


AFTERNOON OF FUN WITH YOUR UUCE COMMUNITY!

Hello Congregants and Friends,



I feel as though the best letter this month would just be a rehashing of my report to the congregation.

UUCE Winter 2025 Congregational Meeting

Thank you all for being present with us today. It goes to show the amount of dedication and care you put into the congregational activities that you are present today with us.

I also want to take a second to thank our RE committee for their continued support as well as the newest members to the committee, Emily Samuel, Summer Cornetta-Webb, and Carol Rozinski who has joined in a consultancy capacity. Our program can't grow or be successful without the continued support of these wonderful individuals.

I don't know if the congregation was made aware of this or not but I am now fully trained in the entire age range of the UU Owl program from Kindergarten to 100+.

For those of you more data oriented our Beginning Budget of 500.00 Dollars, 100 for supplies, 200 for OWL, 200 for Additional Child Care and Additional Expenses. Out of that 500.00 we have a remaining balance of 114.12\$ until Mid June.

Since the beginning of what I call the Church Academic Year which began in mid September of 24 and runs to Mid June of 25 we have grown from an average of 1 child per RE session to 5 children and we have 10 youths officially "registered" with the program and have had 9 other youths come in and out of our Sunday RE Sessions and other activities we have held.

Some of you may have noticed that we have transformed the front corner of the Sanctuary into our UUYouth Play with Spirit area. (I coined this term without the permission of the committee but it's sometimes better to ask forgiveness than to ask permission). Our youth are the true voice of innocence and spirit and we created this playful area as a way of engaging them into the spirit of the service as well as to allow them to be active as they absorb the spirit around them. This was done as a way of keeping our families able to be present in the space when our youth need to express themselves instead of being removed from the service.

Not only have we had the pleasure of expanding our numbers inside the church but we are currently working to expand our support outside of the church. Emily and Summer are beginning the tremendous task of reaching out to the surrounding academic institutions to offer safe activity spaces for our youth with a slight lean toward our LGBTQIA+ youth as they are going through one of the most frightening times in their lives with the current socio-political climate.

I encourage you to share your feedback about what you see in the program and our establishment or UU principles within the program.

Where do you see holes in the program? Where do you see needs? Can we expand the program upward in age range and include a larger variety of adult programming?

I also wanted to take some time in this report to climb on my soapbox a little. One of the driving forces in my faith path has always been education. I have my BA in Comparative Religion and was going to go to the University of Austin to achieve my PhD in American Religions and Cult theory until the universe decided to take me on a slightly different path. But I have the privilege to stand here today in front of all of you and ask for you to show grace. Grace for the families that come here for a renewed sense of community when communities have systematically turned their backs on them or made them feel unwelcome. I ask that you take a breath and truly consider what it means to have a squirming toddler in your arms while you are trying to sing a hymn or participate in a solemn portion of service and how you would feel being the center of that attention. As UUS you pride yourself in being open minded and accepting and I ask that you put that into deeper practice. Listen to our families with the mindset to Understand them and support them without the concept of commenting on their behavior or adding to their situation. We are here to be a village, for it truly takes a village to raise our youth into the future heroes that will take back our broken systems for what is truly good for all. Be the beautiful people I know you all are. You are

living examples of what our youth will become. Your modeling behavior is the behavior they will absorb whether you think they are or not. Little ears pick up everything, little eyes see all.

I will step off my box now and thank you for your time. You can reach me with any questions or comments you have about the program and I honestly mean that. You can ask me anything. I truly want nothing but the best for this church and you all. My transparency is one of my strengths and one of my flaws. Brightest blessing on you all. So mote it be, so be it, so dream it so.

UU ROYALTY:THE CASE OF THE ROYALS

[Names underlined and in bold face are those of people with known connections to the First Unitarian Society of Ellsworth (FUSE), the First Unitarian Church of Ellsworth (FUCE), or the Unitarian Universalist Church of Ellsworth (UUCE)]

While we usually don't think of royalty in the Unitarian Universalist faith, occasionally it appears that we might have examples of it. A very good example over the last century or so has been that of the Royal family of Ellsworth. That family started with one Samuel Royal Sr. who was born on May 1, 1808 in Steuben, Washington County, Maine. He died on March 5, 1894 in Ellsworth. He married first Lucy Milliken who was born on May 7, 1809 in Castine and who died on August 11, 1867 in Ellsworth. By her Samuel fathered 11 children: Samuel Ir., Sewell Tenney, Mary T., John, Caroline, Charles F., Luther M., Henry M., Lucy, Nancy, and Clifford. He later married Charity Murch on November 11, 1879 in Ellsworth. She had been born in 1817. She became the mother of Samuel's last child Hattie D. Royal, who was born in 1868. In this article, I'll be focusing on one of Samuel's sons: Sewell Tenney Royal.

