This journey begins on **Tuesday, April 22** at the Penobscot Nation Boat Landing and concludes on **Tuesday, April 29** at the State House in Augusta. Sherri Mitchell, Esq., Director of the Land Peace Foundation, along with members of her staff and a small group of interfaith, justice and other Wabanaki leaders, are working together to organize this prayerful procession.

WHAT IS THE JOURNEY OF PEACE & FRIENDSHIP?

It is an invitation to connect, an opportunity to move in loving solidarity with our friends and neighbors, to purposely walk toward the world that we most want to inhabit. We are coming together to actively embody our deepest held social values and most aspirational spiritual goals, such as: kindness, acceptance, mutual care, and respect.

WHAT DOES THE JOURNEY LOOK LIKE?

We will begin on Earth Day, with an opening ceremony led by Wabanaki Peoples on the banks the Penobscot River. Here, the first people of this land will extend the hand of peace and friendship to all of those who have come to their homelands seeking peace, refuge, safety, and a better life for their families. We will then offer our collective gratitude to the sacred mother who has welcomed us all, Nikwus Skitkomiq, Mother Earth.

Following the opening ceremony, we will share a community meal then begin our processional. The first day will end with a closing prayer in Orono.

We will begin and end each day with a prayer, ritual, or ceremony led by one or more of the faith or cultural groups supporting this event, with longer prayer gatherings being held Saturday, April 26th at noon and Sunday April 27th at 6 PM.

We will arrive at the Maine State House in Augusta on April 29th at 11:30 am, where we will hold a multi-faith, multi-cultural prayer and gratitude ceremony focused on our shared values, hopes, and commitments for a more humane, safe, and loving world.

A detailed schedule will be posted just prior to the event, and a map will be given to those walking with us each day.

All those interested in joining us in the spirit of peace and friendship are welcome.

There are many ways for you to participate. Here are some suggestions:

- Attend the Opening and Closing Ceremonies.
- Walk with us for all or a portion of each day.
- Join us for the beginning or end of day prayer ceremonies, locations TBA.
- Host prayer or ceremonial circles with your friends or neighbors from your location at the time of the walk, uplifting the values connected to this journey.
- Drive a support vehicle to help those walking.
- Provide sealed snacks or drinks for those walking.
- Contribute to the potluck meal for the Opening ceremony, or the Saturday or Sunday prayer ceremonies (If you are contributing to these meals please bring a dish with a label listing all ingredients to prevent any allergy issues).
- Make a donation to the Land Peace Foundation to help with logistical needs during the walk.

What Are Pronouns? Why Do They Matter? — Pronouns.org Resources on Personal Pronouns

In English, whether we realize it or not, people frequently refer to us using pronouns when speaking about us. Often, when speaking of a singular human in the third person, these pronouns have a gender implied -- such as "he" to refer to a man/boy or "she" to refer to a woman/girl. These associations are not always accurate or helpful.

Often, people make assumptions about the gender of another person based on the person's appearance or name. These assumptions aren't always correct, and the act of making an assumption (even if correct) sends a potentially harmful message -- that people have to look a certain way to demonstrate the gender that they are or are not.

Using someone's correct personal pronouns is a way to respect them and create an inclusive environment, just as using a person's name can be a way to respect them. Just as it can be offensive or even harassing to make up a nickname for someone and call them that nickname against their will, it can be offensive or harassing to guess at someone's pronouns and refer to them using those pronouns if that is not how that person wants to be known. Or, worse, actively choosing to ignore the pronouns someone has stated that they go by could imply the oppressive notion that intersex, transgender, nonbinary, and gender nonconforming people do not or should not exist.




THE UUCE **COMMUNICATION SURVEY** RESULTS ARE IN!

Thank you to all that took the survey and for **valuable feedback** on how we can best communicate within or beyond our UUCE congregation.


How do you find out about anything UUCE-related? Please rate how often you refer to each item on the list below.

SOME VALUABLE FEEDBACK

We received many helpful suggestions in our UUCE Communication Survey, here a just a few regarding the question: "What other thoughts would you like to add about how we could communicate more effectively to our members, potential members and the public?"

- · For the public, definitely newspapers, but also radio announcements of upcoming events: WERU.
- · Become involved with Heart of Ellsworth.
- Fewer, more dramatic announcements. Less wordy repetitive information.
- leff or Sara mini-videos are effective.
- · Explore social media as a way to reach young adults and the general community.
- Grocery store and co-ops bulletin boards for events.
- · Our Wayside pulpit could be used more frequently.
- Consider outreach to the College of the Atlantic.
- · Hold more community events at the church.
- Flyers around the community and at other churches.
- Put up flyers on community bulletin boards and outreach at events like pride, June tenth, farmers markets etc.
- · Have a more active public Facebook group.
- Have things that welcome the community in, like maybe a monthly free meal so folks can see what
 we are all about.
- · Updating the google calendar.

