Suggestions For September 2024 - "The Practice of Freedom" from Soul Matters Music Resources Coordinator, Adam O'Dell

Dear Readers,

Though I knew this theme would be relevant at the start of our church year, I wish it didn't have to be *this* relevant. I'm sure many of you, like me, are becoming overwhelmed with the civil rights violations and authoritarian orders making their way into the news on a daily basis. It's enough to make you want to crawl into a hole and pretend it's not happening. I urge you, as I urge myself, to remember why we do this work. Music has the power to renew spirits, bring communities together, and inspire lasting change. Music is not the change in and of itself, it is part of the complex human lives we live. I know many of our congregants disappear through the summer months, and we use much of that time to rest, relax, and plan ahead for the coming year, but we also have this time to build momentum, renew our resolve, and fight for the just world we know is possible.

This month, I have suggested music that both lovingly connects us to our community, and inspires courage to do the hard work of developing solidarity and systems to build a better world. Much of our church year has prepared us for this moment. The practice of freedom compels us to invite people in, to listen to them, to repair our relationships and communities, to be present, to tell our stories, to be inclusive, to trust each other, to express our joy, and to imagine a better world. We need all of these practices to create a truly free world.

As we go into this month, and into our summer programming, remember that our tradition is filled with music by those who have done the work before us, and those who work alongside us today. This month's packet includes hymns and music of the Civil Rights movement, the Women's rights movement, the LGBTQ+ rights movement, and a number of other struggles for freedom and equity throughout history. As always, consider the context and use these pieces with care, and remember that the freedoms of one affect the freedoms of all.

In the field of counseling called "narrative therapy," we're encouraged to look at the stories we tell ourselves in a new light. We learn to separate the 'thin' stories from the 'thick' stories. Thin stories are those that don't seem to have much detail or background. Thin stories tend to be the 'single stories' Adichie talked about.

Thin stories are often created and imposed on us by other people: parents, teachers, those in authority. Because of that authority, we accept these stories without question. So, for example, Mary may say she's lazy, because one of her teachers told her she was lazy when she was a little child.

Thick stories, on the other hand, are built from the real evidence of life. They are rich with examples, full of detail. They explore inner motives, and outward forces that may have made the person act that way. In the practice of narrative therapy, people are encouraged to create alternative stories to their thin stories, and to thicken them, looking for the richness and detail in their lives.

So Mary, who considered herself lazy, may find that she is in fact very creative, and often used her intelligence to find ways around boring tasks, a practice that many teachers would have considered laziness. She might review her life, and find many instances where she broke the mold, rejecting wearisome, dreary work for novel, interesting tasks.

(p. 96-100) ...The spiritual strength by which people accessed their inner freedom even under such miserable conditions is evidence that they are capable of finding it anywhere.

However, to be extra cautious and in good relationship, we ask that you reach out to the minister to let them know you are planning to use their sermon. Also be sure to ask if they have any particular requests or guidance for how to do that.
- An Important Note About Editing: If you want to make changes to the sermon for brevity or context, you must reach out to the preachers directly for such editing permission. Contact information of each of the referenced preachers is listed after the list of sermons.
- We mostly list written scripts: In order not to undermine UU preachers who depend on live and online guest preaching income for their livelihood, we mainly focus on sharing sermon texts (and sometimes audio clips), but not videos. When, on occasion, we include a video sermon, it will be from congregations that share those as part of their mission.
- Note about hiring preachers for online guest preaching: All of the texts listed below can be used and <u>read</u> in your worship services for free. And, in some cases, the preachers of these sermons are glad to be hired to guest preach and give these sermons at your congregation either by zooming into your service or sending you a video recording of them giving it. When this is the case, there is a note under the sermon title/link with the preacher's contact information.
