Youth) to the YRUU program. She graduated cum laude with a BA in American Studies and a concentration on Women's Studies in June of 1997.

In 1999, Leela came to Maine to work for a time as the Director of Religious Education at the Unitarian Universalist Society of Bangor. Over the next three years, she attended Star Island RE Week twice, traveled in India for eight months, joined the First Universalist Church of Minneapolis, took an online course in UU history from Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago, Illinois in 2001, and began seminary at Meadville Lombard in the fall of 2002. From 2004 to 2005, she served as an Intern Minister for the First Unitarian Congregation of Ottawa, and later served as a Contract Student Minister with the UU Fellowship of Ottawa from 2005 to 2006. She obtained her M.Div. in Community Ministry and Parish Ministry from MLTS in June of 2006, where she was a classmate of our Rev. Sara. She was given Preliminary Fellowship

with the Unitarian Universalist Association in 2006, and worked from 2006 to 2007 as an Assistant Minister at the First Unitarian Church in Portland, Oregon, where she was ordained on Jan. 28, 2007.

In June of
2007, Leela
married (albeit
not legally) Janine
Galeski in a ceremony
in Portland, OR. Leela
described Janine as

independent, yet close and supportive. She wrote: "She teaches high school physics, laughs easily, and sings beautifully... Afternoons will find her rollerblading or bicycling or cross-country skiing; evenings, when she is not writing lesson plans, she may well be curled up on the sofa with a good book." The two of them arrived in Ellsworth that summer and Leela began serving our congregation in September.

It is difficult to describe the different reactions of members of the congregation to this dynamic young Lesbian power storm that was Leela Sinha. Some of us loved her, some were perplexed by her, others were

maybe even afraid of her. Some liked her sermons, some found them too "heady." She had her opinions and was not afraid of stating them. My originally positive reaction to her was dampened when she told

me that our choir was "not very good" and she would only let the choir sing on those Sundays when she was preaching in Castine. The uncomfortable situation between Leela and the congregants continued for two and a half years and came to a close at the end of April of 2010 when one of the following events occurred: (1) she resigned, (2) she was asked to resign, (3) she was dismissed, or (4) something else happened and she wasn't there anymore.

In a 2019 Youtube interview¹ entitled "Leela Sinha: Author, Speaker, Executive Coach," Leela talked about an important realization that she made after having served at two very different parishes: the First Unitarian Church in Portland, Oregon and then our church. It can help us understand her side of the conflict that we experienced during her tenure at UUCE:

After those two parishes, I realized that, in general, I move too fast for a congregation... Congregations are composed of people...and people tend to resist change... We like the well-established patterns, and we like to stay in the well-established patterns...and so, I go into the congregation, and they say "Well, we're struggling with this and we're struggling with that," and I say, "Oh, well, it looks like this, this, this, and these are the things that need to change. Are you on board?" and they say, "Uh...yeah...," and I say, "OK, let's go!" and they're like, "Oh, but, but,

but, but, we have to do a study and have a vote," and I'm like, "You said you wanted to change. This is how we get you there," and so, it becomes a point of conflict, and the congregation tends to come away from that conflict with the sense that I don't love them, which is unfortunate 'cause it's not true. I love them very much. I love them so much I can't let them sit where they are especially since they asked me to come to change that thing, and most people aren't ready for that, most people aren't comfortable with that, and most institutions are not prepared to change that fast.

After Leela left UUCE, there were several important changes in her life. At some point, she changed her pronouns to: ze and zir. Ze eventually moved to Oregon where ze created zir own business as an author, speaker, and executive coach, drawing upon zir background in tech, bodywork, parish ministry, sexuality education, and leadership development. Zir wife Janine later transitioned to male and he changed his name to lan James Galeski. He is currently living in Meadowlands, Minnesota.

For eight and a half years after ze left UUCE, ze moved to Portland, Maine and became involved with leadership coaching in what ze called Intensives Central, where ze coached leaders and leadership teams to be comfortable and effective with power. In December of 2018, ze transferred zir base of operations to the San Francisco Bay area where ze became the founder of "The Intensives Institute."

On zir Linked-In webpage², Leela divides people into intensives and expansives. Ze explains the difference in the following way: If you're an Intensive, you know this. If you need an intensive, you crave this, even though it makes you a little nervous. As an intensive you know the thrill of being all the way in, both feet, no looking back. You know you know when you're right, even if you can't explain it. And you know how much of that drive makes you the leader that you are. You also know that much of the world tends to be designed for the people who like things moderate and even and predictable, whose decisions are more about logic than about gut, who don't really get a fire in their bellies. These are Expansives. The differences between how Intensives and Expansives function can cause problems in businesses

at all levels of development, starting with finding the right fit. Let me help you fix that.

In 2016, Leela published a book entitled You're Not Too Much: Intensive Lives in an Expansive World.³ In it, ze writes: I'm an intensive. I'm also a writer.

a coach, a minister. I grew up in that part of suburban Connecticut that thinks it's New York City, barely qualified as New England at all. We rooted for the Mets or the Yankees, we got New York weather, listened to New York traffic reports, and referred to New York as The City, as though there was no other. My father is an engineer, my mother is trained as a mathematician, my brother has a computer science degree...so I speak geek, but it's not my native tongue. People are my native tongue. People and poetry. I have studied people in some form or other for most of my adult life. The ways that culture and life and expectations and personalities interact fascinate me. But I never thought I'd develop a framework of my own. It didn't even cross my mind.

This book began as the product of the long silences that accompany us in major healing journeys. In December 2014, I ruptured my L3 disc and spent the next 3 months lying flat on my back, recovering. It got awfully quiet in my head after a while. And then the ruckus kicked up. When the to-do list that I couldn't touch was finished, and the lifetime regrets had begun, there came a litany of all the things that had Gone Wrong in my life. When I'd had about enough of the "It's all your fault" drone, there was a crystal sound; the seed of an idea: that there was some pattern to all the things that had made my life difficult. The careers that didn't work, the incompatible lovers, the fierce

but capricious hobbies...Somehow, they were related. They had to be related, it happened too often to be a coincidence. The accusations were too common: you're too much, it's too much, I can't anymore, I'm exhausted...A half dozen Facebook posts and conversations later, the image began to coalesce, and this book, unbeknownst to me, began its journey.

Finally, I had to say it: Intensives turn out to be not just my peers but also some of my dearest friends and some of my best allies. Intensives are often my most fabulous clients. Intensives have tremendous gifts for the world. And we need those gifts. We need those people. You're not too much. And the work was born.