- Keep growing the Members & Friends email list to distribute the weekly e-news (timely info) more widely.
- Put closings and Zoom-only services on the outgoing phone message and on the web site.
- · Have the website frequently updated. If neglected, then unreliable.
- Tracking the access to Facebook and our website and asking new members and others how they heard about us
- Put ads in local newspapers and also on the radio.... 97.7 and WERU too.
- · Pride flag flying at the Wayside Pulpit.
- · Flyers on our bulletin board at church.
- Word of mouth seems to be the most effective way to attract newcomers.
- Keep updated and accessible brochures about UUCE and events.

While I was in Taiwan last fall, I visited a friend who works in a research institution in Taipei to talk about my research into the education of Deaf people in Taiwan. We spoke for a while and then she said, "You know, there was a young man from France here just a few weeks ago doing the same kind of research you are." "What?" I replied, totally surprised that there was someone else out there interested in this topic. She proceeded to give me his contact information and as soon as I got back to Maine, I contacted him.

EU + UU = EUU

The young man's name is Gabriel Maignan-Vásquez. He is a 23-year old student at the ENS (École Normale Supérieure) or Paris Normal School which specializes in producing high quality teachers for the schools in France. The university system is different in France, but he's currently halfway between a master's degree and a Ph.D. and he has chosen to trace the various pathways through which the various Asian countries established educational programs for the Deaf. Over the course of several Zoom calls, we got to know each other's research very well, and I saw Gabriel as the logical inheritor of my collection of research and materials on Deaf education in Taiwan. To make a long story short, he invited me to come and spend two weeks with his family just outside of Paris in the town of Vanves.

Knowing that I was going to Paris, out of curiosity I typed "Unitarian Universalist Paris France" into Google and discovered that there was indeed a UU church in Paris, but it only meets once a month, and not while I was going to be there. Nevertheless, I contacted the congregation president Aamer Taufique, who told me about the every-Friday-afternoon "Happy Hour" chat group online and invited me to join. So join I did and I made the acquaintance of Ida van Haren, a Dutch woman who lives in Paris and who I identified as the head of the chat group. Also, there was Peter Jarrett, a Canadian from Toronto who served as last year's congregation president. Then there was a Danish woman whose camera was aimed at

her kitchen where she was busy making a special dessert while she was chatting with us. We were later joined by a man named Brian from Idaho, a woman from Virginia, a man from Morocco who teaches English in an elementary school, an older French woman who liked to explain French customs like "Poisson d'Avril" (April Fish – we call it April Fool's Day), and a number of other interesting people.

I soon figured out that this group was hardly limited to just the members of UUFP, the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Paris, but was open to all, and it could broadly be described as EUU – European Unitarian Universalists. Before Covid, members of UUFP used to meet in a Paris bar to shmooze over a glass of wine every Friday afternoon from 5-7. After Covid, they had to do it in another way, and this virtual Happy Hour was created in 2020, and the people who join it now come from virtually everywhere. Conversation is done in English. Once I got to France, I contacted Ida van Haren, the leader of the Happy Hour, and we arranged to meet at a

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little restaurant, La Brise
Miche, not far from the
Centre Pompidou. I went
there with my French host,
Gabriel, and Ida was
there with a spit-fire friend
of hers from New Jersey
named Elaine McCarthy.
What a hoot! Both women
have been living in Paris
for about 30+ years, and
they gave me a pretty
good idea of the history of

UUFP. Apparently, the group began meeting as early as the late 70s. The church has never had a "permanent" home, but rather has had to meet in the afternoons in this church or that meeting hall or whatever they could find. But over 40 years later, the group is still together. They are currently meeting in Paris in what they call La Maison Verte (the Green House), and if you're moved to do so, you can join them for their services via Zoom. The church website is in English, and the link is: uuparis. org

So, Ida, Elaine, Gabriel, and I sat down to a meal of French crêpes, juice, and coffee and we had a wonderful time. Elaine was delightful, telling us all sorts of stories about the church over the years. Gabriel, who had never heard of Unitarian Universalism before, was somewhat intrigued by these two crazy Americans and this Dutch woman all "singing the same song" with lyrics about diversity, equality, inclusion, activism, love, protest, human rights, etc. I told him: "Get used to it. This fall you'll be teaching at Harvard, a bastion of Unitarianism!"