Sewell Tenney Royal was born on Feb. 2, 1836 in Ellsworth. He married twice. By his first wife, Martha Ann Hoogs, whom he married on Jan. 5, 1861, he had three children: Elmer Horace Royal, born on Dec. 5, 1861, Charles G. Royal, born in November of 1864, and William F. Royal, born in November of 1866. By his second wife, Lydia Marshall, Samuel Jr. had one more child, a son named **Edwin L. Royal**, born in June of 1872 in Ellsworth.

It's in this third generation that Unitarianism begins to enter the Royal bloodstream. The next time you're heading out of the church, take a look at the Memorial Plaque just to the left of the main door. You'll eventually see the names of Edwin L.

Royal and his wife Grace M. (Raymond) Royal.

(Oh, yes, we'll be getting back to those other royal families, the Raymonds, the Snowmans, the Alexanders, etc. soon enough.). Edwin and Grace were married on Dec. 15, 1900 in Ellsworth. They had four children: Edwin E., Elizabeth M. or "Ella," Raymond H., and Robert L. Royal. I'll take these one at a time.

EDWIN L.& GRACE M. ROYAL

Edwin E. Royal was born on Jan. 12, 1902 in Eden, Maine (now part of Bar Harbor). He married Leona Gertrude Henry, daughter of Herman Everett and Ada B. (Bishop) Henry, on Oct. 26, 1930. Leona had been born on Sept. 18, 1910 in Woodland, Maine. Edwin and Leona's names also appear on the Memorial Plaque by the front door. Their names first appeared on the membership rolls on Jan. 7, 1945. After Edwin's death in 1962, Leona's name continued to appear on the membership rolls in March of 1969 and again in March of 1971.

Edwin and Leona had two children:
Richard E. Royal and Margaret L. Royal.
Richard became a member of the First Unitarian
Society of Ellsworth (FUSE) on March 28, 1948
and when his sister Margaret married Richard B.
Dunn in Ellsworth on Sept. 21, 1958, the ceremony
was performed by two FUSE ministers: Rev. Reuel

Beach and Rev. Walter Smith.

Edwin's brother Raymond H. Royal was born on Sept. 23, 1905 in Boothbay Harbor, Maine. He married Ruth M. Snowman (another Unitarian royal family) on June 23, 1944, and less that a year later, both Ray and Ruth were enrolled as members of FUSE on Jan. 28, 1945. Needless to say, their son John N. Royal was raised in the church.

Edwin and Ray's brother Robert L. Royal was born on Aug. 18, 1910 in Lamoine. He married another royal Snowman, Thurley M. Snowman, the sister of his brother Ray's wife Ruth, in 1934, and the two couples joined FUSE together on Jan. 28, 1945. The two couples always maintained a close relationship, and it was said that Ray and Ruth's son John N. Royal actually had two sets of parents. The two couples' names appeared again in the membership records on March 25, 1969 and March 28, 1971, alongside the name of Ray and Robert's mother Leona. No kidding: this was a tight Unitarian family.

Wait! We've left someone out! Back at the beginning of this article, I mentioned that Sewell Tenney Royal had four children: Elmer Horace, Charles G., William F., and Edwin L. Royal. Well, Elmer Horace had Unitarian descendants too. Elmer married Ida Frances Hopkins, daughter of Russell and Caroline B. (Branscomb) Hopkins, on July 9, 1895 in Ellsworth. They had two daughters: Caroline F. "Carrie" Royal, born in March of 1898, and Mary Ida Royal, born on April 30, 1900. Carrie married John Marden Dunbar on July 25, 1922 and the couple went on to have six children: Ralph Marden, Mary Elizabeth, Harold R., Keith Marden, Carolyn I. "Cookie," and Kathleen A. "Kathie" Dunbar.

<u>Carrie Dunbar</u> eventually became extremely active in the Unitarian Woman's Alliance and served as its secretary for many years. Throughout the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s, Carrie was active in managing the many sales and suppers put on by the Woman's Alliance. And then there were the Maybaskets! No one is exactly sure

when the women of the First Unitarian Church of Ellsworth began making them, but Carrie Dunbar was in the middle of all that activity that went on for decades.

Carrie's daughter Cookie was a member of the Unitarian Youth Fellowship of the State of Maine and was chosen as a representative of that organization to participate in the World Order Caravan of the Maine Council of Churches in September of 1954. The group spent a week in New York City visiting the United Nations and other points of interest. After her marriage to James Patten, Cookie Patten later went on to serve a term as the Mayor of Ellsworth!

<u>Carrie</u>'s daughter <u>Kathie</u> chose to marry <u>Wesley F. Cook</u> at the First Unitarian Church of Ellsworth in 1962 in a candlelight service that was officiated by Rev. Edward 'Ted' Smith, a former minister at Ellsworth who was then serving at the Peterborough, New Hampshire Unitarian Church.

It is clear that there is a touch of Royalty among the Unitarians of Ellsworth! In my next two Sankofa articles, I will touch on some of the other Ellsworth families who had Unitarianism and Unitarian Universalism flowing through their veins.
